

Road crashes kill nine

At least nine people were killed and around 12 injured in road accidents in four districts during the last two days, report our correspondents.
Three people, including a police officer, were killed in separate accidents in Chattogram yesterday.
In the port city, Ehsanul Haque (27), a probationary sub-inspector hailing from Cox's Bazar's Ukhiya upazila, was killed after a bus rammied into his motorbike at Mariners' Road around 11:15am, said Mohammad Mohsin, officer-in-charge (OC) of Kotwali Police Station.
In Lohagara, two bus passengers were killed and 10 injured, as the bus collided with a truck in front of Bara Awliya Degree College around 7:30am, said OC Yasir Arafat of Dohazari Highway Police Station.
The deceased are Md Shawkat (27) and Mostafizur Rahman (27), he said.
The injured were treated at the upazila health complex, he added.
In Gaibandha, madrasa teacher Md Achir Uddin (55) and his son Zabayar (14) died after their motorbike crashed into a microbus at Tarof Kamal Shiyalagara area in Gobindaganj upazila around 10am.
Quoting witnesses, Md Afzal Hossain, inspector (investigation) of Gobindaganj Police Station, said Achir was taking his son home from a madrasa when the accident occurred.
Locals rescued them immediately and took them to the upazila health complex,

where the doctor pronounced them dead, he said.
Police seized the microbus but its driver managed to flee, he added.
In Gopalganj, three family members were killed and two injured, after their rented car hit a roadside railing on Dhaka-Khulna highway in Kashiani upazila around 4am yesterday.
The deceased are Ziaur Mollah (55), Emdadul Haque (25) and Sajjad Mollah (35).
Quoting locals, OC Ataur Rahman of Bhangra Highway Police Station said Emdadul, a Singapore returnee, his father Ziaur, brother-in-law Sajjad and a friend, had rented a car from Dhaka airport to go to their home village.
The injured, including the driver, were admitted to Gopalganj General Hospital.
In Kurigram, Limon Islam (6), a child with speech impairment, was killed after a battery-run auto-rickshaw hit him at Phulbari upazila on Wednesday.
Son of Abdur Rahman of the upazila, Limon succumbed to his injuries at Lalmonirhat Sadar Hospital around 10pm while undergoing treatment, said officer-in-charge Rajib Kumar Roy of Phulbari Police Station.
Police said the boy was seriously injured after being hit. Locals rescued and took him to the upazila health complex.
When his condition deteriorated, he was rushed to the Lalmonirhat Sadar Hospital.

Dealer arrested for hoarding TCB goods

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab-14) yesterday arrested a dealer of Trading Corporation of Bangladesh (TCB) for illegally hoarding its goods.
The arrestee is Md Saidul Islam (50) from Phulbaria.
Acting on a tip-off, a Rab-14 team raided Phulbaria's Aziz Oil Mills, arrested Saidul from the spot and recovered the goods.
The goods included 96 sacks of sugar (50kg per sack), 42 sacks of dal (50kg per sack) and 21,162 litres of soybean oil, said Md Tafiqul Alam, senior assistant superintendent of police and Rab-14 media officer.
During primary interrogation, Saidul said he had been storing the goods illegally for a long time to sell them in the black market, said the Rab official.
He was later handed over to Phulbaria Police Station. A case was lodged.

Healthcare sector has collapsed: Fakhrul

BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir has alleged that people do not have confidence in the country's health system anymore, as it has completely collapsed.
"Babu's [Shaful Bari Babu's] death in such a way has exposed that Bangladesh's health system has completely collapsed. His illness and death have also proved that people can't be confident about the system," he said.
The BNP leader made the comment while talking to reporters after visiting the house of Swechhasabak Dal President Shaful Bari Babu, who died on Tuesday.
Fakhrul said the country's health system itself has become a problem for patients, as people do not get proper treatment and authentic diagnosis reports.
"Many asked why the country's people go abroad for treatment. People are forced to, as they can't undergo even proper diagnosis here," he observed.
Termining Babu a talented leader, Fakhrul said, "We can't imagine a popular and conscious leader like Babu leave us in such a way. He had all the qualities to be a big leader."
Fakhrul said Babu left his wife and two children in such a condition that they have no place to take shelter.
"I urge all of our party leaders and activists to extend their helping hand to Babu's family."
The BNP leader came to Babu's rented house in the capital's Eskaton and talked to Babu's wife and children.

Clinker-laden lighter vessel capsizes

A lighter vessel carrying 1,500 tonnes of cement clinker capsized near Hatiya channel after colliding with another vessel yesterday.
All 13 crew of the vessel, MV Tasneha-5, were rescued by a trawler.
After loading imported cement clinkers from a mother vessel at outer anchorage of Chattogram port, Tanesha was heading for Narayanganj, said Md Salim, deputy director (DD) of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority.
The accident occurred when it collided with MV Nilgiri, heading from the same direction, and crack developed at the bottom of Tasneha-5. Its master and managed to take it around half a kilometre away from the channel when it sank.

trafficking is a global threat necessitating global response.
Earl R Miller said fight against the crime requires joint collaboration from government, civil society activists and international organisations.
The fight must involve training law enforcement officials, bringing trafficking in persons (TIP) cases to court, building strong community networks, protecting survivors, and enhancing cooperation between countries to investigate trafficking networks, he added.
The US envoy said Bangladesh's establishing of seven anti-human trafficking tribunals is a "huge step forward" to fight the crime.
On Bangladesh's upgrade from "Tier 2 Watch List" to "Tier 2" in the US State Department's TIP Report 2020, he congratulated all those who fought tirelessly to pursue accountability for traffickers and freedom for the victims.
However, he said the struggle continues, calling upon Bangladesh government to fulfill recommendations made in the TIP report.
The ambassador mentioned four specific recommendations for immediate government actions.
To this end, he mentioned that he and his colleague Ambassador-at-Large John Richmond wrote an op-ed published in The Daily Star on June 26, emphasising the four recommendations.
The US envoy also lauded Bangladesh's effort to fulfill the objectives of the UN Protocol to Prevent, Suppress and Punish Trafficking in Persons, Especially Women and Children, known as the "Palermo Protocol."

"While enquiring, we noticed that they [Faruk and his brothers] are trying to transfer their money. That's why we've asked Bangladesh Bank to freeze all of their accounts," said Meraz to the correspondent.
Specifying an FDR worth Tk 9 crore belonging to Faruk with Prime Bank's Ibrahimpur Branch, ACC asked BFIU to freeze it.
Earlier this month, Director General of Health Services black listed 14 medical equipment supplying farms. Ahmed Enterprise and Anik Traders are among the 14 black listed suppliers.
In 2019, the High Court (HC) ordered ACC to enquire into gross anomalies in the procurement of medical equipment for Faridpur Medical College Hospital (FMCH).
Record shows, in September 2014, M/S Anik Traders, owned by Sazzad and Mamun, was awarded a tender for the procurement of medical equipment for ICU of FMCH.
Anik Traders supplied FMCH the required machines and equipment on December 9 and December 20 of the same year, according to the FIR.
The trader then submitted a bill of Tk 10 crore. This was, however, rejected by the DGHS at the last minute for being "inflated".
MS Anik Traders in June 2017 moved a petition with the High Court against the DGHS for withholding the payment.
After scrutinising the documents submitted by DGHS and Anik Traders, the HC bench found gross anomalies and directed the ACC to launch an investigation.

He said he made Tk 40,000 profit after selling the bulls.
"I was hoping to make more profit and I had to work hard to rear them. But given the situation, I am not complaining. Hopefully, I will make more profit next year."
However, not all traders were as optimistic as Rafiqul, Mohammad Shanto, who reared three bulls for around seven months targeting Eid, said he could sell only one of yesterday. "I sold the bull for Tk 51,500, that too at minimal profit."
Shanto arrived at Kachukhet cattle market three days back.
"The first two days were very frustrating for me as I kept on waiting for buyers to show up. Hopefully, tomorrow [today] being the last day before Eid, more people will come and purchase animals."
A total of 18 cattle markets have been set up in the capital this year,

which is 10 less than last year.
Md Azmal, a trader from Jhenidah who brought 10 cattle to Dhupkhola cattle market, said, "Eighty percent traders in our area did not bring their bulls to the market fearing loss as they heard most people will not sacrifice animals due to financial crisis or coronavirus."
PRICES STILL HIGH
Even though the number of buyers and cattle are both significantly lower this year, prices of animals seem to have gone up, complained city dwellers.
They said the capacity of purchasing sacrificial animals is less this year as many have lost their jobs or faced huge losses in their businesses due to the pandemic.
This newspaper also caught up with Shamsul Islam Khan -- who had initially decided not to sacrifice any animal this year for


Eid, but apparently changed his mind afterwards -- at the cattle market in Kachukhet yesterday morning.
He bought a bull for Tk 60,000, which he thought was at least Tk 10,000 more compared to the one he bought last year.
Md Ridoy, who purchased a bull for Tk 70,000, echoed him.
Many also said they are sacrificing animals by splitting the cost. "I did not get bonus this year... I am sacrificing a bull along with my neighbours this year," said Md Shajahan, a private job holder.
TRADERS WORRIED
With Eid just a day away, many traders are beginning to worry as they were yet to sell their livestock.
"I brought 25 bulls from Faridpur two days back at Sadeque Hossain Khoka cattle market but could not sell any of them yet," said Mohammad Jonay Sheikh.
Monsur Ali, a trader at Aftab

Nagar cattle market, said, "I have a loan of Tk 5 lakh, which I'll have to pay by selling the bulls. If I don't get a good price from the market, I will have to sell those to meat traders after Eid."
Though production of cattle in the country this year is satisfactory, it's reflections was not seen in the markets. Traders now fear if the situation persists, they may have to drop prices drastically so that they could at least sell their cattle and make some money.
Dr Abdul Zabbar Shikdar, director general of the Department of Livestock, told The Daily Star that this year, 1.19 crore cattle have been reared targeting Eid, exceeding last year's demand by 10 lakh.
But the challenge was selling cattle at different markets while maintaining physical distance and following health guidelines, he said.

Charges pressed against Shahed

providing financial aid, to compensate for losses caused by coronavirus in the fisheries and livestock sector.
"Our government will stand beside all small farmers and commercial entrepreneurs by providing them financial incentives, during this pandemic," he said.
