'Please, take us back'

Indians stranded here for months plead to Delhi and West Bengal

Prianka Majumder had planned to stay in Bangladesh for 20 days when she along with her husband and daughter came to the country on March 8 to attend her cousin's wedding in Barishal's Gournadi.

Little did she know that her 20 days in Bangladesh would stretch up to five months with no sign of possibility for immediate return to her country in sight.

The 25-year-old makeup artist from West Bengal's Uttar Chabbis Porgona district has been stuck here all these months with her three-year-old daughter due to the lockdown and travel restrictions imposed for Covid-19 pandemic.

Her husband, however, returned to India on March 14, following media reports that the Indian border with Bangladesh is going to be closed from March 15.

"We [she and her daughter] did not go [with him] as we thought the situation will become normal. We never thought that we'll be stuck here for more than five months," Priakna told The Daily Star.

Priakna called this correspondent first on Saturday night after collecting his mobile phone number from one of her acquaintances. The correspondent again phoned her on Sunday.

"How does it feel to stay in a relative's house for such a long time? My daughter cries every night for her father but I can't help... We want nothing but to go home immediately. It is not possible to live like this," she said, with a cracked voice.

Like Prianka, around 2,500 Indian citizens got stranded SEE PAGE 10 COL 2

COVID-19 VACCINE China grants country's first patent

China's vaccine maker CanSino Biologics Inc has won a patent approval from Beijing for its Covid-19 vaccine candidate Ad5-nCOV, People's Daily reported, citing documents from the country's intellectual property regulator.

The patent was submitted for application on March 18, and was approved on August 11, the report said. It is the first Covid-19 vaccine patent granted by China.

UAE denies entry to 68 Bangladeshi migrants STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Some 68 Bangladeshi expatriates were sent back home from Abu Dhabi International Airport yesterday after they allegedly failed to meet necessary conditions for their immigration clearance.

Officials at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport in Dhaka said the expatriates flew back in a Biman Bangladesh Airlin flight in the morning. Of the 68 passengers, six flew from Bangladesh the previous night and the rest travelled to Abu Dhabi on Friday, he added. An official of Prabashi Kalyan Desk at the airport said he talked to several passengers after their return and they mentioned different reasons for not getting their immigration clearance. Vladimir Putin announced Russia had won the global race to approve a Covid vaccine.

Russia said that the first consignments of its "Sputnik" vaccine had been produced and will be given to healthcare professionals on a voluntary basis.

China's CanSino's vaccine uses a modified common cold virus to carry genetic material from the new coronavirus into the human body, a method also used by the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine.

Both vaccines elicited antibody and T-cell immune responses and neither prompted any serious side effects in early trials. T-cells are an important component

It is reported that price of rice and other essentials commodities have registered a rise during the last fortnight in various parts of Bangladesh. The reasons for the rise in price of rice are attributed to floods and lack of proper communication.

The number was among assets seized and ordered auctioned by a court in Beijing, and an online sale attracted more than five thousand bids between Saturday and Sunday.

S Korea battles worst outbreak in months

Warns of crisis; NZ delays polls amid surge in virus cases

South Korea yesterday warned of a looming novel coronavirus crisis as new outbreaks flared, including one linked to a church where more than 300 members of the congregation have been infected but hundreds more are reluctant to get tested.

The outbreak linked to the Sarang Jeil Church in Seoul is the country's biggest in nearly six months and led to a tightening of social distancing rules on Sunday.

The Korea Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (KCDC) reported 197 new cases as of midnight on Saturday, mostly in the Seoul metropolitan area, marking the fourth day of a three-digit tally.

South Korea has been one of the world's coronavirus mitigation success stories but it has nevertheless battled persistent spikes in infections. The latest cases brought its total infections to 15,515 including 305 deaths.

"We're seeing the current situation as an initial stage of a large-scale transmission," KCDC director Jeong Eunkyeong told a briefing.

"We're facing a crisis where if the current spread isn't controlled, it would bring an exponential rise in cases, which could in turn lead to the collapse of our medical system and enormous economic damage.

The outbreak at the Seoul church has revived fears seen in February when authorities struggled to contain an outbreak that emerged in a secretive Christian sect in the SEE PAGE 10 COL 2
