Only 10 percent buses of their fleet were in operation after public transport resumed operation after three months, Sattar said.

"We thought the situation will change ahead of Eid. But people's movement is very thin even two or three days before Eid," he added.

SUFFERING AT FERRY TERMINALS

Homebound people to the southwestern region of the country are facing hassles, as authorities are failing to operate most ferries on Shimulia-Kathalbari route due to strong current in river Padma, which washed away a pontoon of Shimulia ferry terminal on Tuesday.

As a result, many are taking the alternative Paturia-Dauladia route, resulting in huge pressure of vehicles there and causing tailback of waiting

Shib Pada Dey, a private service holder, started from Dhaka in the morning in his private car with his family to go to village home in Bagerhat. "We reached Shimulia terminal around 7am and were able to cross the river after 3pm," he told The Daily Star yesterday.

A staffer of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Corporation (BIWTC) said the swollen Padma washed away the third and busiest pontoon of Shimulia ferry terminal and a portion of the approach road on Tuesday.

As a result, ferry service in the route was disrupted and Ro-Ro ferry service was suspended on Tuesday. "Bus, today [Wednesday], 10 out of 16 ferries were operating. But its taking almost double time due to strong currents, he told this correspondent, wishing not be named.

As a result, Paturia-Dauladia route is facing pressure of increasing number of vehicles, Zillur Rahman, BIWTC deputy general manager at the terminal, told The Daily Star vesterday.

"There was pressure of vehicles till 2pm today. But there is no big pressure now," he told this correspondent around 6pm yesterday.

He said they are operating 15 ferries now but all ferries are taking more time than the usual due to strong current on the river he said.

TRAIN AND LAUNCH

Alamgir Kabir, joint director of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) at Sadarghat Launch Terminal said the number of passengers at the terminal yesterday was less than normal.

He said 80 to 90 launches usually left the terminal daily during the normal time, while 82 launches left Dhaka on Tuesday. "However, the number is likely to increase tomorrow [Thursday] after

authorities announced closure of RMG factories," he told The Daily Star. Meanwhile, Bangladesh Railway is operating only 17 intercity trains with

50 percent of the passenger capacity. As all tickets were sold out online and people without tickets were not allowed to travel, there was not pressure of passengers at railway stations, sources said.

customers are being

asked to maintain strict health guidelines as the coronavirus pandemic is yet to dissipate. In this regard, cautionary signs and guidelines have been put up across the markets.

Yet, while visiting the markets in the city such as Rupatoli, Baghia, Port Road cattle markets in the last couple of days, this correspondent found most buyers, sellers, and visitors completely ignoring the regulations. Rather than wearing masks and maintaining distance, people were seen huddling in and commuting in

Yunus Ali, a lessee at a cattle market, acknowledged that regulations are completely flouted at the markets. "The administration should be stricter to prevent these violations, he said.

Contacted, ASM Ajiur Rahman, deputy commissioner of Barishal, said, "We have instructed the lessees to maintain health regulations, but they are not following the directions properly. We will ensure strict monitoring at the markets with the help of law enforcers.

Cattle markets | Farmers worried

If buyers from other deficit districts do not take animals from them, many farmers would be in trouble.

Besides, sale will not be as expected, as the economic condition of rural and urban people is bad due to the pandemic and floods. "Ten percent of the cattle are expected to remain unsold," said an official

Farmers said many of them could not sell their animals last year, possibly due to a similar surplus.

Rafiqul Islam, a farmer from Dinajpur Sadar upazila, said he started rearing six bulls eight months ago, investing a huge amount of money. Recently, potential buyers saw the bulls over video-call.

The buyers offered Tk 3.5 lakh for all six bulls, but Rafiqul said he would incur a loss if they are not sold for Tk 5 lakh at least. "Everything, including fodder, is expensive now."

Similarly, Rezwanul Haq, owner of a farm "Livestock Complex" in Rangpur city, said he has 15 cows for sale and would face losses if each one is sold below Tk 60,000. "I spent Tk 3,000 daily just to rear the cows for the last five months.

He came across several customers but the price they offered is terrible, he said.

Finding no other option, Saiful Islam, another farmer living in the city, sold his cow at a cheap price, after estimating that further delays to sell it can bring losses.

Most farmers said they are getting overwhelming response online, but the prices offered is frustrating. Hence, farmers are displaying their cattle in the markets, risking their health.

Similar comments came from several farmers from other districts -- including Thakurgaon, Nilphamari and Kurigram. Most markets in Dinajpur were overcrowded, with little care about maintaining social distancing and wearing masks. There are 60 markets in the district's 13 upazilas.

Dr Habibul Haq, deputy director of Divisional Livestock Department in Rangpur, said there will be no shortage of cattle in these districts. All steps have been taken to ensure profitability through the online marketplace. Lumpy Skin Disease would not affect sale, he said.

KM Tarigul Islam, divisional commissioner of Rangpur Police Range, said they have taken comprehensive measures to ensure security at 400 cattle markets.

Take steps

On the other hand, those in-charge of the markets tried to avoid responsibility and blame traders. Mohammad Hanif, in-charge of maintaining health guidelines at Sadeque Hossain Khoka cattle market, said they requested traders to follow the guidelines but to no avail.

He also said they will take necessary steps to aware traders through loudspeakers and set up a hand wash facility by tonight (yesterday night). At Kachukhet market, only a handful of buyers and traders were seen wearing masks and maintaining distance.

Shamim Al Razi, a veterinary surgeon at the market, said as the place was small, maintaining physical distance was quite difficult.

WARNINGS FELL ON DEAF EARS

Dr Md Shahidullah, president of NTAC, told The Daily Star if city corporations arrange cattle markets in Dhaka, Chattogram, Gazipur and Narayanganj, rate of infection, which is now stable, will increase after Eid.

The committee suggested not to set up markets in the four cities because 76 percent of Covid-19 cases are from there. He suggested running online markets and strictly maintaining health guidelines.

As Covid-19 is not yet under control, the committee, in its 14th meeting, suggested implementing strict control in Dhaka and nearby areas.

NTAC's seven-point suggestion regarding cattle markets include not setting up markets inside towns; setting up in open spaces; not allowing entry to the elderly or sick; having separate entry and exit paths; and sacrificing cattle at fixed locations instead of at home.

Contacted, Rasel Sabrin, chief estate officer of Dhaka South City Corporation, said they are trying to maintain and ensure health guidelines at the markets. "We have also set up mobile courts in this regard."

When informed about the health regulations being flouted as seen by these correspondents, he said they will double their efforts to make sure such irregularities do not take place anymore.
