Govt to buy more from farmers

Each grower to be able to sell 6 tonnes of paddy or wheat instead of 3 tonnes

In the wake of a sluggish progress in the government's Boro procurement programme, the food ministry has lifted the ceiling for paddy and wheat purchase from an individual farmer to six tonnes from the previous three tonnes.

The relaxation of the current restriction came as the Directorate General of Food (DGF) has so far bought 29,000 tonnes of Boro paddy, which is only 4 percent of the annual procurement target of 800,000 tonnes, said a notification issued by the ministry on June 14.

The DGF, however, is supposed to procure 30 percent of its total target by the end of June.

The drive, which began on April 26, would end on

"Initially, we focused on buying from small and marginal farmers so that they get fair prices. Now to speed up the procurement, we have widened the scope so that the big farmers can also provide paddy to us," said Sarwar Mahmud, director general at the DGF.

The government has doubled its Boro procurement target this year compared to the last year's target of 400,000 tonnes in an attempt to tackle the aftermath of the coronavirus pandemic.

Standing by red-zoned residents

Around 11:30pm on Tuesday, a volunteer guarding East Rajabazar received a phone call from a resident asking for some essentials -- half a kilogram of malta and four packets of oral saline.

Another volunteer was contacted around 12:00pm on June 11, a day after the trial lockdown was enforced, with a few residents, who were holding a rooftop Bar-b-que party, asking for a broiler chicken.

No matter what the requirements, these volunteers are working round the clock to ease life under lockdown for those living in red zoned areas.

Dhaka's East Rajabazar area, with 50,000 residents, was categorised as a "red zone" by the government and put under experimental lockdown from June 10.

The zoning system measures were taken as the country is still struggling with everincreasing cases of Covid-19. Police, locals and volunteers have been helping the residents, while army personnel have been patrolling the area to monitor security.

Masud Hossain Suman, coordinator of the volunteers, explained that 80 people have volunteered to cater to those living in the area in two shifts while the residents



As his condition deteriorated with acute breathing difficulties at his Mirpur residence last night, he was rushed to the hospital where doctors declared him dead, he added.

Dr Rafiqul was buried at Shaheed Buddhijibi Graveyard at Rayerbazar through Quantum Foundation, said sources.

India-China Stand-Off

Tensions still run high

Delhi, Beijing trash each other's claims of sovereignty over Galwan Valley

Tensions remain high between India and China after Monday's border clashes that left 20 Indian soldiers killed as both sides blame each other and claim sovereignty over the Galwan Valley in eastern Ladakh.

China has said that India must not underestimate its firm will to safeguard its territorial sovereignty. The comments were made by Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Hua Chunying on Twitter.

"India must not misjudge the current situation or underestimate China's firm will to safeguard its territorial sovereignty," Hua said in her first tweet.

"Indian front-line troops broke the consensus and crossed the Line of Actual Control, deliberately provoking and attacking Chinese officers and soldiers, thus triggering fierce physical conflicts and causing casualties," she said in a follow up tweet.

The remarks came a day after India's external affairs ministry rubbished the Chinese military's claim of sovereignty over the Galwan Valley, at the heart of a border stand-off.

TIB about DMP summons on journos

Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) has expressed grave concern over the summoning of journalists by a police

probe committee. The summons issued after the media run reports based on a leaked letter the Dhaka Metropolitan commissioner wrote to the police chief with allegations of corruption against a DMP high-up.

"It's a threat to free press," said TIB in a statement asking the Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) to play a vital role in this regard.

TIB Executive Director Dr Iftekharuzzaman said it is an established rule that journalists will not disclose their sources.

"Now, if journalists are summoned to disclose sources then no one will dare to reveal graft incidents in the future, which is tantamount to creating a barrier for free press," he said.
