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Poverty taking toll on slum children

Experts say without balanced diet, mental nurture, they may experience psychological, physical disorder

With no work for two months now, domestic help Bibi Rupban has been struggling to feed her five children three meals a day. Her husband, a rickshaw-puller, can hardly scrounge up enough for the family to live on.

In their small shanty in a Mirpur slum, Rupban now feeds her children two times a day and gives them more water to fill up on so they do not feel as hungry, she said. The parents cannot also afford to grant their children's small wishes as before -- a few takas of pocket money to

buy sweets, ice-creams, and roadside snacks.

"What can I do? The rice and other things we got as aid was finished within a week. I have been compelled to give my children less food... I can't afford it," Rupban told The

She now borrows money from neighbours to buy food for her children.

Without adequate food and stuck at home with nothing to do, the children have grown more obstinate and aggressive, said Rupban, expressing her helplessness.

In the coronavirus-caused shutdown for over two months and in the days afterwards, such low-income families have struggled to give their young children a balanced diet and proper nurture.

Nasim in a 'very critical state'

Former health minister and Awami League lawmaker Mohammed Nasim's health condition remains unchanged and he is in a "very critical state" now.

"He cannot breathe on his own. He is now taking his breath with ventilation support," Dr Kanak Kanti Barua, vice- chancellor of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University and also the chief of medical board formed to oversee the treatment of Nasim, told The Daily Star yesterday.

"I visited Mohammed Nasim around 2:30pm today [yesterday]. He is totally unconscious, meaning that he is in a deep coma," said Kanak, also a renowned neurologist of the country.

He will carry out several tests of Nasim.

"If the situation remains unchanged, we will consult with the family members of Mohammed Nasim whether they want to take off his ventilation support," he added.

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1,011 Bangladeshi workers return by special flights

Around 250 of them were in prison in Qatar Staff Correspondent

Some 1,011 Bangladeshi migrant workers returned home from Qatar, Kuwait, Maldives and Nigeria by five special flights on Saturday and Friday.

Of them, 250 people who were staying in either prisons or detention camps in Qatar landed at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport (HSIA) around 9:30pm on Saturday by a special flight of Qatar Airways, said Akram, a doctor at the health desk of HSIA.

Besides, 265 people who were stranded in Maldives due to suspension of regular passenger flight operations returned home on the same evening by a special flight of Biman Bangladesh Airlines.

Tahera Khandaker, deputy general manager (public relations) of Biman Bangladesh Airlines, said the flight from Malé landed at 6:18pm on Saturday.

Earlier on Friday, a total of 493 Bangladeshis returned home from Maldives and Kuwait by two separate

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Harvard builds robot that's the size of a penny

Scientists at Harvard have copied their large, insect-inspired robot HAMR (Harvard Ambulatory Microrobot) into a smaller form factor. The new robot, HAMR-JR, is the size of a penny, measuring 2.25 centimetres across.

The robot is capable of quick movement, able to travel 14 times the length of his body in a single second, which makes it one of the smallest and fastest robots currently made, according to Harvard. While it might be the size of a penny, it is significantly lighter, weighing only 0.3 grams.

The ability to keep the familiar design, but change the scale of the robot, means that it can be used in a variety of purposes, including surgeries

Global virus death toll tops 400,000

India overtakes Spain as 5th worst-hit country; Brazil takes down Covid-19 data

The global death toll from the coronavirus crossed 400,000 yesterday with fatalities accelerating in Latin America, as India overtook Spain to become the fifth worst-hit country by the outbreak.

Brazil removed from public view months of data on its Covid-19 epidemic on Saturday, as President Jair Bolsonaro defended delays and changes to official record-keeping of the world's second-largest outbreak.

Brazil's health ministry removed the data from a website that had documented the epidemic over time and by state and municipality.

The ministry also stopped giving a total count of confirmed cases, which have shot past 672,000 – more than anywhere outside the United States – or a total death toll, which passed Italy this week, nearing 36,000 by Saturday.

OPEC agreed to extend an April deal to cut production through July, aiming to foster a recovery in oil prices after they were pummelled by slumps in demand caused by virus restrictions.

Governments are also increasingly focused on repairing

the economic damage, and even hard-hit European countries are now opening their borders and allowing people to return to work.

But gloomy data from Asia's two largest economies

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
