The designers at Hyundai are either up to something revolutionary or just being downright lazy. Their new sedan, the 2021 Elantra, looks like a rough 3D render with lots of unbevelled edges. The depressions on the doors and front fender resemble damage models form the early 2000's racing game while the front grille gives the impression of the car wearing a facemask, which is tragically trendy. Still, the car does come with a fuel-efficient 2.0-litre four-cylinder engine and Hyundai's usual above-its-pricerange upmarket features. Netflix launches \$100 million fund for out-of-work film and TV workers

Netflix has announced the launch of a \$100 million fund that aims to support the cast and crew members, including those working on Stranger Things, The Witcher, and Russian Doll, who are now reeling from the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

In a statement on the streamer's blog, Chief Content Officer Ted Sarandos said, "This community has supported Netflix through the good times, and we want to help them through these hard times, especially while governments are still figuring out what economic support they will provide. So we've created a \$100 million fund to help with hardship in the creative community." \$15 million of the fund will benefit non-Netflix productions through third parties and

emergency relief non-profits created for cast and crew that are now out of work.

Furthermore, Netflix will also be donating \$1 million to the SAG-AFTRA Covid-19 Disaster Fund, the Motion Picture and Television Fund, and the Actors Fund Emergency Assistance in the US, as well as \$1 million between the AFC and Foundation des Artistes.



started The Bangladeshi Perspective. While talking about the inception of this project, Seeam mentioned the book "Tribe of Mentors" by Tim Feriss, where the author interviews some amazing people across the world to know what makes them successful. Being able to relate to the advice in the book, Seeam started his endeavour to tell the stories of Bangladeshis who were leaving their mark in their respective professional lives at home and abroad.

Seeam started the project with his friend Farhan Rahman around November 2019. Although Farhan left the journey after a while due to his busy schedule with his job at Tesla, Seeam continued the project at Harvard. Initially, he reached out to some successful Bangladeshis at Harvard. MIT and Oxford. The interviews were all Facebook Live interviews and can be found on the Facebook page. Seeing impressive viewer growth, Seeam later decided to expand the scope and outreach. The website for The Bangladeshi Perspective was created when he came to Bangladesh for a

month during his winter break. He created the website with help from a friend and expanded presence from Facebook to YouTube and LinkedIn as well. The platform so far has 54 interviews and has reached over 100,000 people. The team is growing with rising interest among the youth of Bangladesh to be a part of The Bangladeshi Perspective. Few talented students have applied to be bloggers, video editors, and contributors for this initiative seeking an avenue for learning and

When asked about the most unexpected and key revelations in his journey with The Bangladeshi Perspective, Seeam mentioned the following facts:

· Most of the successful people achieved confidence from accomplishments in the early stages of their lives (High-school or Bachelor's) mostly through extra-curricular activities of them have at least a double-digit number of failures that changed their trajectories in life.

Most of them do not have any idea as to where they want to be 5/10 years from now and that has always been the case. They make the most out of whatever circumstances are put in front

In terms of communication, WhatsApp is the best way to reach these people although email/LinkedIn outreach is getting more popular day by

Going forward, The Bangladeshi Perspective aims to make sure that the knowledge base reaches as many young aspiring Bangladeshis as possible. For now, the target is a few million Bangladeshis annually. Through a book or a better promoted social media video channel, the platform aims to reach more Bangladeshis every day. "I had a great journey interviewing Bangladeshis

A lot of the talented students in Bangladesh today feel stuck and lost in their professional (often personal) lives due to a lack of mentoring. Successful and bright minds are not traditionally accessible (via emails or LinkedIn messages) in Bangladesh, unlike many other countries. Being affiliated with some of the top institutions in Bangladesh and the world provided Seeam with easier access to a lot of successful Bangladeshis. Making the most out of his access to these individuals, he wanted to create a bridge between the knowledge he could get from those talented people and the young minds in Bangladesh who need a direction with successful instances. Thus, The Bangladeshi Perspective was born.



The back features another cut out that's now filled with wire mesh and has two exhaust tips poking out. Tips are also






Greek and Roman Mythology-University of Pennsylvania via Coursera



How to properly clean and disinfect your smartphone

The screen of your smartphone can be a teeming cauldron of germs. The germs of touch screens can easily spread from your phone to your hands and face, increasing the chance of infections. Though disinfecting a smartphone doesn't take much time, this minor chore is often ignored. But at the time of cold and flu season or an outbreak of coronavirus like now, you must clean and disinfect your phone very frequently.

Microfiber cleaning cloths

Microfiber cloths are light, washable and reusable. These tightly woven microfiber cloths are ultra-soft that can help to clean the sensitive glass of your smartphone without the risk of scratching it. These cloths are also effective to remove oil, dust, fingerprint and all other smudges from your screen. Microfiber cloths can be used with or without a mild cleaning solution suitable for electronic screens. But never use soap or detergent. While using a damp microfiber cloth, it's a must to switch off your phone. Just move the cloth in a horizontal or vertical direction repeatedly.



Rubbing alcohol

Using the alcohol solution on the smartphone screen is not a bad idea at all if it has the proper amount of alcohol in it. 70% rubbing alcohol or other alcoholbased disinfectants are the best options. But don't spray them directly on the screen. It may damage the glass depending on the sensitivity level of it. Take a soft, lint-free cloth or at best microfiber cloth,

dip it into the solution and wipe the screen without keeping any excess solution on it.

Disinfectant wipes

If you are in a dilemma to choose a good combination of alcohol solution and cleaning cloths, you can switch to disinfectant wipes. 70% isopropyl alcohol wipes or Clorox Disinfecting Wipes are effective to kill microbes and sanitize your phone. A single wipe is enough, but you should avoid excessive wiping. These wipes are sometimes overloaded with alcohol solution and the extra alcohol can drip into the sensitive points like any



speaker grill or lighting spot of the phone. So remove the extra amount of alcohol before using it.

UV sanitizer

You can use a UV sanitizer to deep clean your smartphone. UV phone sanitizers use UV-C light to disinfect smartphones. UV-C light of these types of cleaning devices can kill most of the germs living on the screen and the back of your phone. This light is not harmful to your smartphone and this process of sanitization only takes 10 minutes. However, it hasn't been tested on the coronavirus. But according to the experts, it'll work on coronavirus too, if the UV-C dose is larger. But we can't deny the fact that it kills up to 99.9% of the bacteria which can't be done by alcohol wipes. So it's an effective tool to sanitize smartphones.

Remember to wash your hands through for at least 20 seconds after cleaning your smartphone. Don't let the germs to transfer from your phone to your hands, even after your efforts to

Radio Garden


Radio Garden allows you to listen to thousands of live radio stations
