AFTER 1,128 DAYS, **SORIANO MAKES TEARFUL RETURN**

Villarreal captain Bruno Soriano revealed he considered retirement after making an emotional comeback following more than three years on the sidelines. Not since May 2017 had Soriano played a game for his boyhood club -- two operations and a painful recovery leaving the 36-year-old out of action. But after 1,128 days without football, Soriano finally returned in the 88th minute of Monday's 2-2 La Liga draw at home to Sevilla. "It's been so long since I played that I almost don't know what to say," a tearful Soriano told Movistar post-match. "I'm very happy, of course. I had tried to return many times and it wasn't possible." Asked if he had ever considered retirement, Soriano replied: "There were some tough times where I thought that maybe the best thing was to stop, because there had been many disappointments in a row. But now I'm going to try to help the team."



BCB more worried by halt than finances

Bangladesh The Cricket Board (BCB) and New Zealand Cricket (NZC) vesterday

decided to postpone the Kiwis' two-test tour of the country, originally scheduled for August-September as part of the World Test Championship, due to the coronavirus pandemic.

There has been no cricketing activity in Bangladesh since mid-March and New Zealand's tour is the second home series - and fourth overall - to be postponed after Australia's scheduled June tour was also deferred.

Earlier, the second Test against Pakistan in Karachi scheduled in April and the Ireland and UK tour in May were also postponed for the same reason while the Tigers' tour of Sri Lanka in July-August is still in doubt.

The spread of coronavirus in the country has been getting worse, with the number of confirmed cases being 115,786 and deaths rising to 1,502 as of yesterdav.

The postponement of the two home series will certainly have an impact on the BCB financially. However according to BCB CEO Nizamuddin Chowdhury the board is more concerned about the cricketing aspect than the financial losses due to the pandemic.

Officials said that the BCB has the financial capability to continue operations for the next

finance committee chairman Ismail Haider Mallick echoed those sentiments and said that the board was not worried about losses but are more concerned with the halt in proceedings.

"To be honest we were not supposed to generate significant revenue through these two home series. Yes, there will be losses from the jersey and title sponsors and other areas, which is not huge if we talk about revenue generating. We are more concerned about the cricketing aspect, where we missed out on two crucial home series against Australia and New Zealand. From the cricketing perspective it is a huge blow for our cricket. Our main aim at the moment is to find ways to return to cricket keeping all the safety measures and also follow ICC's guidelines, Mallick said.

When it comes to generating revenue for the BCB, the majority comes from the ICC, which includes the participation money in global events. The upcoming ICC T20 World Cup which is scheduled to start from October this year in Australia is also under a huge cloud of doubt. If the T20 World Cup is also postponed for the pandemic, it will then surely have a substantial financial impact on all the cricket boards in the world, including the BCB.

Djokovic, too, tests positive for Covid-19

Novak Djokovic, the men's world number one tennis player, has tested positive for COVID-19, the Serbian said in a statement on Tuesday.

Borna Coric, Grigor Dimitrov and Viktor Troicki have previously tested positive after playing in Djokovic's Adria Tour exhibition tournament in the Balkan region. "The moment we arrived in Belgrade we went to be

tested," the 33-year-old said, adding that he was not showing symptoms. "My result is positive, just as Jelena's (wife), while the results of our children are negative. "I am extremely sorry for each individual case of

infection. I hope that it will not complicate anyone's health situation and that everyone will be fine. I will remain in self-isolation for the next 14 days, and repeat the test in

'Don't expect great football'



Serie A teams are facing a trip into the unknown and fans should not expect great football between now SERIE A and the end of season, Juventus coach Maurizio Sarri said after his side's 2-0 win at Bologna.

HC order over **DDFA** election stayed

A chamber judge of the Supreme Court yesterday stayed a High Court order that stayed Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF)'s election-postponement letter to Dhaka Divisional Football Association.

"The order we got from the High Court on June 10 has been stayed for 16 weeks by the chamber judge following an appeal from the BFF. The attorney general moved for the football federation," said lawyer Khurshed Alam Khan, who moved for petitioner Shaheenul Hossain Bhuiyan. "We told the court that country's football has been held

hostage by three persons. "Now the letter of BFF issued on March 10 to Dhaka

divisional football association will remain in force," Khan said. "We will seek to vacate the order but it is only possible in regular court, not in virtual court."

A high court bench, on June 10, stayed the operation of BFF's 'impugned letter' for 30 days while show-causing the BFF president and general secretary asking why the 'impugned letter' should not be declared illegal after Shaheenul, the newly-elected president of Dhaka DFA, filed a virtual writ petition the previous day.

Often accused of focussing entirely on the shorter formats, the 40-year-old encouraged youngsters to strive to play Tests. "Test cricket allows you to test your skills and mental toughness...Just be dedicated, enjoy what you do. Even if it's not within the sport, there's always something in open out there for you," Gayle said. "So, if one thing doesn't work, always remember there's another opportunity for you. So please don't be heartbroken if you are cricketer and don't make within the cricketing arena."
