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Outcry ignored, result obvious

Locals keep protesting while factory waste continues to pollute waterbodies in Habiganj

MINTU DESHWARA, back from Habiganj

The water has a yellowish tinge and is even somewhat black in parts. The strong stench it emanates keeps people from going near it.

This is Ekhtiarpur canal, a waterbody testifying to severe pollution as the result of a factory dumping untreated liquid waste.

The canal leads to the Sutang River, which ultimately meets and pollutes the mighty Meghna. Along the way, it poses health risks to locals living along the canal and harms their livelihoods and the surrounding environment.

On World Rivers Day -- the theme of which is "waterways in our communities" -- The Daily Star takes a look at how one factory's pollution affected a local canal and all the communities which depend on it.

Many such factories and industrial establishments dump untreated waste into canals, rivers and other waterbodies in the Shahpur area in Habiganj's Madhabpur upazila.

Locals have protested on several occasions but Maize Advance Argo Refineries Limited (MAAR Ltd), which primarily produces starch powder, continued to pollute Ekhtiarpur canal since it started operations around eight years ago.

Nurul Islam, a resident of Ekhtiarpur village, said many people in the area were suffering from various diseases, including skin diseases due to contact with water

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Landmine detection rat wins bravery award

Heroes come in all shapes and sizes. A five-year-old giant African pouched rat called Magawa, however, has to be one of the world's most unlikely life-savers.

The rodent has won the animal equivalent of Britain's highest civilian honour for bravery because of his uncanny knack of sniffing out landmines and unexploded ordnance.

British veterinary charity the PDSA on Friday awarded Magawa its Gold Medal "for his life-saving bravery and devotion to duty", which had transformed the lives of people in Cambodia.

Magawa, who was trained by the Belgian charity APOPO, has sniffed out 39 landmines and 28 items of unexploded ordnance, making him the

Trump set to pick Amy Coney Barrett

Say reports as focus shifts to Senate

US President Donald Trump was set to unveil his Supreme Court nominee yesterday, barely five weeks out from the November 3 presidential election, with US media reporting that he has chosen conservative judge Amy Coney Barrett for the job.

If the 48-year-old law professor is indeed nominated and confirmed, her appointment would consolidate a conservative majority in the country's top court.

Citing sources close to the process, various media outlets, including The New York Times and CNN, said Trump would put forward the 48-year-old judge.

"We are going to be announcing somebody great," the US president said in Virginia on a whirlwind three-state campaign tour Friday.

"Tomorrow [Saturday] I think is going to be a big day!" he added, as the crowd roared with approval.

The president did not name his nominee but earlier said his decision was made. Barrett was "outstanding" he said.

Media reports noted the mercurial Trump could still change his mind before the official announcement, expected at 5:00 pm (2100 GMT) Saturday.

Democratic opponents, led by presidential candidate Joe Biden, have demanded that Republicans back off on replacing Ruth Bader Ginsburg -- a liberal icon -- until after the November 3 election.

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
