Rain, river swelling cause floods

Crops damaged in several districts; Met office warns of more downpour

STAR REPORT

Incessant rainfall coupled with the onrush of water in rivers from upstream has triggered flash floods in different regions across the country.

People of flood-hit regions are going through difficulties as their households have been submerged. Farmers are fearing big losses as a vast area of farmland have been inundated, damaging crops.

Administrative officials concerned said that they have sufficient relief materials for the victims.

Meanwhile, the Bangladesh Meteorological Department forecast that light to moderate rainfall is likely to occur in many parts of the country today.

In Lalmonirhat, some fresh areas were inundated by floodwater yesterday.

The water of the Teesta river was flowing above 15cm above the danger level at Hatibandha's Teesta barrage point yesterday morning, said Abdul Quader, subdivisional engineer of Lalmonirhat of Bangladesh Water Development Board (BWDB).

Over 1.5 lakhs people have been stranded in more than 100 villages of five upazilas in the district, according to

Many people have taken shelter on roads and safe high places with their livestock and essentials.

2 'NIDs' for 72 names!

Irregularities have been found in government cash assistance lists for tea workers in Moulvibazar, with fake NID numbers used multiple times.

The Department of Social Services recently gave a Tk 5,000 cheque each to 2,113 tea workers of 22 tea gardens in Kamalgani upazila of Moulvibazar, under a government programme to improve impoverished tea workers' living

On June 6, 601 workers of Shamshernagar, Kanıhatı, Deocnnara, Baghichhara and Doublechhara tea gardens received their cheques, which were distributed by a local lawmaker of Moulvibazar.

On examining the lists, however, 72 workers' names in Shamshernagar and Kanihati tea gardens were found against the numbers of two national identity cards

Workers' representatives also said the list included names of those who are not even tea garden workers.

In the years after the assassination of Julius Caesar in ancient Rome, historical accounts paint a picture of unusual cold, food shortages, disease and famine that accompanied a pivotal moment in Western history.

Historians had long suspected that this unexplained extreme weather could be linked to a volcanic eruption, but they had been unable to pinpoint where or when such an eruption had occurred or how severe it was. Candidates had included volcanoes in Nicaragua, Sicily and Kamchatka in Russia's Far East.

80 homes, shops gutted in Bandarban

US hits record daily cases

Top virus expert warns Americans facing 'serious problem' in certain areas; India passes 500,000 cases

America's top infectious diseases expert has warned the United States is facing a "serious problem" from a resurgent coronavirus as the illness puts the brakes on reopening two of the country's largest states.

Texas and Florida closed bars and re-imposed other curbs on Friday as the number of infections in the US hit a single-day record with increases in 16 states, mostly in the south and west.

The contagion also continued its march through Latin America, where Brazil recorded another 1,140 deaths and Argentina toughened a lockdown in the capital Buenos

India now has more than 500,000 confirmed cases, according to government figures that show a record daily leap of 18,500 new infections.

"Unlike China, where the pandemic was relatively more concentrated around Wuhan and a few other cities, India has a more diffused spread that makes it a bit more challenging for the healthcare system," said Anant Bhan, a leading public health expert

India may see several peaks in coming months because the spread of the virus "is variable across the country", he

In Europe countries wrangled over plans to partially reopen the EU border, with officials fretting over the reliability of virus data from abroad, notably China, where Covid-19 first emerged late last year.
