Badiuzzaman Tunu Bir Protik passes away

Badiuzzaman Tunu Bir Protik, a prominent freedom fighter from Rajshahi,

passed away early yesterday. He was 91.

During the Liberation War, he left his job at a pharmaceutical and fought in the front-lines.

His son-in-law Ariful Haque Kumar said Tunu had a heart attack a week ago. He was admitted to Rajshahi Medical College Hospital and went home after a few days. On Sunday evening, he fell ill again and was taken to the hospital, where he breathed his last, Kumar said.

He left behind five children and a host of friends and well-wishers.

His namaz-e-janaza was held at Laxmipur Shahi Jame Mosque after Zohr prayers. He was laid to rest with state honours in city's Hatem Khan graveyard.

Rajshahi city mayor AHM Khairuzzaman Liton and lawmaker Fazle Hossain Badsha condoled his death.

Prof Tasneem said 39 out of the 50 respondents said they were picked up by police during the pandemic and later repatriated.

Five migrants returned voluntarily, while three returned on leave and

three with help from their employers, she said. Every migrant worker deserves respect because the country's economy depends on their hard-earned remittance, said MJF Executive Director Shaheen Anam. She stressed for sending more skilled workers overseas to

avoid exploitation. Nazrul Islam, director general at the Foreign Affairs Ministry, said as of Saturday, some 16,484 migrant workers returned home during the

Ahmed Munirus Saleheen, secretary to the Expatriates' Welfare Ministry, said repatriation of workers during Covid-19 pandemic is a global phenomenon. "Many travel with 'free visa' for their jobs overseas. As a result, it becomes difficult to realise compensation for such workers," he said.

said they came to know of the letter. "But it doesn't address our demand.'

"We wanted dedicated beds for doctors but the letter said doctors and health workers would be given priority at this hospital [Sheikh Russel Gastro Liver Hospital]. If no bed remains vacant, what would our doctors do?" he told The Daily Star yesterday.

In Saturday's letter to the health minister, the BMA blamed the health ministry and the DGHS for the high number of infections among doctors as they failed to provide proper precautions for them.

The ministry has taken initiatives for separate arrangements for journalists, police, lawyers and other professionals but has not shown any interest in taking similar steps to ensure treatment for the frontline fighters, the letter said.

At least 3437 health workers--1072 doctors, 938 nurses and 1427 other staffers-got hospitals infected with Covid-19 till June 20, which is 3.32 percent of total infection in the country, according to Bangladesh Association (BMA).

The association said total 44 doctors died of the deadly virus till June 20.

Time lost, lives too

"All our way to Rajshahi, he had been crying for oxygen in a broken voice," said Hafizur's wife Mamtaz Rahman Joly.

"He was repeatedly telling us, 'Give me oxygen, I am dying without air. Take me back to Pabna, I was better with oxygen there. Can't you see I'm dying without oxygen?'" she said yesterday, sobbing over the phone.

"If there was an ICU available in Pabna, I could have saved my husband.

Hafizur, secretary of Ataikula Union Parishad, is a tragic example of how Covid-19 patients outside cities have been suffering due to the lack of ICUs at the district level.

While he was suffering because there was no ICU in Pabna, at least ten ICU beds were lying vacant at RMCH's 15-bed ICU.

A total of 49 people died of Covid-19 in Rajshahi division, as of Monday, while the number of the affected was 3,274.

According to an RMCH spokesman, at least 44 persons died at the hospital till yesterday with coronavirus or showing the symptoms. Of them, eight were confirmed cases while rest 36 were asymptotic.

districts in Rajshahi division, the Directorate General of Health Services arranged 23 ICU beds -- with an additional four from June 25 onwards -- in hospitals of Rajshahi and Bogura.

Like Hafizur, critical Covid-19 patients or those showing symptoms from these districts are being taken to either Rajshahi or Bogura if they

The arrangement of ICUs is not sufficient in comparison with the increasing numbers of the affected and deaths. But we're managing anyhow," said Dr Gopendra Nath Achariya, director of Rajshahi divisional health

Since the beginning of the outbreak in March, local health authorities had raised concerns and placed separate demands for ICUs due to the rising number of coronavirus patients, he said.

The government is considering setting up ICU beds in every district, said Dr Gopendra, divisional health

SAMPLE COLLECTION 'ON HOLD' Hafizur, for example, fell sick on June 10, said his relatives. His sample was collected in Pabna on June 14, but his test results were still not available as of yesterday. Samples from Pabna are mostly sent to Rajshahi.

Other than scarce ICU facilities, inadequate testing have forced health authorities to withhold sample collection in Rajshahi district.

The entire division has four public RT-PCR labs available -- with testing capacity of 564 samples a day.

But the daily collection of samples from eight districts of the division other districts at their last stages after amounts to more than 1,500, said Dr Gopendra.

In an official order on June 18, For Covid-19 patients in the eight Rajshahi's civil surgeon suspended sample collection from all nine upazilas in Rajshahi district for five days. The order was given after RMCH

Delays in testing are causing general panic as some Covid-19 patients are not quarantined until the test results come back positive, said health officials.

Asymptomatic Covid-19 patients, who generally need at least two follow-up tests to see whether they are coronavirus-free, remain uncertain of their status.

This can have an impact on their mental health, said doctors.

Mansur Rahman, 38, of Rajshahi's Charghat upazila, tested positive for Covid-19 on June 6, six days after giving his sample. He had no symptoms and was advised to stay at

However, he could not be tested again since then, said Ashiqur Rahman, the upazila health officer. "We didn't collect his sample again

as we were being repeatedly asked to selectively collect samples." Mansur had already been tested once and he was asymptomatic, so his

was deemed non-urgent. On Sunday, his 20th day of home quarantine, Mansur, who worked as a driver for the Rooppur Power Plant Project, considered that he had overcome the virus, said Ashiqur, quoting his family members. He even went out.

that the economic impact of shutdowns is often worse than the virus itself.

Brazil is the second worst-affected country behind the United States, another country where political infighting has prevented a unified policy to handle the virus.

Mexico, Peru and Chile are also hard-hit as death tolls soar and healthcare facilities are pushed toward collapse. Mexico City has delayed reopening markets, restaurants, malls, hotels and places of worship, with the country now

In Europe, meanwhile, the feel-good factor continues as countries ease their lockdown restrictions.

Thousands of French danced and partied well into yesterday for an annual music festival, in the first big blow out since the lockdown.

Revellers packed the streets of Paris, most shunning masks and social distancing, to enjoy concerts in cafes and on street Although none of the usual extravaganzas were held

beyond what French electronic music legend Jean-Michel Jarre billed as the world's first live virtual "avatar" concert, many felt the authorities were too lax. This is not what a gradual end to the lockdown looks like," said Dr Gilbert Deray.

Swimming pools and cinemas also reopened yesterday with one cinema opening one minute after midnight for a sneak preview of the upcoming French comedy, "Les Parfums" (The Perfumes).

Children up to the age of 15 also returned to school as attendance was switched from voluntary to compulsory, reports AFP.

SECOND WAVE

Fears remain, however, that the virus, may be on its way back even as countries where infections have ebbed lift their lockdowns to restart battered economies.

Australians were warned yesterday to avoid travelling to Melbourne, as the country's second biggest city tightened restrictions over fears of a second wave.

Victoria state has recorded more than 110 cases in the past week -- many of them in Melbourne -- prompting leaders of other regions to warn against visiting the city's six designated virus "hot spots".

Police along with Jatiyo Rakkhi Bahini conduct raids against hoarders in several places in Dhaka and Chittagong, and recover huge amount of essential goods. 42 hoarders are arrested in these drives. The anti-hoarding operations began yesterday following the end of the 15-day ultimatum given by Bangabandhu on June 7 at Suhrawardy Uddyan. The drives will continue against hoarders, black marketers, illegal occupants of houses and other evil elements. The government also shuts down 12 ration shops for illegal trading. Due to mindless hoarding by a certain group of businessmen, prices of essential goods have skyrocketed in recent times.
