## Dhaka not a 'smart city'

Singapore tops 2020 Smart City Index; experts stress for ensuring civic facilities, quality services

Dhaka has not made it to the list of 109 smart cities in the world, according to the 2020 Smart City Index.

The index based on the economic and technological data, as well as citizens' perceptions of how "smart" their cities are, was published on Thursday by The Institute for Management Development, in collaboration with Singapore University for Technology and Design.

Singapore, Helsinki and Zurich have topped the 2020 Smart City Index, in a year that saw many European cities fall in the

Hundreds of citizens from the 109 cities were surveyed in April and May this year and asked questions on the technological provisions of their city across five key areas -- health and safety, mobility, activities, opportunities and governance.

"It is of course too early to draw the lessons from Covid-19. However, it is clear that we are at a critical juncture, where the sanitary crisis is still very much with us, while the economic and social crisis that it will entail has hardly started," said Bruno Lanvin, president of the IMD Smart City

"This year's Smart City Index suggests that the cities that have been able to combine technologies, leadership and a strong culture of 'living and acting together' should be able to better withstand the most damaging effects of such crises," he added.

Bengaluru, Mumbai, New Delhi, Hyderabad, Ho Chi Min, Osaka, Tokyo, Shanghai, Beijing and Bangkok are some of the Asian cities which made it to the list.

Asked, Adil Mohammad Khan, general secretary of Bangladesh Institute of Planners, told the Daily Star that service quality in Dhaka is far below the standard level for which the capital was not

considered in the list. "We are behind in terms of quality, ability and accessibility... if we can do better there, it will bring good results for us," he said.

The concept of smart city is very conventional now but there is variation in its definition, said Adil. He said many countries consider a "technology-based" city a smart city. But in a city like Dhaka where basic amenities and service facilities are not adequate and quality of service is low, ensuring quality services for all is more important.

'Concept of a smart city can assist us but our main target will have to be to ensure civic facilities for all. Giving quality service at a low cost is more important than making Dhaka a smart city," he said.

Md Sirajul Islam, chief city planner of Dhaka South City Corporation, said, "Dhaka is one of the most densely populated cities and we are also being affected by climate change.

Phensedyl Coming in From Chuadanga

# Smugglers using modified motorbikes to smuggle it

They called it "Phensedyl bike".

Though it looks just like a common motorbike, these have an additional chamber inside the fuel tank that can keep around 70 bottles of Phensedyl inside.

With an aim to dodge law enforcers, narcotics traders have prepared such special arrangement in motorbikes to transport the contraband drug.

The smugglers only choose 150CC motorbikes for the purpose, as these bikes have a big fuel tank and a chamber can easily be made inside it.

Even after making a chamber in the tank, they can refill three to four litres of fuel in the tank for their journey from one place to another, without raising any alarm.

Police's detective branch (DB) has claimed to have learned about these special bikes following arrest of a narcotics smuggler from the capital's Jatrabari area

Based on a specific tip-off that a smuggler was coming to Dhaka from Chuadanga with Phensedyl on a motorbike, DB police arrested its driver Sirajul Islam.

But searching his bike and bag, they did not find any Phensedyl. The biker then brought allegations of harassment against the DB team.

The DB team then called on a motorbike mechanic and asked to dismantle the bike. Around 20 minutes later, they found some 70 bottles of Phensedyl inside a special chamber in the oil tank of the bike.

Junaed Alam Sarker, additional deputy commissioner of DB police who led the drive, later shared his experience with The

He said they later interrogated the arrestee on remand, and came to know that the syndicate has around 10 such special motorbikes, which they use to smuggle Phensedyl directly from the bordering point of Chuadanga district.

bottles into the bike from a mechanic's and are now conducting drives to arrest shop in Darshana. Later, they drive to them," added DC Mashiur.

For the journey, the biker has to refuel three to four times, as they are not able to refill more than four litres at a time, said

"Arrestee Sirajul is also a motor mechanic, and during interrogation, he admitted that he transported three of four such phensedyl consignments to Dhaka,'

Quoting the arrestee, Junaed further said that the syndicate also have some eight to ten more bikers, and send shipments from the bordering district to Dhaka five times a week. For each shipment, a biker receives around Tk 4,000-5,000, DB said. Asked about the price of Phensedyl,

ADC Junaed said the smugglers buy each bottle for Tk 600 to 700 in Chuadanga. In Dhaka, the "wholesale" price of each bottle becomes Tk 950 to 1,100, he said.

These bottles are later sold to addicts for Tk 1,700 to 1,900, he added.

DB officials said that they have come to know that peddlers used to smuggle Phensedyl to Dhaka in pick-up vans or trucks earlier, after hiding those inside vegetables or other products.

But it became risky in recent times as they have to count a huge loss when their consignments are intercepted by law enforcers

For this reason, the smugglers have taken the strategy of smuggling small shipments to Dhaka so that they do not need to count huge loss even if gets seized, said DB police.

Mashiur Rahman, deputy commissioner of Gulshan Division Police, said the smugglers have recently changed their strategy to smuggle narcotics to Dhaka.

They are now focusing on bringing small consignments instead of big ones, so that it cannot be detected by law enforcers,' he said.

#### 'Media going thru' toughest time' Mirza Fakhrul Islam tells DUJ faction's discussion

Media freedom and democracy in Bangladesh "cannot be protected" without a united movement, said BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir yesterday.

"A message should be given to all that democracy, journalism, the country and its independence and sovereignty can't be protected without a united movement," he said.

The BNP leader said there is no alternative to changing the current situation. "The only way to remove this fascist government is a united movement and struggle. We need unity and we've been always trying to forge it. We've to move forward by creating a national unity.

He made the remarks at a virtual discussion arranged by a faction of Dhaka Union of Journalists

Fakhrul said the unity of people and political parties is now imperative to "restore" democracy for which the nation fought against Pakistani

occupation forces and liberated the country in

"The current government has no political values as Awami League doesn't believe in democracy. Awami League and democracy never go together... They think they're all in all and they'll run the country and control everything," he observed.

The BNP leader said the media and journalists are going through the toughest time due to the government's "repressive and suppressive" acts. "A situation has been created here, especially creating fear and panic, that no one now dares raise voice and express their views freely."

He said there have never been so many unemployed journalists in the country. "After the introduction of Bakshal in 1975, all but four newspapers were shut. #### Man killed by 'muggers' in Dhaka

A man was stabbed to death allegedly by muggers in Dhaka's Dhalpur yesterday. The deceased was identified as Akhter

Hossain Sikder (50), a manager of a Jatayat Paribahan bus counter in Golapbag area. Yasin Sultan Rakib, nephew of the

deceased, said his uncle was stabbed when he was on his way to the bus counter from his Dhalpur residence around 4:45am. He was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH), where doctors declared him dead around 6am.

The muggers stabbed him in the chest and snatched his wallet and phone. He had around Tk 20,000 in a bag, he said.

Hailing from Cumilla, Akhter used to live in a rented house in Dhalpur's Lichu Bagan area with his family.

The body was kept at the mortuary for autopsy, said Bachchu Mia, in-charge (inspector) of police outpost at DMCH.

#### Trains delayed for 4hr after derailment

Several trains operating between Dhaka and the western regions of the country got delayed for three to four hours, as rail operations remained suspended for around six hours after an oil-laden train derailed in Gazipur early yesterday.

The delay is causing huge suffering to the passengers. An oil-laden train derailed on track at a place between Mouchak and Bangabandhu High Tech City in Gazipur around 3am, suspending rail operations between Dhaka and the western regions, said Mirza Mohammad Mukta, sub-inspector of Dhaka Railway Police Station.

Rail operations resumed after the oil-laden train was salvaged around 9am, he told The Daily Star, adding, "As a result, most of the trains running on these routes got delayed by three to four hours.

An official of Bangladesh Railway at Kamalapur Station said three trains -- Sundarban Express, Dhumketu Express and Nilsagar Express -- which were supposed to leave Dhaka in the morning, got delayed by three to four hours.

Dhaka-bound Rangpur Express also got delayed by several hours following the derailment, he said.

### Scientists find SARS-CoV-2's genetic material in sewage

A team of scientists from Noakhali Science and Technology University (NSTU) and North South University (NSU) has claimed the first and successful detection of SARS-CoV-2's genetic material in sewage water.

The team is led by Prof Firoz Ahmed, chairperson of NSTU's microbiology department, said an NSTU media

They collected specimens between July 10 and August 29 from drains, sewage and toilets near Shaheed Bhulu Stadium Detention Centre for Covid-19 patients in Noakhali.

The team "successfully detected" several genes of the virus from the samples, it said. While wastewater surveillance for Covid-19 around the world has focused on wastewater treatment plants, the researchers opted for drain water monitoring near isolation

centres, which is first of its kind. The study focuses on tracing genetic load, how much genetic material is found at certain points, in vicinity of isolation centres that contain constant number of Covid-19 patients. The critical observation has been variation, where small drains showed reduction of genetic load than bigger canals and main city sewers, where the team observed

temporal accumulation of SARS-CoV-2 RNA According Prof Nazrul Islam, renowned virologist and former vice chancellor (VC) of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University, it is internationally accepted that SARS-CoV-2 can be present in the gastrointestinal system. Therefore, the team's method to identify the virus' presence in sewage water could serve as a tool to prevent

future spread of the disease. Prof Nazrul considers the initiative a remarkable achievement in developing an effective waste water surveillance system in Bangladesh.
