

Natural reservoir runs dry

Several lakh people of Savar's Bhakurta now without drinking water after Wasa started pumping out water

Five years ago, Dhaka Wasa announced the discovery of a natural underground water reservoir in Savar's Bhakurta.

It stated that water was accumulating there from an underground Himalayan channel and it would not deplete in 30-40 years as the aquifer would be naturally refilled by water from the Himalayas.

But something started to go very wrong when Dhaka Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) started pumping out water from the reservoir with deep tube

wells.

Since January last year, several lakh residents of Bhakurta and Tetuljhara unions in Savar and Taranagar union in Keraniganj have been experiencing severe water crisis.

Almost all the hand-driven tube wells in the areas went dry while farmers could not cultivate paddy due to irrigation water shortages.

Wasa could not give any exact reason but it primarily thinks that extracting water from the deep aquifer is causing a problem

People have to walk 2km for water

"Other sufferings are bearable, but not suffering for lack of water."

"I came to fetch drinking water crossing a big canal. On the way back, I get down into the canal and cross to the other side as I cannot walk along the bamboo with the heavy pitcher," said 28-year-old Kulsum Begum.

Kulsum lives in Patjoynagar village of Kamarkhola union in Khulna's Dacope upazila. The village is over 50 kilometres from Khulna city.

AL candidates win all 3 by-polls

Turnout just over 5 percent in Dhaka

MOHIUDDIN ALAMGIR and RASHIDUL HASAN

Awami League candidate Md Shafiqul Islam Mohiuddin won the by-election to Dhaka-10 constituency, held amid the lowest ever voter turnout due to the coronavirus outbreak.

In the Gaibandha-3 constituency, AL candidate Umme Kulsum Smrity won the by-polls with 201,482 votes, while her closest rival was BNP candidate Moimul Hasan Sadiq, who bagged 41,408 votes, said Returning Officer Mahbubur Rahman.

In Bagerhat-4, AL candidate Amirul Alam Milon won big. He got 1.82 lakh votes whilst his rival JP's Sajon Kumar Mistri got 3,744 votes.

Meanwhile, Dhaka-10 BNP candidate Sheikh Rabiul

13 people die as truck collides with pick-up

At least 7 injured at the accident-prone spot

At least 13 people died after a pick-up van collided head-on with a salt-laden truck on the Chattogram-Cox's Bazar highway at Lohagara upazila's Jangalia in Chattogram.

Another seven people were injured in the accident, which took place around 9:40pm.

Only two people -- Jashim Uddin, 30, a local journalist, and his younger brother Belal Uddin, 28, from Lohagara -- were identified

among the dead.

Jahedul Islam, a friend of Jashim, told The Daily Star that he saw him off around 9:00pm at a local kitchen market. Just 40 minutes later, he got the news of the accident and rushed to the spot where he saw his friend lying dead.

He said there is a sharp turn at Jangalia where many vehicles would get into such accidents.

The identity of the rest could not be known immediately, police said, adding that the casualties may see a

hike.

Afrujul Haque Tutul, additional police superintendent in Chattogram district (south) police, told The Daily Star that at least 12 people died on the spot. The van was carrying day labourers to Cox's Bazar.

The salt-laden truck was coming from Cox's Bazar, Tutul said, adding that the injured were whisked off to Chattogram Medical College Hospital.

Police seized the truck and arrested its driver, he added.

EC postpones CCC elections, two by-polls

The Election Commission has postponed Chattogram City Corporation elections and two other by-polls due to the coronavirus outbreak.

"Elections to Chattogram City Corporation and the by-polls of Bogura-1 and Jashore-6 have been postponed for an indefinite period," Election Commission (EC) Senior Secretary Md Alamgir said after a commission meeting yesterday.

"The commission made these decisions taking health risks into consideration," he said at a briefing at the EC media centre.

The commission will fix new dates (for the elections) when the health department announces that the country is free of the novel coronavirus risk, he added.

The EC took the decision after the second death -- a 73-year-old who tested positive for coronavirus -- had been reported and four more people were detected with Covid-19. Health Minister Zahid Maleque, at a press briefing at the office of the Directorate General of Health Services in Mohakhali, said that with the new cases, the total number of confirmed cases is 24.

Food inflation likely

Warn FAO, agricultural analysts over panic buying, lockdowns

Lockdowns and panic food buying due to the coronavirus pandemic could ignite world food inflation even though there are ample supplies of staple grains and oilseeds in key exporting nations, a senior economist at FAO and agricultural analysts said.

The world's richest nations poured unprecedented aid into the global economy as coronavirus cases ballooned across Europe and the United States, with the number of deaths in Italy outstripping those in mainland China, where the virus originated.

With over 270,000 infections and more than 11,000 deaths, the epidemic has stunned the world and drawn comparisons with periods such as World War Two and the 1918 Spanish flu pandemic.

"All you need is panic buying from big importers such as millers or governments to create a crisis," said Abdolreza Abbassian,

chief economist at the United Nations' Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO).

"It is not a supply issue, but it is a behavioural change over food security," he told Reuters by phone from Rome, the FAO headquarters. "What if bulk buyers think they can't get wheat or rice shipments in May or June? That is what could lead to a global food supply crisis."

Consumers across the world from Singapore to the United States have queued at super markets in recent weeks to stock up on items ranging from rice and hand sanitizers to toilet paper.

The global benchmark Chicago wheat futures rose more than 6% this week, the biggest weekly gain in nine months, while rice prices in Thailand (RI:THBKN5-P1), the world's 2nd largest exporter of the grain, have climbed to the highest since August 2013.

Many shops and pharmacies have run out all sort of hand rubs as consumers have been thronging the stores to get a hand on the disinfecting product since the first coronavirus cases were confirmed on March 8.

There is also a scarcity of isopropyl alcohol, the primary raw material needed to prepare the
