Trump, Biden trade insults in chaotic debate

Amid repeated interruptions, rivals duel over economy, pandemic, race and even their families

Democrat Joe Biden told a raging President Donald Trump to "shut up" in a chaotic opening debate that turned almost immediately into a shouting match weeks ahead of the most tense US election in recent memory.

The debate in Cleveland, Ohio, was as bad-tempered as had been feared, with Trump leading the way in yelling over his challenger and the Fox News moderator Chris Wallace alike.

There was no handshake as the two men took the stage

and while this was due to Covid-19 restrictions, the absence of the traditional greeting symbolized divisions through the country in the final countdown to November 3.

Trump went as hard on 77-year-old Biden as he'd

threatened, saying the "radical left" had the centrist Democrat "wrapped around their little finger."

And he got personal, seeking to rile the former vice

president by accusing one of his sons of corruption, and telling Biden that "there's nothing smart" about him.

Biden, though, not only gave as good as he got -- he

launched the kind of attack on Trump the billionaire president has rarely had to endure to his face.

"Liar," "racist" and "clown" were just some of the missiles launched from Biden, who also branded Trump

the "puppy" of Russian President Vladimir Putin.

Govt to extend school closure due to Covid

Decision on HSC exams by next week

School closure due to the pandemic will be extended and the decision on holding the postponed Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC) and its equivalent examinations will be announced on Monday or Tuesday.

If there is any exam, the candidates will be informed at least four weeks before, said Education Minister Dipu Moni at a views-exchange programme with reporters yesterday.

"The situation is still not favourable for reopening schools, so school closure will be extended. We will let you know soon," she said at the virtual programme.

On March 17, the government closed the schools to contain the spread of Covid-19. The closure was extended till October 3. The long closure has led to the cancellation of exams and left academic calendars in disarray.

Dhaka outraged by Myanmar's lies at UNGA

Bins claims of harbouring terrorists at Cox's Bazar Rohingya camps

Bangladesh is "outraged" by Myanmar's "blatant demonstration of falsehood and fabrication of facts" at the ongoing UN General Assembly in New York.

"Bangladesh strongly rejects baseless accusations and falsification and misrepresentation of facts that Myanmar made at the UN General Assembly," a senior official in Dhaka told UNB.

Bangladesh, through the UN, has urged the Myanmar government to abandon its policy of lies and propaganda and demonstrate genuine political will to take back its own nationals with safety, security and dignity, said the official.

Myanmar at the UNGA alleged that Bangladesh was harbouring terrorists in Cox's Bazar Rohingya camps, but Bangladesh rejected such "baseless" allegations.

Another official said Bangladesh, under the leadership of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, maintains a "zero tolerance" policy towards terrorism, terrorists financing and other drivers of terrorism.

Bangladesh doesn't allow terrorists to use it territory and Myanmar needs to look at its own image in the mirror, the official said, mentioning that this was what Bangladesh said in response to allegations made by Myanmar during the general debate at the UNGA.

Scientists develop biomimetic prosthetic hand

A biomimetic prosthetic hand has been developed by Italian researchers that can replicate the behaviours of the human hand.

The hand, called Hannes, is able to restore over 90 percent of functionality to people with amputated limbs, the researchers claim.

The prosthetic, which includes the hand and the wrist, moves using the electrical signals generated by the wearer's muscles.

An array of sensors detects the activity of the

user's limb muscles, and uses specially developed software to make precise movements.

However, the researchers claim that the hand's

However, the researchers claim that the hand's mechanical design – apparently unique in the market – is the key to the prosthetic versatility and movement.

The mechanism lets the hand adapt to the object it is holding using a single motor, which allows it to be more efficient.

A man has died in police custody after he was picked up by the law enforcers from Gulistan area on Tuesday.

The victim -- Masud Rana, 33, a welder at a steel rerolling mill in Narayanganj's Kanchpur -- was tortured to death at Paltan Police Station in Dhaka, alleged his family members.

Police, however, claimed that he was on drugs and hurt himself at the police
