## US hits record daily cases

Much of the Western world is pressing is largely driven by certain types ahead with lifting restrictions on daily life despite warnings from health officials that haste could cost more

"We are facing a serious problem in certain areas," leading US immunologist Anthony Fauci said at the first briefing in two months by the White House's Coronavirus Task

"The only way we're going to end it is by ending it together," he said of the outbreak.

The US is recording more than 30,000 cases daily. With nearly 125,000 lives lost, it has by far the highest confirmed death toll in the

Texas had been among the most aggressive states in easing curbs but its strategy has backfired with the nation's second most populous state seeing several daily records in the number of new infections.

"It is clear that the rise in cases activities, including Texans congregating in bars," Governor Greg Abbott said.

European diplomats said they planned to exclude the US from travel to the continent when the bloc's external frontier reopens on July 1.

EU envoys have argued on drawing up criteria and sources told AFP a meeting on Friday ended with a tentative list of about 18 countries free to travel.

With nations around the world at different stages on the outbreak curve, agreeing on "travel corridors" has proved tricky.

Britain said it will lift its two-week quarantine rule for visitors arriving from some "low-risk" countries after pressure from airlines. Sweden lashed out at the World

Health Organization for listing it among countries deemed at-risk. The country made headlines for its high death toll after opting not to introduce a strict lockdown.

"We have an increase in cases because we have begun testing much more in Sweden the past week," said Swedish state epidemiologist Anders Tegnell.

Much of the global count has come from Latin America, where Brazil, the hardest-hit nation in the region, has logged almost 55,000 deaths and more than 1.2 million cases.

With much of the world under

Iran's Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei warned the country's economic problems will worsen if the virus spreads unchecked, saying the initial momentum to contain it had since "waned".

The Islamic republic has struggled to curb the outbreak since it reported its first cases in the Shia holy city of Qom in February.

It shut down non-essential businesses, closed schools and cancelled public events in March, but the government gradually lifted restrictions from April to try to reopen the country's sanctions-hit economy.

Egypt lifted many of its restrictions yesterday while continuing to apply certain precautionary measures. The religious endowments ministry reopened mosques as churches prepared to receive worshipers once

# Ethiopia says on track to fill mega-dam as AU pushes for deal

Ethiopia said yesterday it was on schedule to begin filling a controversial mega-dam on the Blue Nile River within weeks but vowed to try resolving its dispute with downstream neighbours Egypt and Sudan.

The statement from Prime Minister Abiv Ahmed's office undercut claims made Friday evening by Egypt and Sudan, whose leaders said Ethiopia had agreed to delay filling the dam's reservoir until an agreement was reached.

The Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam (GERD), set to be Africa's largest hydroelectric project, has been a source of tension in the Nile basin ever since Ethiopia broke ground on it nearly a decade ago.

Ethiopia says the project is essential for its development, while Egypt and Sudan worry about access to vital water supplies from the Nile. Addis Ababa has been vocal about its

plans to start filling the reservoir in July, nd Abiy faces intense domestic political pressure to stick to that timeline. The leaders of all three countries

spoke Friday evening on a call convened by South African President Cyril Ramaphosa, the current chair of the African Union (AU) But while Sudan and Egypt said

afterwards that Ethiopia had agreed to hold off on filling the reservoir as negotiations continued, Ethiopia's statement yesterday made no mention of a delay. "Ethiopia is scheduled to begin

filling the GERD within the next two weeks, during which the remaining construction work will continue," the statement said. "It is in this period, that the three

countries have agreed to reach a final

agreement on a few pending matters."

Trilateral talks on the dam resumed earlier this month, with the biggest sticking points concerning how to operate the dam during periods of drought and how to resolve disputes.

Diplomatic sources said this week that the United Nations Security Council planned to meet Monday to discuss objections to the dam raised by Egypt and Sudan.

Ethiopia has been wary about the role of outside parties ever since talks involving the US Treasury Department broke down in February and Abiy's government accused Washington of favouring Egypt.

Ethiopia criticised Egypt for detailing its grievances over the dam in a May letter to the UN Security Council -- a move it described as a bad faith attempt to "exert external diplomatic pressure".
