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COMMITTEES TO TACKLE PANDEMIC

Too much hype, little outcome

Many of the committees hardly effective; their recommendations often ignored

The committees formed by the government to help it make policy decisions to put the brakes on the pandemic have not been working properly or their recommendations were ignored.

Since March, when the country started experiencing a gradual rise in the number of coronavirus cases, the government formed several "highpowered" and national-level committees to advise the government on how to stop the spread of the disease while others were tasked with implementing the decisions.

Many of the committees barely convened any meeting or they saw their recommendations ignored. The lack of coordination among the committees and among the government's implementing agencies made the situation worse.

But the government formed even more committees to plug the holes. Meanwhile, new cases kept multiplying.

"We have a law enacted in 2018 regarding pandemic [Infectious Disease (Prevention, Control and Elimination) Act, 2018] ...," said Prof Muzaherul Huq, former regional adviser, WHÓ, South East Asia Region.

Virus cases cross 150,000-mark

Country sees new daily record of 4,019 infections; 38 die

The number of Covid-19 patients in the country surged past the 1.5 lakh-mark as 4,019 new cases of infections were reported yesterday, so far the highest in a single day.

On the 116th day since the first case was confirmed on March 8, the total number reached 1,53,277.

Covid-19 cases had passed the 50,000mark on June 1 and crossed the grim milestone of one lakh-mark on June 18. It means more than a half lakh new cases were reported in the 14 days alone.

Previously, the single-day record number of new cases -- 4,008 -- were reported on

As weird as it gets

MINTU DESHWARA, back from Habigan

Sunui Ullah, Eshrak Mia, and Jamal Mia are the husbands of Mohesh Sarkar, Subol Sarkar and Kali Kanto Sarkar, respectively -at least that's what a list of beneficiaries for a government food programme shows.

The list with 1,185 names was prepared in 2016 by Gajnaipur Union Parishad in Habiganj's Nobiganj upazila and then approved by the upazila food officer and upazila nirbahi officer (UNO).

The title on the third column of the list makes it look like all the beneficiaries, whether male or female, have husbands.

Not just this, the list also includes names of dead and non-existent people. Yet, it has been used in Gajnaipur union for the last

The ultra-poor people on this list from Gajnaipur's 33 villages are supposed to receive 30kg of OMS (open market sale) rice at Tk 10 per kg four to five times a year under the government's food-friendly programme.

DEAD ON THE LIST

Hamdu Mia of Gajnaipur's Kandigaon village died in 2014, but is still on the list at serial number 420.
