Govt allocates Tk 46.63cr for teachers, staff

Aims to ease their financial hardship during pandemic

The government has doled out a package to tide over about one lakh teachers and staffers of non-government schools and colleges that are outside the purview of the monthly pay order (MPO) scheme.

Many non-MPO teachers and staffers have not received any salary since the government closed down all educational institutions on March 17 to stem the spread of Covid-19.

"Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has granted a special allocation of Tk 46.63 crore for providing financial assistance to 80,747 teachers and 25,038 staff who are outside the purview of MPO facilities," Deputy Education Minister Mohibul Hassan Chowdhoury told The Daily Star vesterday.

He said the list of teachers and staff was prepared by the district administrations and that the fund has already been disbursed to the district deputy commissioners.

So far, this is a one-time grant, Mohibul said, adding, "We may have more depending on the overall Covid-19 situation".

Each teacher will receive Tk 5,000 under this package, while a staffer will get Tk 2,500.

MP Shahid imprisoned for 21 days in Kuwait

attorney of Kuwait has decided keep Bangladeshi lawmaker Mohammad Shahid Islam, accused of money laundering, human trafficking, visa trading and bribery, incarcerated for 21 days, reports the Arab Times.

It said the public prosecutor decided to continue the imprisonment of the remaining accused and to release the owner of a company on bail of 2,000 dinars.

Earlier, Kuwait public prosecution approached the Central Bank of Kuwait to freeze the bank accounts of Shahid and his company Marafie Kuwaitia.

Informed sources had stated that the financial balance of the company amounts to about 5 million dinars, including 3 million as company's capital.

UGC again urges public univs to ensure online edn

The University Grants Commission has urged the public universities to ensure online education for the third time to avoid possible session jams for Covid-19

A top UGC official made the call in a virtual meeting with vice-chancellors of public universities that held vesterday

In response, almost all the vicechancellors agreed with the decision.

Talking to The Daily Star, UGC Chairman Prof Kazi Shahidullah s "They [public university VCs] agreed that they would try their best to introduce online classes on their capacities."

The authorities of public universities would take online classes to cover up their syllabus and negate the possibilities of session jams.

"Exams and practical classes will take place after normalcy returns," Shahidullah

This is the third time UGC urged all public universities to introduce online classes. Previously, UGC made the same call on March 23 and April 30.

CABINET DECIDES TO RENT OUT ABANDONED PROPERTIES The cabinet meets today for several hours. The flood situation in the country deteriorates as two new districts -- Mymensingh and Narayanganji -- go under water. Heavy rains and onrush from Assam reach these low-lying areas following inundation of most of Sylhet. Bangladesh Water Development Board fears that the flood situation may deteriorate further as all major rivers in the country are gradually swelling and the water level in Padma and Brahmaputra are close to dangerous levels.

3 robbers killed in 'gunfight' with cops

Three robbers were killed and another was injured in a "gunfight" with police following a robbery incident in Feni's Daganbhuiyan upazila early yesterday.

The robbers also murdered a night guard before the "gunfight" took place at Bekerbazar in the upazila.

The three robbers have Matobbar, 45, Babul Molla, 40, of Barguna district, and Md Bidyut, 32, of Naogaon district, while the night guard was Abdul Mannan, 40, of Ashrafpur village.

Police seized a pipe gun, two sharp knives and a truck loaded with looted items from the place.

Nasa prepares to fly helicopter on Mars

Nasa has announced how it plans to fly a helicopter on Mars in an attempt to prove that powered-flight is possible on another planet.

The Ingenuity Mars Helicopter will launch from Earth this summer attached to the belly of the Perseverance rover as part of the space agency's next mission to Mars.

After landing on Mars on 18 February 2021, the helicopter will then need to safely detach and navigate the 5-inch journey from the rover to the surface of Mars before attempting lift off.

WHO warns of global shortage of oxygen

Says virus resurging in Europe as restrictions ease; cases set to top 10m

The world faces a shortage of oxygen concentrators as the number of worldwide cases of coronavirus infection nears the 10 million mark, the World Health Organization head said.

'Many countries are now experiencing difficulties obtaining oxygen concentrators," WHO Director General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus told a news conference on Wednesday. "Demand is currently outstripping supply.

The new coronavirus has hit 9.3 million people and killed more than 480,000 so far and is rising by about 1 million cases per week. This has pushed oxygen demand to 88,000 large cylinders per day, or 620,000 cubic metres of oxygen, Tedros said.

The sudden rise has created a dearth of oxygen concentrators needed to support breathing of Covid-19 patients suffering from respiratory distress.

The health agency has purchased 14,000 oxygen concentrators from manufacturers and plans to send them to 120 countries in coming weeks, Tedros said. A further 170,000 concentrators - valued at some \$100 million - will be potentially available over the next six months.

WHO's regional director for Europe Hans Kluge said Europe has seen a surge of cases

since countries began easing restrictions.

"Last week, Europe saw an increase in weekly cases for the first time in months, Kluge told reporters yesterday. He warned that health systems in some European countries would once again be pushed to the brink.

But the number of new cases in Europe is dwarfed by the Americas, where Brazil and the United States recorded almost 80,000 infections between them on Wednesday.

While some US states have moved to re-impose lockdowns, Brazilian expert Domingos Alves warned that his country was sending people "to the slaughterhouse" by reopening its economy too soon.

Governments are still struggling to balance public health needs of fighting a virus that has infected almost 10 million people and killed almost 500,000 with the damage that lockdown measures are doing to their economies.

TEARS OF JOY' France reopened the Eiffel Tower to tourists vesterday after three months of closure because of the coronavirus, ramping up attempts to return to normality.

A few dozen mostly French tourists braved scorching heat in Paris to climb the Eiffel Tower's iron stairs as the lifts were deemed too small for social distancing.
