DESTRUCTION OF HILLS

Railway at it too in Barlekha

Defying laws intended to conserve the nature and forests in the country, different organisations affiliated with the government continue to destroy natural topography in the name of various development projects across the country.

Bangladesh Railway (BR) is no different. Under a project titled 'Rehabilitation of Kulaura-Shahbazpur Section of Bangladesh Railway', the BR has been razing two large hills on about 4,500 square feet area in Barlekha upazila of Moulvibazar.

The dirt gathered from the hills, located in Burargul area of Shahbazpur union, are being used to level the sunken sections of the base where new rail tracks would be built under the Kulaura-Shahbazpur project, said locals.

of Nusrat Laila Nira, assistant commissioner (land) in Barlekha upazila, on the illegal hill cutting by the BR in the upazila, she said she also received reports that the BR was cutting hills in the area to use the soil for making foundation for rail tracks.

She however confirmed that no approval was issued to the BR for cutting hills for the purpose of filling up the foundation of rail tracks under the Kulaura-Shahbazpur project as the BR was already allocated funds for procurement of soil from outside sources.

"I visited the hilly area, but couldn't find anyone... legal action will be taken against them [the violators] soon," she said.

Contacted, Badrul Huda, assistant director

Moulvibazar, said they found evidence of unlawful cutting of hills in Barlekha and the use of soil from the hills in the railway project.

He said after he reached the site of the hills early this month, the workers engaged in the hill cutting fled the scene, leaving behind an excavator. "This is absolutely illegal" as the DoE did

not issue any clearance to any organisation for razing hills in the area, he said. "Cutting hills without obtaining permission

from the government is a punishable offence. I sent detailed report to our high-ups. They [the offenders] will face legal action including lawsuits."

During a recent visit to Burargul area, north of Shahbazpur union, this correspondent saw almost half of the two hills were almost levelled

After this correspondent drew attention of Department of Environment (DoE) in to the ground and assisted by nearly seven to eight workers, mechanised diggers were loading the soil onto tipper trucks, four to six in total.

The workers said the hills were owned by

Latif and Cherag Ali. Sharif Uddin and Zulhas Mia, two of the drivers of the vehicles, said the soil was being

taken for the railway development work. One of the workers, requesting not to be named, said they were working at the instruction of Firoz Mia, a railway staffer, and

Faisal Ahmed, an expatriate in Saudi Arabia. The workers were being paid on daily basis,

Locals said the hill cutting has been going on for about a month, mostly at nights.

Amina Begum, wife of Rafiz Ali, one of the owners of the hills, said, "The railway people are cutting the hills" and the excavator and trucks belonged to the railway.

Another hill owner, Faisal Ahmed, said, he agreed to cut the hills at the request of BR staffer Firoz Mia so the soil could be used to fill up low-lying areas for the new rail tracks.

He also claimed that Firoz Mia has all necessary "documents including the clearance from the DoE". Firoz Mia could not be reached for his comments as his cell phone was found

The cell phone of Tanvirul Islam, additional chief engineer of Bangladesh Railway and director of the Kulaura-Shahbazpur project of the BR, was also unreachable.

Chemical-free vegetable brings bright prospect

Growers enthusiastic as DAE's experiment at Tilai Joychondi village in Nilphamari Sadar sees success

Tilai Joychondi village in Sadar upazila has already earned the reputation of 'safe vegetable producing area' as a good number of farmers are cultivating in environment-friendly way for producing poison-free vegetables.

In early January this year, the Department of Agriculture Extension (DAE) provided training to 20 farmers of the village on organic farming of vegetables.

The farmers adopted the method and later many others followed.

Visiting the village on Sunday, this correspondent found several farmers busy in taking care of organically grown summer vegetables like bitter gourd, pumpkin, pointed gourd, brinjal and snake gourd.

The growers said they got handsome profit from winter vegetables, which were produced in organic way in an experimental basis under the supervision of agricultural officials.

At the village's entrance, a big ditch covered with a thatched shed was seen where farmers put cow dung, rotten water hyacinth etc to prepare compost manure.

Noorjahan, 48, was preparing vermin compost using earthworm in large concrete

"We were used to farming with chemical fertilizers and pesticides. After learning from agricultural officials that it is a harmful practice, we switched to organic farming. Besides, we became aware that conscious people are ready to pay higher for poison-free vegetables," farmer Ohidul Islam said.

Agricultural officials arranged training on preparing organic fertilizers, pesticides and pheromone traps, said another farmer

During the visit, farmer Fahima Begum, 45, was seen making organic pesticide by mixing by selling it while my expenditure is Tk 13.5



crushed leaves of neem, tobacco and papaya with water to keep at a shady place for days. She learnt the process from DAE's trainers.

Sirajul Islam, 50, was spraying in his pumpkin

field liquid fertilizer, which he prepared by mixing cow dung, oil bran, bone dust, molasses etc with water and allowing fermentation for seven to ten davs "Organic farming is cost effective as we

prepare fertiliser and pesticide at home from available natural materials while chemical ones are costly," said Sirajul.

Solaiman Ali, 55, said he cultivated bitter gourd on 30 decimals of land and expect to get 750 kg of vield.

"Hopefully I will get Tk 34.5 thousand


thousand only as use of organic farming saved the expenditure for buying chemical fertilizer and pesticide," he said.

Sonarai Union agriculture officer Nazmul Huda Mithu said, "Farmers also use environmentfriendly sex pheromone traps, net houses, yellow sticky traps etc to prevent insects."

However, farmers in one voice reported that they badly need at least an organic vegetable shop in every market so that buyers can easily identify healthy products.

Contacted, Nilphamari DAE's Deputy Director Nikhil Chandra Biswas said, "We provide all out support to farmers of Tilai Joichondi village in producing safe vegetables. We have a plan to spread the practice in the entire district in phases."
