

Numbers not adding up at Cox's Bazar Rohingya camps, local organisations say refugees leaving camps; govt officials deny

So where have they gone?

Despite 76,000 children being born in the camps in the last three years, the number of Rohingya refugees in all camps of Ukhiya and Teknaf has actually decreased to 8.60 lakh as of July this year.

It was about 9.57 lakh in December 2018, as per reports of the Inter Sector Coordination Group (ISCG).

Civil society members, local public representatives, and local non-government organisations working with the refugees say some Rohingyas have left the camps for good or some leave for certain periods of time.

representatives of UN and

international organisations remain tightlipped about this, while government officials deny the possibility that Rohingyas are leaving the camps.

Mohammad Talukder, refugee relief and repatriation commissioner (RRRC), told The Daily Star recently that there is no chance for Rohingyas to escape from the camps.

The camp environment is not like that and the refugees have access to proper food and treatment facilities," he said.

Even if they somehow manage to leave the camp without any knowledge of law enforcement officials, they come back after a few days. If any of the Rohingyas go out of the camp without permission, members SEE PAGE 2 COL 3



- **76,000** children born in the camps in the last three years.
- After 2017 influx, many refugees registered their names more than once as they thought it would help them get more relief. The number decreased when biometric registration took place, say govt
- Local NGOs say Rohingyas frequently go out of camps for one or two months at a stretch. Some Koningyas nave also married locals and live in Chattogram, other parts of Cox's Bazar, and Bandarban.

2 UNOs attacked in 6 years; govt officials there face undue political pressure

The intimidating atmosphere in their areas, disputes with local ruling party men, and on top of this, brutal attacks on two UNOs over the years have given rise to a sense of unease among government officials working in Dinajpur.

The first attack was launched on Nawabganj upazila nirbahi officer (UNO) backin October 2014 The second one was on Ghoraghat UNO in the early hours of September 3.

Local sources say conflicts often arise when UNOs try to prevent misdeeds by ruling Awami League leaders or refuse to entertain undue requests of the party men related to financial scams.

After the Ghoraghat incident, several UNOs and other government officials said they face unexpected pressure from ruling party leaders, which hampers their administrative work.

A section of ruling party men in the upazilas are involved in tender

manipulation, land grabbing, sand lifting, drug peddling and leasing government land for markets, they also mentioned. "We have to discharge duties under pressure. If we don't entertain their

[AL men's] demands, they misbehave with us and issue threats," said an UNO, seeking anonymity. The Daily Star talked to at least five UNOs out of 13 in the district. All of

them came up with similar comments over the atmosphere in their areas. Recently, an UNO was transferred within three months of his joining. However, the transfer order was later cancelled.

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Global solidarity to tackle Covid still lacking

Says WHO, warns vaccine trial pause a 'wake-up call'

Six months on since declaring a pandemic, the WHO chief said on Thursday the lack of solidarity and leadership among world powers was "what worries me most" in the fight against Covid-19.

World Health Organization Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said the coronavirus was still spreading around the planet precisely due to the gaps between the major players in combatting the disease.

Though the UN health agency declared a public health emergency of international concern -- its highest level of alarm -- on January 30, Tedros first described the outbreak as a pandemic on March 11,

capturing public attention. Reflecting on this point in the crisis during a virtual news conference, Tedros said: "What

worries me most is... a lack of solidarity. "Because when solidarity lacks, and when we're divided, that's a very good opportunity for the virus -- and that's why it's still spreading.

"That's what worries me and that's what

I ask the world to do. "We will need solidarity and we will need global leadership, especially of the major powers in the world. That's how we

can defeat this virus."

Malaysia eases entry ban for Bangladeshis

Many expatriates hope to return to work soon amid the pandemic

Malaysia's decision to lift the travel ban on Bangladesh and 22 other countries will reduce the hurdles for many Bangladeshis returning to their workplaces in that country.

The expatriates must be approved by the Malaysian Immigration Department before they enter the country.

Besides, their application for entry must be accompanied by a supporting letter from the Malaysian Investment Development Authority or agencies concerned, regional media reports quoted Security Minister

Ismail Sabri Yaakob as saying.

Malaysia authorities on Thursday announced that they will allow entry of expatriates and holders of professional visit pass from the 23 countries, reversing its earlier move that came into effect on Monday, reports The Straits Times of Singapore, adding that the move was criticised by employers.

To curb the spread of Covid-19, Malaysia had announced that people from countries with over 150,000 cases would be barred from entering, it says.
