In a statement, the Jatiya Party chairman said a special tribunal should be set up to try rape cases.


He said the nation would be freed from this social disorder if the verdict was executed expeditiously after completing the trial within three months.

It can change fate of South Asians

Economists, foreign relations experts say

Regional connectivity through the Bay of Bengal can change the fate of South Asian people through trade and economy, especially of the landlocked Nepal, Bhutan and India's Northeast, said economists and foreign relations experts yesterday.

Navigation through the Bay of Bengal and regional rivers can largely reduce the cost of transporting goods, help protect the rivers from encroachment, while promotion of hydropower in the mountainous countries like Nepal and Bhutan can help address climate change impacts,

The observations came at a webinar titled "Regional Importance of the Bay of Bengal for Bangladesh and its landlocked and littoral neighbours".

The Bay of Bengal Institute Project of Independent University, Bangladesh (IUB), International Centre for Climate Change and Development (ICCCAD) and Bangladesh Institute of Maritime Research and Development (BIMRAD) jointly organsed the event.

"If Nepal, Bhutan and Northeast India are able to properly harness the Bay, they may have the opportunity to fully shift from their current status of land-locked to land-linked," said Bangladesh's Additional Foreign

Secretary (East) Mashfee Binte Shams in her keynote. Citing an UNCTAD study, she said transport costs of landlocked

DU plans life after reopening

Avoiding session jams a priority

As possible ways out of a shutdowninduced session jam, the authorities of Dhaka University are mulling over various measures, including merging two semesters into one, taking extra classes, and cutting public holidays.

Now in its sixth month, the shutdown has already left academic calendars in disarray, prompting the authorities to start thinking of ways to make up for the loss in lessons and delayed exams once the university reopens.

In this regard, a draft instruction for residential students has already been prepared in the last meeting of the provost committee that took place on September 17.

according to the procedures of a yearly system," said DU Pro-Vice-Chancellor (education) Prof ASM Maksud Kamal.

For the departments that already follow the yearly system, we can take examinations by curtailing the timeline of classes by eight to nine months," he told The Daily Star. While Prof Kamal hoped that the

students would not have to face long session jams, he said a little of it may be inevitable. "Those who are at the end of master's or honours degree may face a jam of some months. But freshers and sophomores will not have to face any session jam," he said.

A week after the country reported its first Covid-19 case on March 8, the DU authorities, like all other educational institutions, suspended academic activities till March 28, only to extend it further. As of the latest

chosen departments will be conducted announcement, the university will remain closed till October 31.

In the first week of July, DU started online classes in all the departments. But the endeavour could not yield much results as many students, especially those who went back to their homes in rural areas, did not have the access to digital devices and internet connections.

This is one of the reasons why some students think that the authorities should not hold examinations right after the reopening, and allow breathing room for such students.

"Not everyone could join the online classes. Considering their situation, the university should not hold examinations right after the reopening," Adnan Ahmed, a final year student of marketing department, told this newspaper.

Have to start from scratch

Says Taposh on bus route rationalisation after finding almost no progress in 2yrs STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Two years after forming the high-powered committee, the new DSCC mayor yesterday found almost no progress in bringing the city buses under six companies and the traffic system under discipline.

Though many decisions were taken in 11 previous meetings, we did not find those implemented properly, except two, for which we have to start the work from the beginning," said Mayor Sheikh Fazle Noor Taposh after holding the 12th meeting of the committee

The government on September 9, 2018 formed the 10-member committee for bus route rationalisation.

Taposh, who chaired the 12th meeting, said a feasibility study has been done and they will be able to take it to a realistic stage centring on two things -- route rationalisation and constructing terminals -- based on the inception report. "We will hold another meeting on November 10," said the mayor.

Responding to the question of pilot route from Ghatarchar to Narayanganj, the mayor said the work is depending on the feasibility study's outcome and will be decided after taking opinion from all stakeholders.

The mayor said it is very unfortunate that many decisions were taken in the previous meetings but were not implemented. Citing examples, he said there was a decision of not issuing any new route permit but authorities concerned already gave them and the initiative to start circular bus services at some places did not continue.

"We are now very serious. Previously it was said the work would be completed by two years..., so we do not want to give any specific time frame," he said.

DNCC Mayor Atiqul islam was also present at the meeting.

Criminal Investigation Department (CID) arrested a machine operator of Directorate General of Health Education (DGHE) on charges of leaking medical and dental admission test question papers.

arrested Abdus Salam from the capital's Banasree area on Monday, Special Superintendent of CID Ashraful Alam told reporters at a briefing at its headquarters. Salam, "one of the masterminds of a question-leak gang", went into hiding after

from the printing press under DGHE. According to CID, Salam used to leak questions from the press for many years, with help from influential department officials. Another accused, Jasim -- who was arrested during the July 19 drive -used to spread the leaked questions all

over the country using a strong network. Through this, they embezzled crores, CID officials said, adding that hundreds of students got enrolled into medical and

dental colleges through this gang. The officials said they came to know through multiple sources that these question papers were printed from the press under Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS) since 1988, and members

Of them, Gittu had been killed in crossfire with Rab on March 2, 2005. The other three, who are in jail, filed separate appeals with the SC challenging the HC verdict.
