Slow ADP fund release causing more delays

Say directors of projects funded by Indian LoC, grant

With railways projects under Indian Line of Credit and grants already facing delays, the project directors have pointed out some issues in implementing the work, which was taken up to boost connectivity among neighbouring countries.

The main issue in all the seven projects -- six being executed under Indian LoC while one with Indian grants -- is halt in fund disbursement from the Annual Development Programme (ADP), after all these were listed as "low priority projects".

Design and land-related disagreement with officials of other projects and agencies concerned and visa-related complications of Indian nationals involved in some of the seven projects, among other issues, were also discussed in a meeting, said railway sources.

Project directors shared the matter with Railways Minister Nurul Islam Suhan when he chaired the Monthly Development Review Meeting on Monday at the capital's Rail Bhavan, the sources said.

After learning about the issues, the minister gave relevant authorities several directives on solving them and asked the project authorities to expedite the work, which slowed down due to Covid-19 pandemic.

Vaccine may be ready by year-end

Says WHO chief

A vaccine against Covid-19 may be ready by year-end, the head of the World Health Organization (WHO) said yesterday, without elaborating.

WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus called for solidarity and political commitment by all leaders to ensure equal distribution of vaccines when they become available.

"We will need vaccines and there is hope that by the end of this year we may have a vaccine. There is hope," Tedros said in closing remarks to the WHO's Executive Board meeting that examined the global response to the pandemic.

The EU health regulator has launched a real-time review of a Covid-19 vaccine developed by US drugmaker Pfizer and Germany's BioNTech, it said yesterday, following a similar announcement for

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MAGISTRATES RUNNING MOBILE COURTS

SC yet to decide if it's legal

The Supreme Court's Appellate Division is yet to settle whether executive magistrates can operate mobile courts legally, although the issue has been pending with it for over three years.

The Appellate Division could not even start hearing government appeals against the High Court verdict that had declared unconstitutional the rules under which executive magistrates run the courts.

The HC scrapped the rules on May 11, 2017, after three writ petitions were filed challenging them.

The hearing was scheduled to take place two and a half years ago and the delay in holding it has halted the final settlement of the issue.

Neither the government nor the writ petitioners has taken any initiative for holding of the hearing. In the meantime, executive magistrates continue to operate mobile courts across the country following a stay order issued by the Appellate Division on the HC verdict.

Contacted, Additional Attorney General Momtaz Uddin Fakir told The Daily Star on Monday that the Appellate Division was now holding hearings, disposing cases and passing ad-interim orders virtually due to the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic.

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102-carat diamond fetches \$15.7m

An exceedingly rare 102-carat flawless white diamond sold for \$15.7 million at an online auction in Hong Kong on Monday evening.

Described as "completely flawless" by auctioneer Sotheby's, the 102.39-carat stone went to an unnamed telephone bidder for HK\$122 million in an auction held online because of the coronavirus pandemic.

"The buyer of this diamond has bagged a bargain," said Tobias Kormind, managing director of online jeweller 77 Diamonds.

During a time of economic uncertainty, he said, "savvy investors are currently falling over themselves to acquire alternative safe haven assets like diamonds, property and gold".

RETURN TO WHITE HOUSE Trump faces backlash for removing mask

His doctor warns president won't be 'entirely out of the woods' for another week

US President Donald Trump faced a backlash yesterday for removing his mask when he returned to the White House and urging Americans not to fear the Covid-19 disease that has killed more than 209,000 people in the country and put him in hospital.

Trump arrived at the White House on Monday in a made-for-television spectacle in which he descended from his Marine One helicopter wearing a white surgical mask, only to remove it as he posed, saluting and waving, on the mansion's South Portico.

"Don't let it dominate you. Don't be afraid of it," Trump said in a video after his return from the Walter Reed Medical Center military hospital outside Washington where he was admitted on Friday for the disease caused by the coronavirus.

"I'm better, and maybe I'm immune - I don't know," he added, flanked by American flags and with the Washington Monument in the background. "Get out there. Be careful."

BLACK HOLE RESEARCH Trio wins Nobel Prize for Physics

Roger Penrose of Britain, Reinhard Genzel of Germany and Andrea Ghez of the US won the Nobel Physics Prize yesterday for their research into black holes, the Nobel jury said.

The physicists were selected "for their discoveries about one of the most exotic phenomena in the universe, the black hole," the Nobel Committee said.

Penrose, 89, was honoured for showing "that the general theory of relativity leads to the formation of black holes", while Genzel, 68, and Ghez, 55, were jointly awarded for discovering "that an invisible and extremely heavy object governs the orbits of stars at the centre of our galaxy," the jury said.

Ghez is just the fourth woman to receive the physics prize since 1901 when the first Nobel prizes were handed out.

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
