Allah Malik Kazemi dies from Covid-19

The change management adviser of Bangladesh Bank (BB) died from Covid-19



Allah Malik Kazemi breathed his last at 5pm, while being treated at the capital's Evercare Hospital, said Abul Kalam Azad, a general manager and assistant spokesperson of the central bank.

Kazemi, also a former deputy governor of the central bank, had been undergoing treatment at the hospital for the last few days, after he tested Covid-19 positive.

He had started working as an adviser after his retirement from the institution in 2008.

Kazemi, who made a name for himself at home and abroad for his outstanding skills in framing monetary policy, is the second BB official who fell victim to Covid-19, after BB Joint Director Sheikh Farid Uddin.

Muhammed Aziz Khan, former caretaker government adviser Rasheda K Choudhury, and BGMEA president Dr Rubana Huq. Cosmos Foundation Executive Director Nahar Khan delivered concluding remarks.

Aziz Khan said there will be huge opportunities for Bangladesh in the post-Covid-19 scenario that the country needs

The prominent entrepreneur said there is shortage both in global demand and supply, and this will encourage other countries to supply to Bangladesh and also take goods from the country.

"Bangladesh will be in a much stronger position to negotiate with the importers of garments which is a basic goods," he added. "We will have the possibility to have better contracts."

Describing different infrastructural development projects in the country, Aziz Khan said Bangladesh now generates 20,000 MW of electricity, while Padma Bridge and three ports are coming up, which will connect the country with the rest of the world.

He said Bangladesh's largest import is energy and its cost will be halved in the post-COVID-19 era. "This means if we have to spend \$4 billion now, we will need only \$2 billion in the post-Covid era. So, I see the biggest opportunity in this regard," he

GEOPOLITICAL IMPACTS

Prof Haider Khan said Bangladesh needs to keep friendly relationship both in rhetoric and in practice with its neighbouring countries.

But Bangladesh also needs to practise time-honoured and strategic good relationship on the move which is called "balancing". Bangladesh needs to maintain good relationship with balancing powers such as the US and the EU, but also China as an emerging power, he said

DIGITAL DIVIDE

Renowned educationist and social activist Rasheda K Chowdhury signaled five major consequences for the education sector, including large scale dropouts, amid disruption of educational activities due to the pandemic. She also sought a comprehensive recovery plan for the education sector, one that involves teachers.

Apart from the possibility of large scale dropouts, she also mentioned a possible concurrent increase in child labour, or early marriage for girls which will consequently increase early pregnancy and increase malnutrition.

She noted that the government has been trying four methods to reduce learning loss after the closure of educational institutes during the pandemic --- televised lessons, online courses, radio broadcast, and delivering education through mobile devices.

Students and faculty members of Daffodil International University (DIU) are benefitting from online teaching and learning using the "Blended Learning Center (BLC) platform during the pandemic, said a press release.

sales of these cards, two months after the drive, which is alarming. We are trying to get information and complaints so that we can take action against those who are selling these cards and cheating people," added the executive magistrate.

Sheikh Muhammad Shamim, assistant commissioner of Ramna Division of Police, who was also present during the operation alongside Fariba, said police learnt about the resurgence of these cards on different online platforms, and cybercrime teams are working to take action against those responsible.

According to reports of different international media, different countries including Hong Kong, Vietnam, Thailand and the USA already banned the sale of these cards.

Contacted, Prof Dr Mujibur Rahman, head of the medicine department at Dhaka Medical College, said these types of cards are a new technique to fool people.

There is no scientific evidence that these cards can disinfect someone's surroundings and keep the virus away, he added.

According to law enforcers, due to rising demand of medical equipment in the market to contain the spread of Covid-19, some unscrupulous people are trying to make easy money by selling different fake products including masks, hand-rubs and sanitisers.

killing her on the spot. Police has recovered the body and sent it to Jhenidah Sadar Hospital morgue for an autopsy, the official said.




