CRIME RISING AMID PANDEMIC **Cops blame** joblessness, income drop

After a sharp fall in crime rate during the first few days of coronavirus pandemic, crimes like theft, robbery and mugging have recently taken an upward turn.

Police said it was because of the job losses and the decline in earnings of low-income people during the outbreak

Many of these people have resorted to criminal activities to make a living.

For example, Apel Mahmud, 27, was a street hawker of clothes and seasonal fruits. But he lost his only source of income after the virus hit the country.

A few days later, he started making his wife lure people over the phone into antisocial activities.

When anyone walked into the trap, they would rip him off by confining and torturing him.

Apel allegedly killed a man named Sayed Nagar and dumped the body on June 24 as the latter tried to escape without paying the money.

On July 12, police arrested the couple and one of their accomplices Abdur Rakib, 22, said Mashiur Rahman, deputy commissioner of detective branch (DB) of police.

In a separate incident, DB police arrested a CNG-run autorickshaw driver Shafiqul Islam and his associate Siddique from the capital's 300-feet area.

They were allegedly involved in a mugging gang that used to rob passengers on empty roads during night-time, police said.

Israfil Alam MP no more UNB, Dhaka

Md Israfil Alam Awam League lawmaker fro Naogaon-6,

died at a city hospital yesterday. He was 54.

He was undergoing treatment at Square Hospitals with breathing problems. He passed away around 6:20am.

The lawmaker had tested positive and then negative for coronavirus this month.

Israfil was admitted to the hospital for the second time on July 17 as he started coughing up blood, said his wife Sultana Pervin Beauty.

He was put on life support on Friday as his condition deteriorated, she said.

According to Pervin, Israfil was infected with novel coronavirus and was admitted to the hospital on July 6.

He returned home on July 14 as his follow-up test report came out negative for Covid-19.

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Flood worsens along key rivers

Flood situation in some districts worsened yesterday as a number of rivers were flowing above the danger marks.

Fresh areas in a few regions have been inundated after embankments collapsed by the floodwater.

In Tangail, the overall flood situation was further deteriorated yesterday as the major rivers were swelling rapidly. Over five lakh people are affected by the devastating flood.

Four people, including three children, have so far been drowned in the district.

The Jamuna was flowing 85cm above the danger level yesterday, while the Dhaleswari and the Jhenai rivers were flowing 163cm and 102cm respectiv above the danger level, sources in Water Development Board said. Many of the flood affected people have taken shelter on the roads and embankment under the open sky. They are suffering from acute shortage of foods and safe drinking water.

260 agri ministry employees infected Five died from Covid-19;

A total of 260 employees of the agriculture ministry and its subordinate offices have been infected with Covid-19 and five of them have died, a PID handout said vesterday.

Diplomatic moves are underway to use Bangabandhu's visit in London as an opportunity to begin normalising relations between Bangladesh and Pakistan. Anthony Royle, undersecretary at the British foreign office, hands over a message to Bangabandhu from British Prime Minister Edward Heath. Meanwhile, Bangladesh Foreign Secretary Enayet Karim, who arrived with Bangabandhu, called on Sutherland, head of the South Asia Department at the British foreign office. It is understood the British side tells Enayet that British Foreign Secretary Sir Alex Douglas Hume would be glad to meet Bangabandhu in London and do anything possible to assist in restoring normal relations in the Indian subcontinent.

World comes to grips with 2nd Covid-19 wave

Nations in Asia impose new curbs

Nations in Asia imposed new restrictions yesterday and an abrupt British quarantine on travellers from Spain threw Europe's summer reopening into disarray, as the world confronted the prospect of a second wave of Covid-19 infections.

Surges were reported in a number of countries previously singled out as places where the virus was under control.

Australia recorded a record daily rise. Vietnam locked down the city of Danang, forcing the evacuation of tens of thousands of visitors. Mainland China confirmed the most new locally transmitted cases since early March. Papua New Guinea shut its borders.

Hong Kong banned gatherings of more than two people, closed down restaurant dining and introduced mandatory face masks in public places, including outdoors, fearing a possible third wave there.

Just weeks after European countries trumpeted the reopening of tourism, a surge in infections in Spain prompted Britain to order all travellers from there to quarantine for two weeks, torpedoing the travel plans of hundreds of thousands of people.

Officials in some of the European and Asian countries where the virus is again spreading say new outbreaks will not be as bad as the original waves that hit earlier this year, and can be contained with local measures rather than nationwide shutdowns.

But countries that have suffered extreme economic hardship from months of lockdowns are also determined not to let the virus get out of control again, even if that SEE PAGE 10 COL 1

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
