Onion makes consumers cry

Prices double within hours amid panic buying, manipulation as India suspends export

Onion prices have shot up dramatically in the country due to panic buying by consumers and price gouging by wholesalers in the immediate aftermath of India's decision on Monday to suspend onion exports.

News had broken of India's decision on Monday evening and many consumers in the capital, with the skyrocketing price of onions last year fresh in their minds, rushed to buy onions and stockpile on Monday night. Since news of India's decision spread, onions have dominated discussions in social media, tea stalls, kitchen markets, and households

over the past 24 hours. India's decision had come on the day that Bangladesh exported hilsa to West Bengal for the first time.

From social media to tea stall, kitchen market to households, onion was the centre of all discussions in last 24 hours as the price of onion started to soaring as soon as the news of Indian government suspending onion exports spread on Monday evening.

The panic persisted even as Bangladesh Trade and Tariff Commission (BTTC) officials said the country still has a surplus of onions in stock to meet local demand.

Meanwhile, UNB reported yesterday that Bangladesh requested the Indian government to withdraw the suspension as soon as possible. State Minister for Foreign Affairs M Shahriar Alam said Bangladesh raised the issue with the Indian Ministry of External Affairs through the Bangladesh High Commission in New Delhi, immediately after being informed of the

Workers skeptical, feel harassed

Allege hassles in completing paperwork for due wages, benefits; cheque disbursement starts

There was a lavish ceremony inside Karim Jute Mills Corporation on the outskirts of Dhaka yesterday to mark the disbursement of due wages and other benefits of the laid-off and retired workers of 25 shuttered state run jute mills.

Jute Secretary Mohammad Lokman Hossain termed it a "historic occasion" during the ceremony also attended by Jute Minister Golam Dastagir Gazi.

The authorities handed over cheques to 30 laid-off workers during the ceremony. Those 30 are the first workers to receive their dues through bank cheques since the government decided to close down the 25 state-owned mills on July 1

But around a hundred workers and their family members, who were not allowed inside the factory, were more concerned about getting their dues after being subjected to different kind of hassles to complete the paper works. There are 1,759 laid off, 612 retired and 2,625 substitute workers in

Karim Jute Mills scheduled to get their long-pending dues. Talking to The Daily Star, most of the workers said they were still suspicious of the payment procedure and alleged that they were being

harassed by the officials of Bangladesh Jute Mills Corporations (BJMC) every day in the name of processing their payments.

US President Donald Trump yesterday presided over the signing ceremony of historic diplomatic deals between Israel and two Gulf Arab nations that could herald a dramatic shift in Middle East power dynamics and give him a boost ahead of the November election.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu was to sign agreements with Emirati Foreign Minister Sheikh Abdullah oin Zayed al-Nahyan and Bahrain's Foreign Minister Abdullatif Al Zayani.

The deals would make them the third and fourth Arab states to take such steps to normalise ties since Israel signed peace treaties with Egypt in 1979 and Jordan in

All 25 accused to face trial

22, now in jail, plead not guilty

A tribunal in Dhaka yesterday framed charges against all 25 accused Bangladesh University of **Engineering and Technology** students in the Abrar Fahad murder case.

Twenty-two accused, now in jail, pleaded not guilty and demanded justice after Judge Abu Zafar Md Kamruzzaman of the

Speedy Trial Tribunal-1 of Dhaka read out the charges to them.

30-plus too can apply for govt jobs

Considering pandemic, govt to relax rules for job seekers

The public administration ministry is going to issue a gazette notification within a day or two to allow those who turned 30 on March 25 or later to apply for government jobs.

"Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has already approved a summary sent by the ministry in this regard. So, we are hoping to issue a gazette notification on this very soon," State Minister for Public Administration Farhad Hossain told The Daily Star yesterday.

The state minister said the prime minister had done many things for different professionals who suffered due to the pandemic.

NID CARD FORGERY

EC officials compromising server security

Sources say some data entry employees sell criminals passwords

Many field level polls officials share passwords of a software with data entry officers for corrections to national identity cards, which ultimately gives criminals the scope

for forging the cards. A section of the data entry officers, in exchange for money, help members of a gang commit the forgery, said

Talking on the issue, top officials of the Election Commission's NID wing said they would soon start a combing operation at the field level election offices to

oversee NID services-related activities. Officials at upazila election offices and the wing said field level officers get passwords to access a software called Card Management System, which is linked to the EC's

"This create scope for data entry officers to engage in

various malpractices," said an NID wing official. Upazila election officials also have the passwords as they need it for voter registration and correcting people's NID cards. The EC is trying to use a one-time password to stop the malpractices, said NID wing Director General Brig Gen Mohammad Sidul Islam.

"If anyone enters the system, it will automatically take a photo of the person. We will also keep track of how much time a person will be spending on the system," he said
