DHAKA-TONGI RAIL LINE EXPANSION

Construction to take more time, money

Officials blame it on pandemic, redesigning of a major bridge

The cost and duration of the construction work of the third and fourth dual gauge railway tracks on Dhaka-Tongi route and doubling the dual gauge track on Tongi-Joydevpur route is going to increase further.

Officials cited redesigning of a major bridge under the project, Covid-19 pandemic, and the difference between the contract value and Development Project Profile (DPP) prices as the reasons for the changes. They said the project authority was redesigning the

Tongi Bridge as objections came from Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) about the existing design -- particularly about the clearance under the bridge. Following the redesigning, the clearance under the bridge would increase by about two metres.

Bangladesh Railway is implementing the project under the first Indian Lines of Credit to improve the capacity of its most vital section. Except for Narayanganj, Dhaka is connected with the entire country's railway network through this section.

Under the project, construction of a 49-kilometre third and fourth dual gauge railway track on Dhaka-Tongi route and a 13-kilometre dual gauge railway track on Tongi-Joydevpur route is underway.

10 dead as two trawlers collide in Gomai river

All were women, children; they were on way to Netrakona from Sunamganj

At least 10 people, all women and children, drowned in the Gomai river as a trawler capsized after being hit by a sandladen vessel in Netrakona's Kalmakanda upazila yesterday.

Eight to 10 others are still missing, said Kalmakanda Upazila Nirbahi Officer Sohel Rana.

trawler carrying 30 to 35 passengers in Rajnagor area around 9:30am, said Md Hadisuzzaman, chairman of Borokhapan union parishad.

The trawler was heading for Thakurakona ghat in Netrakona Sadar upazila from Madhyanagar of Sunamganj's Dharampasha upazila, he said.

UNO Sohel said 10 bodies were recovered and six people were fished out of water and given first aid.

Firefighters and locals searched for the missing until around 6:00pm.

Donald Trump nominated for Nobel Peace Prize

A Norwegian lawmaker has nominated Donald Trump for the Nobel

Peace Prize for 2021 for helping broker a deal between Israel and the United Arab Emirates, the second time he has put forward the US president for the honour.

Thousands of people are eligible to nominate candidates for the Nobel Peace Prize, including members of parliaments and governments, university professors and past laureates.

The Norwegian Nobel Committee, which decides on the award, declined to comment.

It could be a turning point for Rohingyas

Experts say this may help the persecuted get justice

The confessions of two former Myanmar soldiers about their involvement in massacres, rape, and other crimes against Rohingyas and their transfer to the International Criminal Court (ICC) could be a turning point for justice for the Rohingyas, analysts said.

So far, the victims and witnesses to the mass atrocities against the Rohingyas shared their experiences to the UN and other investigators since some 750,000 Rohingyas fled a brutal military campaign in Myanmar's Rakhine State. This is the first time the perpetrators have confessed to the massacres and rapes, they said.

"These confessions could be a turning point for justice for the Rohingyas. This is a major development. Now, all the parties -- victims, witnesses and perpetrators -- are saying similar things," said Prof Imtiaz Ahmed, director of the Centre for Genocide Studies at the International Relations Department of Dhaka University.

In February this year, the International Court of Justice (ICJ), where the Gambia filed a case accusing Myanmar of genocide against Rohingyas, ordered in February this year SEE PAGE 4 COL 6

cyber threats Banks have beefed up security, vigilance and monitoring to prevent hackers from stealing money after the central bank and the government alerted them against a North Korean hacker group. Almost all banks have recently started keeping the ATM and POS

services suspended from 12am to 7am amid threats that the hacker group named "Beagle Boys" was trying to steal money from banks around the world through ATM booths and fake

transactions. "We are centrally monitoring the activities of the ATMs. We have alerted our security guards manning the ATMs," said Syed Mahbubur Rahman, managing director

of Mutual Trust Bank. Emranul Huq, managing director of Dhaka Bank, said they are keeping only seven ATMs operational from midnight to the morning out of a total of 62.

of Barishal yesterday. They were taking the body of an infant to their hometown by an ambulance. On their way, the ambulance collided head-on with a covered



Tension escalates in Ladakh

India, China mobilise troops around Pangong Tso lake

Indian and Chinese troops were engaged in a tense face off yesterday, barely a few hundred metres apart, in a remote Himalayan region where shots were fired for the first time in decades, Indian officials said.

The nuclear-armed neighbours have accused each other of firing in the air during a fresh flare-up in the Ladakh region on Monday, violating long-standing protocols to avoid using firearms along their undemarcated borders.

"The situation is tense," an official in New Delhi said, adding that Indian and Chinese troops were squaring off in close proximity in at least four locations south of the

Pangong Tso lake that both lay claim to. "Both are on their own sides of the LAC," the official said, referring to the Line of Actual Control, the de facto

At a forward position near the Rezang La mountain pass, Indian and Chinese troops were only around 200 metres apart, another official in New Delhi said. Both officials

declined to be named. The development comes a day before the foreign ministers of both countries are expected to meet in Moscow on the sidelines of the meeting of the eight-nation Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO).

Indian External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar is in Moscow on a four-day visit to Russia to attend a meeting of the foreign ministers of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO).

On the sidelines of the SCO meet, he is expected to hold a bilateral meeting with his Chinese counterpart Wang Yi today amidst the escalating border row.

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
