Hezbollah, Hamas chiefs meet to discuss Israel-Arab ties

Leaders of Lebanon's Hezbollah and the Palestinian Hamas movement, both enemies of Israel, have met to discuss diplomatic normalisation between the Jewish state and Arab countries, a report said yesterday.

They stressed the "stability" of the "axis of resistance" against Israel, the Hezbollah-run Al-Manar TV channel reported, without saying where or when the meeting took place.

confirmed. 'NO NEED TO SEND HER ABROAD'

Health Minister Zahid Maleque yesterday said there is no need to send UNO Wahida abroad for treatment, UNB reports.

"Observing Wahida's condition, it appears she doesn't need to be sent abroad right now. Doctors at the National Institute of Neurosciences and Hospital are taking good care of her. A decision in this regard will be taken later, if needed," said the

The health minister made the observation while talking to reporters at the hospital.

"The 72-hour observation by the doctors at the hospital will end on Monday [today] morning and no symptom of any infection has been reported yet. The patient is undergoing treatment under good management and everything is going well. Everything needed for her treatment will be provided," he said.

The minister went on, saying, "UNO Wahida talked to me and I think her condition is better now. Eight doctors successfully operated on her for two and a half hours and the right side of her injured body is still paralysed. Doctors said it will be cured with physical therapy.

Mutation rate faster

For the BCSIR study released yesterday, data on 263 cases of genome sequencing was collected from areas in eight divisions between May 7 and July 31 this year.

Analysing the data, researchers noticed the presence of variant G614 in all the cases, which is largely responsible for virus transmission in the country.

According to the World Health Organisation, six major types of the novel coronavirus are found across the globe. And of those, four have been found in Bangladesh, said the BCSIR researchers.

VIRUS MUTATION To replicate, a virus uses a host cell where it leaves its genetic elements. This results in millions of copies of the virus in the human body cell.

However, errors can creep in during this process when the virus replicates and such types of incidents are called mutation of the virus.

As a mutation creates new subtypes of the virus, it makes the development

of an effective vaccine or drug against it very difficult.

These different variants also explain why a virus can trigger waves of infections of varying severity in different regions of the world, and why infections can also progress very differently in different people, say researchers.

People in the neighbourhood said hey first noticed signs of gas leakage nearly two months ago.

Mosharaf Hossain, superintendent of police in Narayangani, also a member of the five-member probe body formed by the district administration, said they have already started investigating into the case.

But they are facing difficulties in getting comments from the eyewitnesses as all of them have suffered burn injuries and are undergoing treatment at the hospital.

The ASP, however, said they have started collecting statements from nearby residents and were hopeful to complete the investigation within the

The tragic explosion happened at Pashchim Talla Baitus Salam Mosque of Narayanganj around 8:45pm after Esha prayers on Friday.

State Minister for Management and Relief Dr Md Enamur Rahman said Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina was taking regular updates of the victims.

Maximum efforts are being made to save lives of the burn victims but everyone's condition is alarming, he said after visiting the victims at the institute yesterday.

The minister said the doctors were trying their best to provide treatment of the fire victims admitted at the institute. But unfortunately, almost all the patients are suffering from

inhalation burn, he said. He further said a case was filed in Fatulla Police Station for negligence. Three investigation committees have been formed to investigate the incident and if anyone's negligence is found,

On August 27, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina said, "As the final exams are approaching, we are looking for ways to do what we can. There will be no exams ... we are thinking about what more we can do. Maybe we can

promote without an exam." All educational institutions have been closed since March 17 due to the pandemic. These will remain closed at

least until October 3. Since all schools and other educational institutions have been closed, academic activities of about two crore students of primary, secondary, and tertiary levels are being hampered.

The government cancelled this year's Junior School Certificate (JSC) and its equivalent Junior Dakhil Certificate exams as well as Primary Education Completion (PEC) and its equivalent Ebtedayee Education Completion exams due to the pandemic and the closure of schools.

Instead of public exams, students will have to appear in final exams at their schools.

The PEC and its equivalent exams for the fifth graders and JSC and its equivalent exams for the eighth graders were slated for November.

These are the two largest public exams. Besides, first-and second-term exams at primary schools and halfyearly tests at secondary schools have been postponed.

Holding of this year's Higher Certificate and its Secondary equivalent exams has been deferred for an indefinite period from April 1.

At yesterday's press conference,

Secretary Akram said before reopening of schools, every institution would have to make a plan on how they would conduct their regular activities. He said many kindergartens could be forced to close due to fund

crisis. "So, we have already asked all concerned that students [of closed kindergartens] can be enrolled at government primary schools situated in the catchment area," he said.

State Minister for Primary and Mass Education Zakir Hossain told the conference that the country's literacy rate is now 74.7 percent. Last year, the rate was 73.90 percent.

The literacy rate increased due to the government's persistent initiatives, said Zakir, adding that the rate was 53.50 percent in 2005 during the BNP-Jamaat-led four party alliance government.

The country will observe the International Literacy Day tomorrow. This year's International Literacy Day focuses on "Literacy teaching and learning in the Covid-19 crisis and beyond," he added.

The attack took place in the tourist district of the coastal city of Sousse, the site of the worst of several jihadist attacks in recent years, where 38 people, most of them Britons, were killed in a 2015 beachside shooting

"A patrol of two National Guard officers was attacked with a knife in the centre of Sousse," 140 kilometres (80 miles) south of the capital Tunis, said National Guard spokesman Houcem Eddine Jebabli.

"One died as a martyr and the other was wounded and is hospitalised," he said, adding that "this was a terrorist attack". The attackers had first rammed the
