US JUSTICE GINSBERG'S DEATH Fierce battle looms over succession

A fierce political battle shaped up over the future of the US Supreme Court yesterday, with President Donald Trump saying he would quickly name a successor to liberal Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, who died on Friday, a move that would tip the court further to the right.



Affectionately known as the Notorious RBG, the 87-year-old Ginsburg was the oldest of nine Supreme Court justices.

She died after a fight with pancreatic cancer, the court announced, saying she passed away "surrounded by her family at her home in Washington, DC."

Ginsburg was appointed in 1993 by President Bill Clinton. She consistently delivered progressive votes on the most divisive social issues of the day, including abortion rights, same-sex marriage, voting rights, immigration, health care and affirmative action.

Coming just 46 days before an election in which Trump lags his Democratic rival Joe Biden in the polls, the vacancy offers the Republican a chance to expand the court's conservative majority to 6-3 at a time of a gaping political divide in America.

Trump -- who was told of Ginsburg's passing while on the campaign trail -- issued a statement praising her

32 more die, 1,567 infected

Thirty-two Covid-19 patients died and 1,567 new cases were detected in the 24 hours preceding 8:30am yesterday.

This took the total death toll to 4,913 which is 1.41 percent of all confirmed cases, said a press release from the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).

As of yesterday, the total number of confirmed cases was 3,47,372.

Yesterday's new cases were reported after testing 13,170 samples. The positivity rate was 11.90 percent and the overall positivity rate stood at 19.20 percent.

Bangladesh is currently 15th in the list of worst-affected countries in the world in terms of the number of cases.

The position is one step ahead of Saudi Arabia and one step behind the United Kingdom, according to worldometer.info.

DRAFT CONSTITUTION SENT FOR PRINTING The Draft Constitution for the country has been finalised and sent for printing, which would be complete before the current month is out. The Drafting Committee would sit on September 30 to give a final look to the Draft Constitution, which has been originally prepared in Bangla.

The English version of the draft has also been prepared. The Bangla version will be taken as base of interpretation in future, in case of any constitutional hitch or tangle. The Draft Constitution has laid down that any citizen of Bangladesh irrespective of caste, creed, religion or race could become the head of the state if he attains the minimum age of 35 years. As for Prime Minister, any citizen of 18 years could contest the election and become the Prime Minister of the country.

Six people, including a Chhatra League activist, were killed in separate road accidents in Mymensingh and Gopalganj in the last two days.

In Nandail upazila of Mymensingh, three people, including a father and his five-year-old son, were killed and 10 others injured when a microbus collided head-on with a pick-up van in Dangri area on Mymensingh-Kishoreganj road yesterday morning.

The victims were identified as Fahad Alam, 32, his son Turan, and Fahad's aunt Jharna Begum, 45.

Fahad and his son were from Sherpur's Sreebordi upazila while Jharna was from Bakshiganj upazila in Jamalpur, police said, adding that Fahad was an assistant teacher at a government primary school in Sreebordi.

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Trucker beaten to death after running over 2 goats

A truck driver was beaten dead by a mob at Rajshahi's Puthia upazila after his vehicle ran over and killed two goats.

The victim, Abu Taleb, 33, of Jhalmalia area of the upazila, died of his injuries at Puthia Health Complex around 3:30am yesterday, said Rejaul Islam, officer-in-charge of Puthia Police Station.

Around 7:30pm on Friday, while driving on Bhabaniganj-Puthia Road, the truck ran over the two goats in Shibjait area of Bagmara upazila, the OC said quoting witnesses and after conducting primary investigation.

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Biggest Thai protest in yrs targets govt, monarchy

Around 20,000 people protested in Thailand's capital yesterday against the government of former coup leader and Prime Minister Prayuth Chan-ocha, with many demonstrators also calling for reforms to the monarchy.

"Down with feudalism, long live the people," was one of the chants at the biggest demonstration in Bangkok since Prayuth took power in a 2014 coup.

Protests have been building in the southeast Asian country since mid July, demanding the

COVID-19 DEATH TOLL Unacceptable

Says WHO

The Covid-19 weekly death toll of around 50,000 lives is unacceptably high, the World Health Organization has said as the one million fatalities landmark approaches.

The WHO said that although global death and infection rates from the new coronavirus were plateauing rather than rising exponentially, the worldwide figures were masking surges at lower regional and local levels.

The respiratory disease has killed more than 950,000 people since the outbreak emerged in China last December, according to a tally from official sources compiled by AFP, while more than 30.5 million cases have been registered.

"We're adding about 1.8 to two million cases per week to the global case count, and an average somewhere between 40,000 to 50,000 deaths," WHO emergencies director Michael Ryan told a virtual news conference.

"Thankfully that is not rising exponentially. This is a hugely high figure to be settling at. That is not where we want to be."

"Even though those numbers are flat at a global level, that covers up the fact that at regional and sub-regional level in some countries, we're seeing significant rises in cases."

Ryan said the pandemic still had a "long way to burn" and though the proportion of infected people dying had dropped as treatment techniques improved, "we cannot accept 50,000 deaths a week as an acceptable number."

Large parts of Europe on Friday geared up for broad new restrictions to stop the coronavirus and Israel enforced a second nationwide shutdown.

Maria Van Kerkhove, the WHO's technical lead on Covid-19, said the UN health agency was seeing "worrying trends in the northern hemisphere" in terms of case

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
