

Nations must fund WHO's vaccine plan

Says UN chief

United Nations Secretary-**General Antonio Guterres** said yesterday it is time for countries to start using money from their national Covid-19 recovery and response plans to help fund the World Health Organization's global vaccine plan.

The Access to Covid-19 Tools (ACT) Accelerator programme and its Covax facility has so far received \$3 billion, but needs another \$35 billion. It aims to deliver two billion doses of coronavirus vaccines by the end of next year, 245 million treatments and 500 million tests.

"The ACT-Accelerator provides the only safe and certain way to re-open the global economy as quickly as possible. A national vaccine effort in a handful of countries will not unlock the doors to the global economy and restore livelihoods," Guterres told a high-level virtual UN event.

WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said 167 countries have joined Covax global vaccines facility, representing 70% of the world's population.

Guterres said the programme needed an immediate injection of \$15 billion to "avoid losing the window of opportunity" for advance purchase and production, to build stocks in parallel with licensing, boost research, and help countries prepare.

Guterres called all countries to step up significantly in the next three months.

BREXIT TREATY OVERRIDE POWERS

Defying EU, UK House okays bill

Britain's House of Commons has approved legislation that gives ministers the power to break its divorce deal with the European Union, despite the threat of legal action from Brussels and unrest within the governing Conservative Party. The UK Internal Market Bill, which ministers

acknowledge breaks international law, was approved by 340 votes to 256 and now passes to the House of Lords for debate.

The bill seeks to protect free trade between Britain's four nations once a Brexit transition period ends, but has soured relations with Brussels just as time is running out to reach a deal on their long-term relationship.

After an initial uproar within Prime Minister Boris Johnson's party, including criticism from three former Conservative prime ministers, a rebellion was snuffed out by a concession to give parliament a say over using the powers.

The government says clauses in the bill which override the Withdrawal Agreement, signed by Johnson in January, are necessary to protect free trade with Northern Ireland, and will only be used if talks on a border solution with the EU fail.

The EU, which wants to make sure Northern Ireland's open border with member state Ireland does not act as a back door for goods to come into the bloc, says it is an extremely serious violation of the exit treaty and has threatened to sue.

Kuwait's new emir takes oath Kuwait's new emir was sworn in at parliament yesterday as the country prepared to lay to rest late ruler Sheikh Sabah al-Ahmad al-Sabah, who helped steer the US-allied Gulf state through some of the Middle East's most turbulent decades. The cabinet swiftly named designated successor Crown Prince Sheikh Nawaf al-Ahmad al-Sabah as ruler on Tuesday following the death of Sheikh Sabah, 91, whose body was due to arrive in Kuwait from the United States where he had been hospitalised since July. Japan's defence ministry yesterday unveiled a record \$52-billion budget request in a push to maintain military readiness under pressure from China and North Korea. The Ministry of Defence is asking for 5.49 trillion yen (\$52 billion) for the fiscal year from April 2021, marking nine straight years of increases and a rise from the 5.3 trillion yen for the ongoing year to March. Among Japan's planned big purchases are two frigates and a submarine, with money also going to the development of a next-generation fighter.

World's first patient cured of HIV dies after cancer returns



Timothy Ray Brown, the first person known to have been cured of HIV when he had a unique type of bone marrow transplant, has died in California after relapsing with cancer, his partner said. Brown, born on March 11, 1966, became known as the "Berlin Patient" after his HIV was eradicated by treatment there in 2007. The American's case fascinated and inspired a generation of HIV doctors as well as patients infected with the virus that causes AIDS, offering a glimmer of hope that one day a cure will be found that eventually ends the AIDS pandemic.

Invest \$500b a yr to protect nature

Attenborough leads call at UN meet

British broadcaster David Attenborough yesterday led a call from conservation groups for the world to invest \$500 billion a year to halt the destruction of nature, warning that the future of the planet was in "grave jeopardy".

Attenborough, whose new film "A Life on Our Planet" documents the dangers posed by climate change and the extinction of species, issued the call as the United Nations convened a one-day summit aimed at galvanising action to protect wildlife.

"Our natural world is under greater pressure now than at any time in human history, and the future of the entire planet - on which every single one of us depends - is in grave jeopardy," Attenborough, 94, said in a statement. "We still have an opportunity to reverse catastrophic

biodiversity loss, but time is running out." Opening the summit in New York, UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres warned that a million species were at risk of extinction and that climate change and the loss of biodiversity were "destroying Earth's web of life".

The world spends an estimated \$80-90 billion on conservation each year, but studies show that hundreds of billions of dollars may be needed to save ecosystems from collapse. Britain, Canada and others joined the European Union on Monday in pledging to protect 30% of their land and seas by 2030.

'Herd-immunity' still a far cry Study in India says only 7.1pc of population may

have been infected with Covid-19

More than 60 million people in India -- 10 times the official figure -- could have contracted the novel coronavirus, the country's lead pandemic agency said, indicating the so called herd-immunity is still a far cry from ground reality.

According to official data India, home to 1.3

billion people, is the world's second most infected nation, with more than 6.1 million cases, just behind the United States.

But the real figure could be much higher, according to the latest serological survey -- a study testing blood for certain antibodies to estimate the proportion of a population that has fought off the virus.

The main conclusions from this sero-survey are that one in 15 individuals aged more than 10 have been exposed to SARS-CoV-2 by August," Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) directorgeneral Balram Bhargava said at a health ministry press conference.

The survey, conducted between August 17 and September 22, revealed that around 7.1 per cent of India's adult population (aged 18 and above) showed evidence of past exposure to the virus so far, reported our New Delhi correspondent.

It also said that for every confirmed Covid-19 case in August there were 26 to 32 infections that

went undetected.

Bhargava said evidence of virus exposure was more prevalent among people tested in urban slums (15.6 percent) and non-slum urban areas (8.2 percent), than in rural areas, where 4.4 percent of those surveyed had antibodies.

The first survey conducted in May found seropositivity was the highest in villages with 69.4 per cent compared to 15.9 per cent in urban slums and 14.6 per cent in non-slums TRUMP QUESTIONS INDIA DATA

US President Donald Trump on Tuesday also questioned the credibility of India's statistics on Covid-19 deaths, lumping in the US partner with nemeses China and Russia during a fiery preelection debate.

Trump was responding to heated criticism from his Democratic rival Joe Biden, who blamed Trump for the heavy Covid-19 toll in the United States which has recorded more than 200,000 deaths and more than seven million infections.

"When you talk about numbers you don't know how many people died in China, you don't know how many people died in Russia, you don't know how many people died in India," Trump said at the debate in Cleveland.

"They don't exactly give you a straight count,"

Rivals vow to keep fighting

Death toll surpasses 100 AFP, Yerevan

Armenia and Azerbaijan vowed to keep fighting and rejected international calls for negotiations yesterday as clashes over the disputed Nagorny Karabakh region raged for a fourth day.

Armenian and Azerbaijani forces are engaged in the heaviest fighting in years over Karabakh, an ethnic Armenian province that broke away from Azerbaijan in the 1990s during the collapse of the Soviet Union.

The long-simmering conflict erupted on Sunday with the two sides trading heavy fire and blaming each other for the outbreak of violence. The confirmed death toll surpassed 100

people including civilians yesterday and both sides are claiming to have inflicted heavy losses on opposing forces.

In the Armenian capital Yerevan, dozens of men -- some already wearing military fatigues -- lined up outside a recruitment office to join the fight.



Azerbaijan's President Ilham Aliyev promised his military would keep fighting until Armenian troops withdraw fully from Karabakh.

If "the Armenian government fulfils the demand, fighting and bloodshed will end, and peace will be established in the region," he said during a visit with wounded soldiers.

Baku and Yerevan have ignored mounting international pressure for a ceasefire, as fears grow that the conflict could escalate into all-out war and draw in regional powers like Turkey and Russia.

The Armenian defence ministry yesterday accused Turkish aircraft of performing "provocative flights" along their shared border and of violating Armenia's airspace, a day after Yerevan said a Turkish jet had downed one of its warplanes.

Moscow, which has a military pact with Armenia but also good ties with Azerbaijan, has repeatedly called for an end to the fighting and offered to help with negotiations.

But Armenian Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan said talks with Azerbaijan were not yet on the table.

"It isn't very appropriate to speak of a summit between Armenia, Azerbaijan and Russia at a time of intensive hostilities, Pashinyan said.
