# Kumudini Hospital's telemedicine service comes as saviour

The patients in Tangail's Mirzapur upazila have started getting free telemedicine services at the union parishad premises, thanks to the initiative of Kumudini Hospital.

The authorities of the charitable institution, founded by late philanthropist Ranada Prasad Saha, on Saturday launched the services as patients shy away from the hospital, fearing coronavirus infection.

Under the arrangement, doctors designated for different health problems will provide services at a union every day and all the 14 unions of the upazila will get the facility by

A patient with cardiac problems, Abdus Samad, 60, of Goraki village also got serious skin diseases while Samia Akter, a Class III student of Jogirkofa village was suffering from cold and fever but they did not go to hospital for taking treatment during the ongoing Covid-19



As telemedicine services were arranged at the medical camp at Latifpur union parishad building on Saturday, they went there and got medical help.

Many others in the area, including Amena Begum, Shahnaz Begum, Ismot Ara Sadek Dewan, Sabuj and Rifat were also happy to get the specially arranged treatment provided by specialist doctors from the hospital.

On Sunday, doctors arranged treatment for patients at Banail union.

Some 1500 to 2000 patients usually get treatment from the outdoor while 700 to 800 patients remain admitted at the 1050-bed hospital every day, said Animesh Bhoumik Liton, assistant general manager of Kumudini

"Now the general patients are too afraid to come to the hospital due to coronavirus outbreak. Transport crisis during the lockdown is also a factor.

"Considering the problem of patients, especially pregnant women and serious patients who need regular treatment, the hospital authorities decided to reach the telemedicine services to the local patients and it has been arranged following rules set by the health directorate after the outbreak of Covid-19," he added.

### Story of how a group of friends is serving the community during financial difficulties caused by the ongoing shutdowns

A group of youths in Thakurgaon town are being praised for their nonprofit initiative named '30% discount

The store has been doing a tremendous service to the town's low-income residents who have been in a dire situation due to Covid-19 shutdowns.

A large section of the society -especially daily wage earners such as rickshaw pullers, day labourers, masons, painters and carpenters -- is going through financial crisis due to job loss caused by the shutdowns.

At a time when prices of essentials are on the rise and many of the people in the low-income group are out of jobs, the discount store has appeared as a much-needed respite for the townspeople.

Essentials including rice, lentil, potato, onion, sugar, salt, edible oil, spices, eggs and soaps are being sold at the store every day in front of the cooperative market in the town.

A group of students united under Facebook group 'Julum Bosti' primarily launched the initiative with funds raised from group members. Many locals have also been sending contributions to the group.

Volunteers wear face masks and gloves while attending the store and they ensure buyers form lines maintaining a minimum of six feet physical distance between each other.

About 60 to 70 people turned up on the inaugural day. Currently the store serves nearly 160 to 170 people on an average day. Operation hours of the store are 3:00pm to 6:00pm daily.

The volunteers put up an updated hand-written price list in front of the store every day to evade any confusion. Moreover, to ensure availability of the essentials for all at reduced price, there is a quantity restriction on each item sold at the store.

Each buyer is allowed to buy a maximum of two kilograms of coarse rice, one kg potato, half kg lentil, one litre edible oil, half kg onion, 250 grams ginger, 250 gm garlic, half kg salt, four eggs, one antiseptic soap and one laundry soap each day.

Al Asma-ul-Husna Mithun, one of the organisers, told the Daily Star that they opened the discount store on April 1 with an aim to lend a hand to the vulnerable section of the society who have been feeling the brunt of the restrictions imposed nationwide to contain the spread of the novel coronavirus pandemic.

In early days, they used to spend around Tk 3,000 against the difference between the cost and sale price of the commodities available at the store. With growing popularity of the store, the figure has gradually reached as high as about Tk 5,000.

Aside from bearing the price difference, they also give away fresh produce to each buyer at no additional at Tk 20,000 daily, Mithun said, cost, he said adding that local growers adding that their group members as month ago. "Within two weeks into the journey, we stumbled and were compelled to stop our operations for a day due to fund crisis. But thanks to spontaneous support we received from different quarters, we soon pulled together and resumed operations.

They hope that they would be able to serve the community until normalcy is restored following the lifting of the precautionary measures imposed by the authorities.

Explaining how it all started, Mithun said their group was created about two years back to do great things for the community.

Since then, nearly 30 to 40 members of the group had been contributing Tk 100 each month to raise funds for different welfare activities geared toward the disadvantaged who are in need of warm clothes during the winter or financial help for treatment.

Witnessing sufferings of the jobless and the low-income population amid the Covid-19 shutdowns, they felt the urge to stand beside them as well. The initial fund of Tk 5,000 was received as prize money that the group members had received by winning the championship title of a local cricket tournament, held just before the outbreak of the pandemic. The members put together another Tk 8,000 for the cause.

During the early days, they used to sell around Tk 12,000 worth of goods each day and now the amount stands the store as part of their responsibility source of funds for the store.

Talking to this correspondent, The list of 313 Bangladeshis, which Tanvir said his parents stayed at Nizamuddin in Delhi till March includes elderly men and women, was prepared by Tablighi Jamaat 4. Then they moved to Sheopur in Bangladesh. They said there may be Madhya Pradesh to perform Tablighi

> activities. On March 29, the local law enforcement agency took them to a government male hostel adjacent to Sheopur District Jail for quarantine, Tanvir said, adding that he was in a

> contact with them till April 28. Tanvir said his parents experienced a lot of hardship in terms of food and hygiene. They are elderly persons and both have diabetic issues, have run out of insulin and medicine, which are not properly delivered.

> "Their passports, cell phones and Bangladeshi SIM cards were seized after a few days. Then they came to know that a case was filed against them with four other couples stuck with them.

"They have never experienced imprisonment in their lives," Tanvir said, adding that one or two-months' stay in jail would be tough for them at this age.

The Daily Star received copy of another letter to the Bangladesh High Commission in New Delhi from eight stranded Bangladeshis who are now in virtual judicial custody in Uttar Pradesh. They were stuck in Bulandshahr district.

After their flights were cancelled, they communicated their situation to the Bangladesh High Commission in New Delhi through the Covid-19 hotline number. They also submitted their passport photocopies to the local police station for any sort of medical checkup required by the Indian government.

On April 1, their passports were seized by Katawali Dehat Police Station. Again, they informed the matter to the Bangladesh High Commission.

"The next day, a police officer forced us to sign a Hindi document, although we had no knowledge of what was written there nor had we been provided with any translation. Half an hour later we were picked up by a huge police convoy in the name Deputy High Commisioner's office of quarantine and taken to a school country.

miserable -- just like slums.

A few hours later, they were shifted to another school compound.

"The same day, at late night, approximately at 11:30pm, police escorted us to a third location. We were quarantined there for 17 days. We spent those days under acute mental pressure. "Authorities wearing civilian garb

took our mugshots and fingerprints in the name of medical tests. Later, we understood that it was taken for police cases," read the letter. They said they repeatedly asked

for medical certificates after their quarantine period of 14 days were over, but in vain.

On April 19, the authorities escorted them to Triveni Dutt Brahmchari Saraswati Vidya Mandir Inter College in the town of Dibai, approximately 40 kilometres away from Bulandshahr district. It turned out to be virtual imprisonment, the letter said.

"In this compound, females and males are sharing the same toilet with only one shower facility. We are provided with low-quality jail food in unhygienic, foul-smelling polythene bags. No locals are allowed to supply our necessary commodities [such as sanitary napkins] here. Jail authorities are also not allowing us necessities even if we want to pay for them," the letter added.

A police official in charge of keeping them confined informed them that a first information report (FIR) has been filed against them under section 182, 269, 270 IPC and Foreigners Act section 14.

Mentioning the health risks and medical complications especially of the elderly among them, the eight appealed to the High Commissioner for assistance.

This Daily Star correspondent made several WhatsApp calls and sent text messages to Muhammad Imran, Bangladesh High Commissioner in New Delhi. He however did not respond.

From April 20 till yesterday, around 1,950 Bangladeshi nationals -- most of whom went to India for medical treatment or are students at different Indian universities -- have so far been brought back from the neighbouring
