Death sentence awaits rapists

Govt to amend law to ensure tougher punishment for rape; proposal to be placed in next cabinet meeting

In the wake of protests over the growing number of rape incidents, the government is going to amend the Women and Children Repression Prevention Act, 2000, to make death sentence the highest punishment for committing rape.

Currently, the highest punishment is life imprisonment.

Law Minister Anisul Huq told The Daily Star yesterday, "Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina last night [Wednesday night] instructed me to prepare a draft for amendment to section-9(1) of the Women and Children Repression Prevention Act, 2000, and to place it before the cabinet on Monday for approval.

"Accordingly, we are in the process for preparing a draft for amending section-9(1) and a few other sections of the act for consideration of the cabinet," he said without giving further details.

According to section-9(1), if any male rapes a woman or a child, he could face rigorous life imprisonment and fines.

The government move came at a time when the country is witnessing vigorous protests over the growing number of incidents of sexual harassment and rape.

The gang-rape of a woman in Noakhali and the video of it being released on social media triggered outraged as anger was already simmering across the country following a string of recent rape incidents.

At least 975 incidents of rapes had happened between January and September 2020, according to Ain O Salish Kendra.

The demand for capital punishment as the highest punishment for rape has been getting louder every day.

5-year-old raped in Noakhali

Teenage girl gangraped in Gazipur

Yet another teenage girl was gang-raped on Wednesday evening in Gazipur while a five-year-old girl was raped in Subarnachar upazila of Noakhali amid ongoing protests against the heinous crime.

The 13-year-old victim used to live with her family members in Tetuibari area under Kashimpur Police Station in Gazipur city. The victim's mother filed a case against two accused yesterday morning.

On Wednesday noon, the victim was staying alone at her residence as her parents went to work. She came out of her residence to find out one of their neighbouring babies.

Even if the actual infections were much higher than the registered cases, it seemed unlikely that Bangladesh and other South Asian countries were already close to the levels that would trigger herd immunity, the global lender said in its latest report on the nations.

"The evidence that those who recover from Covid-19 develop long-term immunity is not very solid. Hence, there is significant uncertainty about the future development of the pandemic in South Asia, and the only relative certainty is that it is unlikely to pass anytime soon," said the report, released yesterday.

The report titled "Beaten or Broken?

Twenty people died from the virus during the same period, taking the total number of deaths to 5,460.

In another development, Mercy Tembon, World Bank's country director for Bangladesh and Bhutan, said the lender would allocate resources to support Bangladesh's plan on obtaining potential vaccine for the virus.

"We shall allocate resources to support Bangladesh's plan to obtain vaccines for its population and prepare a strategic plan for vaccination," she told The Daily Star in reply to a written query, at a telephonic SEE PAGE 2 COL 3

The Nobel Literature Prize went to American poet Louise Gluck, known for themes of childhood and family life that draw inspiration from myths and classical motifs.

Gluck, 77, was honoured "for her unmistakable poetic voice that with austere beauty makes individual existence universal," the Academy said yesterday.

Gluck has previously won the Pulitzer Prize in 1993 for her collection "The Wild Iris", and the National Book Award for her latest collection, "Faithful and Virtuous Night", in 2014.

Students who could have failed the Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC) and its equivalent examinations this year are set to get their certificates as no student will be left behind under the government's new grading system.

Education board officials said over the last five years, 25 to 30 percent examinees sitting for HSC and equivalent exams had failed. But with the government's decision to grade this year's candidates based on their Secondary School Certificate, Junior School Certificate results, 100 percent examinees will pass.

These 25 to 30 percent students, who could have failed in the exams are getting undue privilege," said Professor Siddiqur Rahman, former Director of the Institute of Education and Research at Dhaka University

"This is never acceptable. They will get certificates without achieving qualification to pass the level. They will get some privilege even when enrolling for higher education," said Siddiqur, also a member of the National Education Policy 2010 Formulation Committee.

He pointed out that many students who achieved a lower GPA in SSC exams and would have prepared better for the HSC exams will be deprived under new system.

In Subarnachar, a five year-old-girl was raped by her neighbour, a worker of poultry farm on Wednesday night. The child was admitted to Noakhali General Hospital yesterday.

Police arrested the rapist Helal, 22, yesterday as the victim's father filed a case with Char Jabbarpur Police Station. The court sent the alleged rapist to jail.

After the rape incident at Begumganj, many such incidents like taking nude photos of woman and spreading it on the social media and blackmailing is surfacing.

In Tangail, a woman, wife of an expatriate worker, filed a case against Monjur Rahman, 26, of Haria village in the upazila, with a Tangail Court on September 21 under Pornography Act, alleging him of spreading nude photo, police said.

The woman, mother of a child, told The Daily Star that as her husband works abroad, Monjur, a local land trader, used to tease her.

At one stage, she was involved in a relationship with the youth about two years ago.

"I do not remember when but Monjur took my nude pictures and videos out of my sense. Later in the next one year, he realised total Tk 5 lakh from me in different times threatening me of spreading the picture and video on Facebook," she said.

In Narayanganj, a police member was arrested yesterday on charge of raping a girl.

The accused is Abdul Kuddus Novon, 35, a police constable, whose posting was at Rajarbagh Police Lines.

He allegedly raped the girl, who works at a beauty parlour, multiple times promising her to marry, said Kamrul Fakhrul, officer-in-charge of Shiddhirganj Police Station.

In Barishal, a court on Wednesdav sent four minors, who were accused of gang-raping a five-year-old girl, to Jessore Child Development Center.

The accused, who are aged between nine and 11, gang-raped the girl on Sunday afternoon at Runsi village in Bakerganj upazila.

As the accused are juvenile, they were sent to child development centre instead of jail, said Sudipto Sarker, additional superintendent of police in Barishal.

This is the picture of one of the 8,500 post e-centres, which went through digital transformation under the project titled "Post e-Centre for Rural

Community". The Tk 541 crore project started in 2012 and was completed on June 30, 2017.

People are supposed to use a post e-centre for getting various IT-based services including computer compose, printing photographs, scanning, emails and online test results, according to the website of the Directorate of Posts.

They are also supposed to draw social safety net allowances or get agent banking service and computer training from these e-centres.

Unfortunately, the transformation of the postal services hardly benefits people as most of the e-centres are not functioning.

One of the reasons -- as the government's probe bodies found is widespread corruption and embezzlement of money without fully implementing the project.

website, 5,506 post offices have been converted into e-centres before state minister Tarana Halim assumed office

Under her leadership, all 8,500 post offices were converted into e-centres before schedule, it claimed.

But a large number of people are still unaware of the services that the e-centres provide. Those who know about it find the centres locked for most of the time like the one in Koilain union of Nawabganj. A GOOD INITIATIVE TAINTED

The Anti-Corruption Commission has already started an investigation into the matter and earlier this month, it quizzed the director general.

Even Speaker Shirin Sharmin Chaudhury yesterday called for enactment of strict laws and their enforcement to stop incidents of rape.

Prominent rights activist Nur Khan Liton believes enhancement of punishment would not reduce the number of rape incidents, rather proper implementation of the law could bring the numbers down.

He said there were incidents in which suspects were killed in the socalled gunfights but those did not deter the perpetrators and reduce the number of rape incidents.

"I think proper implementation of the existing law can bring down the number of such incidents. Enhancement of punishment without looking into the real issue would not solve the problem," he told The Daily Star last night.

He said with political patronage, the perpetrators turn into monsters and they think that they would not face trial.

"So, what we need to do is quick trials of such cases and give a clear message that no one would be spared after committing such crimes," he added.

Salma Ali, president of Bangladesh National Women Lawyers Association, said capital punishment could be incorporated in the question of child rape. However, that should be done after long discussions, she said.

Referring to India, she said the Indian government has incorporated death penalty for rape after the 2012 Delhi gang-rape and murder case but the number of rape incidents there did not decline.

"So, I think enhancement of punishment is not enough to bring down the number of rape incidents, she told The Daily Star last night.

She said victims' access to justice has to ensured and to do so several steps have to be taken. The steps include amendment of The Evidence Act and Code of Criminal Procedure, enactment of victim and witness protection act, creation of an environment where women feel secure to continue their legal battle, and compensate victims at the preliminary stage of the case.

"Without these doing enhancement of punishment would not be able to prevent incidents of rape," she added.

Consequently, the World Bank management has asked the executive board to approve additional financing of \$12 billion to help low-income and middle-income countries purchase and distribute vaccines, Mercy Tembon added.

'BANGLADESH TESTS FAR BELOW '

The WB report, which mainly focuses on the coronavirus' devastating impacts on the economies of the region, briefly sheds light on the present state of Covid-19 and the pandemic's impact on the education system in seven South Asian countries.

It said the testing was low and the actual extent of Covid-19 infections in these countries was highly uncertain because of supply constraints, social stigma, and a young population. Due to the social stigma associated

with an infection, many prefer not to get tested in the first place and only seek medical attention when the symptoms are severe, it said.

Besides, as the South Asia's population on average very young, infections are more likely to cause no or only mild symptoms, the report said, adding that testing fees and distrust in the testing facilities result in subdued demand in some places.

"Most South Asian countries fare

benchmark range for adequate testing set by the World Health Organization is between 10 and 30 per confirmed case," the report said.

But Bangladesh is testing far below the range, which makes its recorded numbers particularly uncertain, it said, adding, "Low testing is both a result of supply constraints and subdued demand for testing.

Only Bhutan and Sri Lanka, which have a very few cases per capita, have tested far above that range since March, it added.

The report said while the number of infections per million people varies strongly at the national level, nearly all countries have districts with less than 50 cases per 100,000 people and districts with more than 250 cases per 100,000.

In Bangladesh, less than 10 percent of the districts have less than 50 cases per 100,000 people, the report added.

Apart from advocating for economic relief for the poor and vulnerable, the WB suggested that the government's Covid-19 response should remain a paramount priority, including testing, quarantining and treating patients. 'DROPOUTS, SUBSTANTIAL

It said 19 patients died in hospitals and one at home.

About the age of the deceased, the directorate said 11 were aged above 60, five between 51 and 60, three between 41 and 50 and one between 31 and 40 years. So far, more than half of the deceased

are from Dhaka division, according to the DGHS.

The death rate stood at around 1.46 percent.

The DGHS said the positivity rate for the 24-hour period was 11.43 percent and the overall positivity rate was 18.37 percent.

In the same 24 hours, a total of 1,685 Covid-19 patients recovered, taking the total number of recoveries to 288,316, which is almost 77 percent of all confirmed cases.

The evaluation of the candidates would be published by December this year, Education Minister Dipu Moni said. About 13.65 lakh candidates were expected to sit for HSC exams this year. According to education board officials, a total of 13,36,629 students sat for HSC and equivalent exams in 2019 and 26.02 percent failed.

The fail rate was 33.36 percent in 2018, 31.09 percent in 2017, 25.3 percent in 2016 and 30.4 percent in 2015.

While talking to this newspaper, highly-placed Dhaka Education Board officials said allowing all students to pass was not a wise move.

"It will create a precedence. If we cannot hold the SSC and equivalent exams in February next year due to Covid-19, we will also need to allow all of them to pass the exams based on their previous exams," said an official.

Another official said this year's Primary Education Completion, its equivalent exams and Junior School Certificate and its equivalent exams were also cancelled due to the pandemic.

"So far the decision was that these students would need to sit for an exam at school. Even they were not allowed a 100 percent pass rate," he said.

Both officials said alongside JSC and SSC exam results, the government can look into the results of the qualifying test for the HSC exam while assigning grades to HSC candidates.

Dipu Moni, while announcing the government's decision on Wednesday. said they would not take the result of the HSC qualifying test into consideration as these exams held at schools and colleges were not of the same standard.

When asked about many students getting the undue privilege, Dhaka Education Board Chairman Prof Ziaul Haque and Mymensingh Education Board Chairman Prof Gazi Hasan Kamal said the decision was made due to special circumstances.

"Some of the students will get some benefits; at this moment we cannot do anything," said Ziaul, also chief of the inter-education board coordination sub-committee.

HSC and equivalent exams slated for April 1 were postponed on March 22 to help curb coronavirus transmission.

The government postponed the exams following the closure of all educational institutions on March 17. They are to stay closed at least until October 30.

"The voices of Dido, Persephone, and Eurydice -- the abandoned, the punished, the betrayed -- are masks for a self in transformation, as personal as it is universally valid.

Her collections "The Triumph of Achilles" (1985) and "Ararat" (1990) address "almost brutally straightforward images of painful family relations", the jury said, noting that her use of a "deceptively natural tone is striking", with "no trace of poetic ornament."

Gluck is also a poet of radical change and rebirth, describing in her poem "Snowdrops" the miraculous return of life after winter, her work often marked by "humour and biting wit".

A man allegedly sexually abused four children over the course of a week, luring them with candy, in the capital's Khilgaon area

The victims, aged between six and nine, were sent to one-stop crisis centre at Dhaka Medical College Hospital on Wednesday night for medical tests.

Police arrested the accused, Sazal Mollah (55) after victims' families filed a case last evening in this regard, said Faruqul Alam, officer-in-charge of Khilgaon Police Station.

The OC said the children live near Sazal's home in Goran area, and that Sazal is a rickshaw puller.

Quoting victims' families, police said Sazal used to lure the children with candy to his home and sexually abused them.

He had been doing this for several days, Farugul added.

The families came to know about it and filed a case under Women and Children Repression Prevention Act.

Sazal will be sent to court with a remand prayer today, said the Khilgaon Police Station OC.

ATTACK ON HASINA'S MOTORCADE HC clears way to resume trial STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The High Court yesterday cleared the way for the lower court concerned to resume the trial proceedings of a case filed over the attack on motorcade of the then opposition leader and now Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in Satkhira in 2002

The court lifted its stay order and also discharged the rule issued more than three years back, questioning the proceedings. It also directed the trial court to finish the trial proceedings in three months.

The HC bench of Justice Mustafa Zaman Islam and Justice Md Kamrul Hossain delivered the verdict after virtually holding hearing on the rule.

AM Mahbub Uddin Khokon, the lawyer for Rakib alias Rakibur Rahman, an accused of the case, told The Daily Star that the HC has discharged the rule as the trial court has recorded the statements from the witnesses.

Mahbub Uddin, however, said his client will move an appeal before the Appellate Division, challenging the HC order as he was 10 years old during the incident.

The case is now pending with the chief judicial magistrate court in Satkhira, he informed. Following a petition filed by Rakib, another HC bench

on August 23, 2017 stayed the trial proceedings. During hearing on the rule recently, Mahbub Uddin



Says chief justice

The Supreme Court yesterday modified its verdict in the sensational Gopal Krishna Muhuri murder case of Chattogram.

Around 50 percent of irregularities at the Supreme Court will be reduced if cases are filed centrally, said Chief Justice Syed Mahmud Hossain on Wednesday.

"If we don't find out the root of the problems, irregularities will not be dispelled...," he said without elaborating the irregularities.

He made the comment while speaking as chief guest at a meeting organised in memory of late Attorney General Mahbubey Alam who passed away on September 27.

Law Reporters Forum (LRF) organised the event at the Supreme Court Bar Association auditorium.

Mahmud Hossain said, "Mahbubey Alam had told me that all the irregularities at the court must be stopped and he also said if a central system (of filing cases) is introduced, the irregularities will be prevented."

"I want his wish to be implemented. No case will be heard and disposed of from now on breaking the serial," the chief justice said.

He also asked journalists to publish reports on SC verdicts regarding confirmation of death sentences of convicts along with verdicts of the acquittals of accused.

He said the government is embarrassed at the incidents of rape as a minister reportedly said the government cannot avoid the responsibility of the incidents. "We, who are in the judiciary, also want proper trial of the incidents," he said.

Reminiscing works and life of Mahbubey Alam, the chief justice praved for eternal peace and salvation of his departed soul.

Law Minister Anisul Huq, who spoke as special guest, told the meeting that the late attorney general never compromised with his non-communal belief and spirit of the Liberation War.

He never backtracked from protecting the independence and dignity of the judiciary. "If the rare qualities of Mahbubey Alam are followed, he will be honoured properly," the minister said.

Fisheries and Livestock Minister SM Rezaul Karim said giving false enrolment certificates by the Bangladesh Bar Council has been stopped through the sole attempts of Mahbubey Alam as its chairman.

The judiciary has accepted and recorded many of his (Mahbubey Alam) arguments, he said, adding that research on Mahbubey Alam needs to take place.

Justice Obaidul Hassan, a judge of the SC's Appellate Division; State Minister for Civil Aviation and Tourism Mahbub Ali; High Court judges Justice M Enayetur Rahim and Jahangir Hossain Selim; former Appellate Division judge Justice AHM Shamsuddin Choudhury Manik; SCBA President AM Amin Uddin, Additional Attorney General Murad Reza, SCBA Secretary Md Ruhul Quddus Kazal, SC lawyer KM Saifuddin and LRF President Mashudul Hoque also spoke.

In the modified verdict, the SC fined Tk 50,000 to each three convicts whose death sentences were commuted to imprisonment till their natural death.

In the default to pay the fine, the convicts will have to serve imprisonment for more one year, the SC said in the modified judgement, Deputy Attorney General Amit Das Gupta told The Daily Star.

He said a three-member bench of the Appellate Division headed by Justice Muhammad Imman Ali modified its verdict on suomuto (voluntary) move as there is a provision for fining along with the life imprisonment until death under Section 302 of the Penal Code.

On October 6, the SC, inadvertently, did not mention the punishment of fining in its verdict, said the DAG.

Meanwhile, Khandker Mahbub Hossain, a lawyer for convict Alamgir Kabir alias Baitta Alamgir, said his client will move a review petition.

He said the fine is a must along with the imprisonment as per Section 302. But how will the convicts serve imprisonment for one more year after they die if they don't pay fine? he said.

The ground on which the apex court delivered the verdict could not be known as its full text is yet to be released.

On October 6, the Appellate Division bench had delivered the verdict in Gopal Krishna Muhuri murder case after hearing the appeals of three convicts against the High Court judgement.

In the verdict, the apex court commuted the death sentence of three convicts -- Azam, Alamgir Kabir alias Baitta Alamgir and Taslim Uddin Montu to imprisonment till their natural death.

3 personal safety apps for travelling

A woman can't really walk through the city streets alone without feeling that uneasy need to look over the shoulder. Bangladesh saw an increase in rape by 19 percent from 2018 to 2019. This year seems to be competing with incidents of sexual assault, kidnapping and violence against women and children. Following are a list of personal safety apps that that are a nobrainer for women that need to increase their chances of safety while travelling.

LIFE360 FAMILY LOCATOR APP

You sync family members and friends in one place for a single texting thread. The app notifies family when you reach a particular destination while providing real-time info of your whereabouts. You can also limit the number of people who can track your whereabouts. This is great if you need to travel for work.

MY SAFETIPIN

This app shows up on a regular basis as one of the top safety apps. I tried it and it is quite simple to use with an easy interface. It has GPS location tracking and auto calling of preset emergency contact numbers.

It also suggests areas safe nearby while allowing you to give ratings according to how safe or unsafe you consider a particular location. The data is collected based on number of women and children around, the population density and availability of public transport.

WOMEN SAFETY

While the other apps send messages to emergency numbers, this one also sends emails containing your location and a Google Maps link to preselected people. The app also takes and sends two pictures from your phone's camera along with a video/audio clip.

It has quick react buttons of three colours for three categories. Obviously red will directly inform someone of a dangerous situation that you are in. Basically, if you think you are in a difficult situation, you would have to get hold of your smartphone and press



the button from the app. The one major flaw is it has ads that pop up.

KEEP IN MIND:

These apps won't prevent trouble. And taking out a phone may not always be possible. But having technology to assist means you have that one extra factor aiding your safety. We have had a few local apps come up tackling this issue. Apps like Joy 109 was launched couple years back but now it is nowhere to be found. BD 999 is a promising app but it wouldn't let me register. It alerts Bangladesh Police by sending emergency messages along with your location and a quick video with subsequent updates. Also, all these apps require GPS which will drain the battery faster so keep your smartphone charged and preferably carry a powerbank to top up.

BCL Leader Sudipto Murder

No charge sheet in three years ARUN BIKASH DEY, CTG

Three years have passed since BCL leader of Chattogram city unit Sudipto Biswas was brutally killed, his family still awaits justice.

Sudipto, a master's student of Government City College and an assistant general secretary of the city unit of BCL, was beaten to death in front of his house in port city's Sadarghat area on October 6, 2017.

According to police and family, a group of people arrived in the area by eight to nine auto-rickshaws and motorbikes and murdered Sudipto.

Sudipto's father Meghnath Biswas filed a case with Sadarghat Police Station accusing seven to eight unknown persons that day. Later, the case was transferred to Police Bureau of Investigation, who are yet to submit a charge sheet.

PBI sources said police arrested 18

people, mostly BCL activists, in the and such outspokenness may have case. Of them, 16 are now on bail. Sudipto's peers and followers alleged that Didarul Alam Masum, a

former BCL leader of the college and general secretary of Lalkhan Bazar ward unit of Awami League, plotted the killing.

Masum, however, denied the allegation, claiming that it's a "conspiracy" against him by his rivals.

Sudipto's father, who retired from a primary school as a headteacher seven years ago, recently told The Daily Star that all he wants is justice. "PBI has been assuring us of submitting a charge sheet for a long time, but to no avail," he added. According to a number of BCL leaders and investigators, Sudipto was vocal against "misconducts" in student organisations and wanted an end to it.

On Facebook, he often criticised senior leaders known as "big brothers"

led to his murder, they said. Two days before his murder, he wrote that a leader is nothing without his/her activists and activists should revolt to achieve something.

Nurul Azim Roni, former general secretary of Chattogram city unit of BCL, alleged that law enforcers are "wasting time". They have enough evidence -- including CCTV footage to submit the charge sheet, he claimed.

Asked, PBI Inspector Santosh Kumar Chakma, the case's investigation officer, said they got all the relevant CCTV, audio and video footage, and seized seven auto-rickshaws and a motorbike.

"The investigation is at final stage. I'm waiting for a court order to verify Facebook profile of an accused. The court fixed October 12 for the hearing. I think, I would be able to file the charge sheet this month," said Santosh.

'NOT REPORTED EARLIER OUT OF FEAR'

On Wednesday, talking to reporters in presence of police, the uncle of the victim (20), also a worker of a local cap factory, said after the incident, the girls said they were assaulted and not raped.

"We did not report it because of the threats issued by the gang members," he said.

"As a video of the incident was leaked somehow three days ago, we came to know that my niece was gang-raped," he said, adding that his niece left her job and went back to her village.

According to police and locals, after the video came to light, Akram, a local businessman and father of Sharuf, tried to mitigate the issue by providing spot.

Akram admitted to a journalist over phone that he collected money from parents of the other gang members to pay the victim family and settle the matter outside court.

The Daily Star has a copy of the conversation.

Earlier during a visit to Akram's house in Vadhail area on Wednesday, all members of the house were found to be in hiding.

A NOTORIOUS GANG

Visiting the area, this correspondent spoke to at least 10 locals and came to know that a group of 20 to 25 teenagers were involved in criminal activities there, including taking drugs. The gang members also sometime engaged in altercation with another group.

"The teenagers used to gather in the area and committed crimes but we could not protest in fear as they were rowdy," said Montaz Uddin, who farms vegetables next to the crime

Ariful, who is an agro entrepreneur by profession, said he came up with the idea in 2009, when he was still a student of Southeast University.

Md Mizanur Rahman Babu, executive member of YFB's central committee, said they run the hotel by a Tk 10 contribution from each of their 265 members everyday. The food distribution programme is run by this Tk 80,000-ish they raise every month, said Babu, a lecturer at University of Information Technology and Sciences.

The organisation could've just made the food free, but Ariful said they want to inspire people into action. "When we first opened shop, a 10-yearold boy named Jahid used to come and eat for free, without performing any good deeds. However, after a few days, we came to know that he started watering a roadside flower tree. These kind of stories inspire us a lot."

In addition to this project, YFB has been running various other programmes to support people in need since 2012, Arif said.

He said he is hopeful that this experimental method of inspiring action will work, and if it does, they will look to expand it to a greater extent.

Never-ending flood woes of Basail

Nearly 30,000 people in the low lying upazila of Tangail have been marooned

The low lying areas in Basail upazila still remain under water while floodwater receded in other 11 upazilas of the district. The situation has made life of thousands of people miserable in the low-lying upazila for the last few months.

Several rivers including Jhenai, a branch of Jamuna, and Banshi, a branch of Brahmaputra, pass through Basail. Moreover, there are numerous water bodies in the upazila.

Water level of the rivers has increased for the last few days. Waters then entered through different points overflowing the beels and canals in Basail. As a result, more than 30,000 people of different villages in six unions of the upazila have been marooned again.

The worst affected villages are Kanchanpur, Adajan, Purbo Poulee, Singardak and Saidampur under Kanchanpur union and Moytha, Karatiapara, Aishora, Akdhala, Balia and Tironcha under Fulki union, and Maijdhara, Borni Kishori, Basail Dakkhinpara under Basail municipality, and Badiajan, Gumnibari, Barctha, Kolyanpur, Kawaljani and Sehrail under Kawaljani union and Bathuli Sadi and Baghil-Fulbari under Kashil union, and Rashora, Mirikpur, Naikanbari and Habla under Basail Sadar union.



The flood affected people were facing acute crisis of safe drinking water and fodder for their cattle, locals said.

Mamunur Rashid Khan, chairman of Kanchanpur union parishad (UP), said the road communication between the upazila headquarters and the union has remained disrupted due to the floodwater, causing immense sufferings to people of 22 villages.

Rozdid Ahmed, upazila engineer of Local Government and Engineering Department (LGED) in Basail, said two important bridges in the area have been damaged by floods in July.

Around 70 kilometers of earthen roads and 20 kilometers of concrete roads were damaged by the two phases of floods, said the LGED engineer.

Md Shakhawat Hossain, project implementation officer (PIO) in Basail, said water level of the rivers has recently increased, flooding several areas in the upazila. Several union parishad chairmen have been asked to prepare lists of the damages. Necessary steps will be taken after visiting

the affected areas, said the PIO.

Kazi Alid Islam, upazila parishad chairman in Basail, said Basail is the low lying area. This year, the upazila has been badly affected due to the prolonged floods.

Moreover, increasing water level of the rivers for the last few days entered through different points, flooding fresh areas in the upazila including Fulki, Kashil, Kawaljani, Kanchanpur, Basail Sadar, Habla and Basail municipality, he said.

Contacted, Md Sirajul Islam, executive engineer of Water Development Board (WDB) in Tangail, said some low lying areas were inundated after water level of the rivers, including Jamuna, has increased for the last few days.

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Prize launched to solve planet's biggest problems

Britain's Prince William yesterday launched a "prestigious" environmental prize aimed at turning "pessimism into optimism" by rewarding innovative solutions to the planet's biggest problems.

The Earthshot Prize will present five £1 million (\$1.3-million, 1.1-million-euro) awards each year for the next 10 years, to "incentivise change and help to repair our planet," said his office in London.

The jury will include a host of high-profile global figures, including Queen Rania of Jordan, Australian actress Cate Blanchett, British naturalist David Attenborough and the Colombian singer Shakira.

Kensington Palace described it as the "most prestigious

global environment prize in history" and said it was inspired by US president John F. Kennedy's "Moonshot" project in the 1960s to put a man on the moon.

"We need to find solutions to be able to live our lives and enjoy our lives and not feel guilty and bad about some of the things we do," the prince, who is second in line to the throne, told BBC Radio 4 in an interview aired Thursday.

"That ultimately has to change, because I also worry from a mental health point of view, the anxiety and the worry that many of these younger generations are going to have."

He said he hopes the prize will "galvanise and bring together the best minds, the best possible solutions, to fixing and tackling some of the world's greatest environmental challenges".

"The next 10 years are a critical decade for change. Time is of the essence, which is why we believe that this very ambitious global prize is the only way forward."

The project is centred around five "simple but ambitious" aims to be met by 2030: "protect and restore nature", "clean our air", "revive our oceans", "build a waste-free world", and "fix our climate".

The prize is supported by coalition of individuals, organisations and businesses with the winners to be announced each year at a

ceremony in a different city around the globe, starting with London in 2021.

Prizes can be awarded to individuals or teams, whether they be scientists, activists, economists, governments, business leaders or even countries.

"The Earthshot Prize aims to turn the current pessimism surrounding environmental issues into optimism that we can rise to the biggest challenges of our time," said the palace.

"But the Prize is about much more than awarding achievement -- it is a decade of action to ... inspire people all over the world to work together to repair the planet."

Trump says on his Covid infection as he readies for campaign

US President Donald Trump has declared his Covid-19 illness a "blessing from God," as he got back to work in the Oval Office despite warnings that his return could put others at risk.

Trump has worked hard since he checked out of the hospital on Monday -- including a made-fortelevision return to the White House -- to cast his illness as a personal triumph.

"I think this is a blessing from God that I caught it," Trump said in a video, referring to the virus which has killed over 210,000 people in the United States.

But Democrat Joe Biden, who leads Trump in the latest polls ahead of the November 3 vote, attacked the president's downplaying of the risk.

"I think it's a tragedy that the president deals with Covid like it is



something not to worry about when over 210,000 people (in the US) have died," Biden told reporters.

Trump, confined to the White House where he is being treated, yesterday said he does not believe he is contagious and is feeling good enough to resume campaign rallies as he tries to boost his flagging reelection bid.

"I'm back because I'm a perfect physical specimen," Trump told Fox Business Network's Maria Bartiromo

in his first interview since it was revealed nearly a week ago that he had tested positive for the coronavirus.

Trump's contention he was no longer contagious was not yet backed up by solid evidence from his doctors. The White House has refused to say when his last negative test for the virus was and, as a result, it is unclear how long he has been positive.

The Republican president is under pressure to actively campaign again to try to inject new energy into his reelection bid as he faces a deficit in opinion polls in battleground states with Election Day now less than four eeks awav

"I'm feeling good, really good," said Trump, who spent three nights being treated at a military hospital outside Washington until his discharge on Monday. Trump said he had stopped taking "most therapeutics" for the virus but was still on steroids.

Trump calls Kamala Harris a 'monster'

US President Donald Trump yesterday called Kamala Harris, who is making US history as the first Black woman vice presidential candidate, a "monster.' Trump, far behind in the contest for the

White House on November 3 and doing especially badly in polling of women voters,

used the word twice, calling the Democrat "this monster." Speaking to Fox Business News for almost an hour in his first interview since falling sick with the coronavirus, Trump said Vice President Mike Pence "destroyed" Harris in their debate Wednesday in Utah.

"Everything she says is a lie," Trump said.

Harris, who is also the first person of Indian descent to be on a White House ticket, spent most of her debate attacking Trump for presiding over what she said was "the greatest failure of any presidential administration in the history of our country" over Covid-19.

In the Fox interview, Trump once more branded Biden, who is leading handily in almost every significant opinion poll around the country, "not mentally capable." "Everybody knows that," Trump claimed, predicting Biden won't be president for two months.

Trump, who for months has slurred Biden as senile and previously called Harris "nasty," also revived one of his darkest claims as a politician -- that illegal Latin American immigrants equate to serious criminals. Democrats "want to have thousands of people that are murderers, rapists, just pour into our country. They could be very sick people," he said.



Lawmakers voted late Wednesday to press the bloc to slash emissions by at least 60 percent by 2030 -- a bigger cut than currently proposed by the European Commission, the EU executive. MEPs also demanded an interim target be set for 2040 to ensure the bloc meets its plan to be climate neutral by 2050. The calls form part of parliament's negotiating platform for talks with member states to agree the final form of the EU climate law, which will be binding. Ambitious climate goals are backed by big EU powers including France and Germany, as well as many major businesses, but face resistance from eastern member states still dependent on coal for energy. EU leaders will try to agree on a common position at a summit in Brussels next week.

NZ PM Ardern poised for big win in election: poll

New Zealand Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern's party is projected to be one seat short of a being able to govern alone, and has a double-digit lead over its rival, with just over a week to the general election, an opinion poll showed yesterday. The closely watched 1News-Colmar Brunton poll showed support for Ardern's Labour party, which is seeking a second term in office, at 47%, unchanged from the last poll on Sept. 28. This means Labour, which is campaigning on its record of bringing the coronavirus p under control within New Zealand's borders, would have 60 seats in parliament, one short of the 61 seats needed to form a government. Support for its coalition partner the Green Party was at 6%, which would give it eight seats. New Zealand heads to the polls on Oct 17 and advance voting began on Saturday.

Ready to 'play hardball'

Say France, Germany as they push sanctions against Russia

The EU must stand up to Russia when it violates international norms, France and Germany's foreign ministers said on Thursday, adding that a decision to push sanctions over the poisoning of a Kremlin critic Alexei Navalny did not end dialogue.

France and Germany said on Wednesday

they would propose European Union sanctions against Russian individuals after receiving no credible answers from Moscow over the use a nerve agent on Navalny.

Several Western governments have said Russia, which has denied accusations by Navalny that it was involved in poisoning him in August, must help in investigations or face consequences.

'Dialogue is not an excuse for playing for time. We must be very clear: dialogue with Russia does not mean doing it a favour," France's Foreign Minister Jean-Yves Le Drian told a security conference in Bratislava.

"It does not mean abandoning our ambition to build a peaceful continent. On the contrary, it means defending this ambition by asserting

firmness ... and getting ready to play hardball whenever necessary.

Speaking at the same conference, Le Drian's German counterpart Heiko Maas echoed those comments. We need to be able to play hardball but at the same time we must never let dialogue be stopped, Maas said, according to a translation into English. "We need Russia to solve the conflicts in

Syria, in Libya, in Ukraine."

EU foreign ministers are expected to give their political support for sanctions on

Monday, but they are not expected to be approved immediately as legal texts must be prepared and cleared by experts from the 27 EU states.

The decision and speed with which Europe's two main powers agreed to push ahead with sanctions suggested a hardening of the bloc's diplomacy towards Moscow, which said on Wednesday that it no longer considered "business as usual" to be possible with Berlin and Paris.

French President Emmanuel Macron has tried to reduce distrust between Russia and the West since coming to power in 2017, hoping to enlist Russian help in solving the world's most intractable crises.

Kuwait's new Crown Prince Sheikh Meshal al-Ahmad al-Sabah took the oath of office in parliament yesterday, pledging the Gulf Arab state's commitment to democracy and peace and calling on Kuwaitis to shun divisions. The assembly unanimously endorsed the octogenarian Sheikh Meshal for the role in what has been a smooth succession that retained power firmly within the ruling family's oldest ranks following last week's death of Emir Sheikh Sabah al-Ahmad. New ruler Emir Sheikh Nawaf al-Ahmad, 83, assumed power last

Wednesday in the US-allied OPEC member state as it faces a liquidity crunch caused by low oil prices and the Covid-19 pandemic against the backdrop of continued tensions between larger neighbours Saudi Arabia and Iran.

'GET LOST'

Taiwan reacts as China tells Indian media not to call it a country

China was accused by Taiwan of trying to impose censorship in India after its embassy in New Delhi advised journalists to observe the "one-China" principle after newspapers carried advertisements for Taiwan's national day.

China's hackles were raised on Wednesday by advertisements placed in leading Indian newspapers by Taiwan's government to mark the democratic, Chinese-claimed island's national day tomorrow.

The advertisement carried a photograph of President Tsai Ing-wen and hailed India, a fellow democracy, as a natural partner of Taiwan.

China, which claims Taiwan and regards it as a wayward province, made its displeasure evident in an e-mail sent by its embassy on Wednesday night to journalists in India, including Reuters.

"Regarding the so-called forthcoming 'National Day of Taiwan', the Chinese Embassy in India would like to remind our media friends that there is only one China in the world. ... We hope Indian media can stick to Indian government's position on Taiwan question and do not violate the 'One China' principle," the embassy said.

"In particular, Taiwan shall not be referred to as a 'country (nation)' or 'Republic of China' or the leader of China's Taiwan region as 'President', so as not to send the wrong signals to the general public."

Taiwan Foreign Minister Joseph Wu scoffed at Beijing's advice to Indian media."India is the largest democracy on Earth with a vibrant press & freedom-loving people. But it looks like communist #China is hoping to march into the subcontinent by imposing censorship. #Taiwan's Indian friends will have one reply: GET LOST!" he said in a tweet.

New Delhi has no formal diplomatic relations with Taipei, but both sides have close business and cultural ties.

AFGHAN TROOPS WITHDRAWAL Trump announces 'Christmas' plan

All US troops in Afghanistan should be "home by Christmas," President Donald Trump said on Wednesday, just hours after his national security adviser said Washington would reduce its forces in Afghanistan to 2,500 by early next year.

Trump and other officials have said the United States will go down to between 4,000 and 5,000 troops in Afghanistan around November. Beyond that, officials have said that a reduction will depend on conditions in Afghanistan.

On Twitter, Trump said: "We should have the small remaining number of our BRAVE Men and Women serving in Afghanistan home by Christmas!"

It was unclear whether Trump was giving an order or verbalizing a long-held aspiration

Trump has made walking away from "ridiculous endless wars" the cornerstone of his foreign policy, even though thousands of troops remain in Iraq, Syria and Afghanistan.

The Taliban welcomed Trump's comments saying it will help peace talks being held in Doha, Qatar.

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE GIRL CHILD SPECIAL Nandita Suraksha: Enabling women and children across the country

Nandita Suraksha started their journey in April 2019 as a non-profit voluntary organisation, with an aim to support underprivileged women and children across the country. The organisation intends to ensure gender equality through social and economic empowerment of women and girls, as well as the creation of safe spaces for them. Ahead of International Day of the Girl Child (October 11), we caught up with the team to find out more about their projects.

"Women in our country face threatening situations on a daily basis. We aim to protect them and build secure futures for them," shares Tahiyatul Jannat Remi, Founder and President, Nandita Suraksha. "We work as fearless soldiers to ensure and protect the safety rights of women and children." In 2018, Remi, a student of Govt Sarda Sundari Mahila College, established a free school, Hashimukh Pathshala, which is now run by Nandita Suraksha's team. 35 young children are currently enrolled in the free school.

The organisation has reached out to 9,000 children and 3,000 parents in several primary schools across the country, encouraging open discussions on the differences between good touch and bad touch, among other subjects. Along with discussions and awareness campaigns, Nandita Suraksha's team provided emergency menstruation kits to primary and secondary schools, reaching out to 30 educational institutes. "Nearly 86 percent of women and girls in our country still use cloths instead of sanitary napkins, and are unaware of the diseases a lack of proper menstrual hygiene can cause," adds Remi.

Nandita Suraksha's team also organises medical camps and conducts tree plantation drives with rural women and children. Their project, 'Pashe Ache Nanditara', extends support to women, children, elderly, disabled and transgender people in times of need.

"While studying child development, I had to visit different places for surveys. I've grown up listening to people's plights through Nandita Suraksha," says Nafisa Mim, a volunteer of the organisation. "We aim to connect with people and initiate impactful conversations."

In 2019, the organisation launched a self-defence course to equip women from all walks of life with basic self-defence skills at an affordable cost. At present, 50 women are enrolled in this course.

Nandita Shuroksha's team started their COVID-19 initiatives in March by providing necessary hygiene products to 500 people. They also provided menstrual kits to 500 women from underprivileged communities in Faridpur. During Ramadan, they provid-

ed iftar packets to 650 people in Faridpur, Jhalkathi and Barishal.

Recently in Faridpur, 30 unions were flooded. With the collapse of the dam in Sadipur, hundreds of villages were waterlogged. Nandita Suraksha's team, in collaboration with the district administration of Faridpur, recently provided menstrual kits and other necessary items to the flood affected families.

Though other relief programmes provide people in these areas with food and other items, sanitary napkins and other menstrual necessities are largely ignored. Under their initiative, 500 women in these waterlogged areas were provided with menstrual kits, including sanitary napkins, underpants and soaps, among other things. Recently, Amal Foundation partnered up with Nandita Suraksha to distribute sanitary napkins and other hygiene products in Faridpur.

Their team also conducts discussions on sexual harassment, menstrual hygiene, child marriage, online harassment and mental health issues, among other things, under their project, 'Aparajita Suraksha', with an aim to provide necessary information to women living in the most remote areas of every upazila. Amid the COVID-19 pandemic, the organisation launched an emergency helpline to provide assistance against sexual assault, child marriages and online harassment for women. The virtual platform will also provide necessary support with the help of the administrations in nine upazilas of the country.

With 40 active members across the country, Nandita Suraksha's team reached out to 18,000 women and children so far through their different projects. To support underprivileged communities, the organisation works mostly in remote villages, densely populated areas and slums. They recently expanded their initiatives in Dhaka as well, and are working to launch their projects in Rangamati and Rajbari. "We dream to provide a platform to young individuals, who dare to stand beside people in the face of adversities," concludes Remi.

'Bolte Pari Na Bolte Chai', a supportive space for a heart-to-heart

To this day, mental health remains one of the most neglected subjects in developing countries like Bangladesh. Despite the sheer number of people living with traumatic experiences and mental health issues, it is not uncommon for many of us to feel isolated and alone. Ahead of World Mental Health Day tomorrow (October 10), we had a conversation with Sumaiya Kabir, also known as RJ Arunima, about her newly launched podcast, Shadhin Music App's *Bolte Pari Na Bolte Chai*, where people open up about their most guarded secrets and their hardest life experiences.

RJ Arunima has been associated with radio since 2013. With her signature show, *Ek Cup Bikel* on Radio Foorti, she became a household voice. She recently made her comeback with *Bolte Pari Na Bolte Chai*, a show designed with true stories from callers who struggle to talk about their upsetting life experiences, even with their close ones. Guests on the show can remain anonymous.

"I am not a psychologist or a psychiatrist, but I think at times, we just need to lend an ear to others. I hope to be that listener and that friend to our guests. The show offers a non-judgmental space for them," says the host.

With the coronavirus crisis taking a toll on people's mental health, this year felt like the right time to start the show. "Shadhin Music App came to me with the concept when we saw a rise in cases of depression, with people staying indoors during the pandemic. We planned the show in just two months," RJ Arunima shares. The weekly podcast kicked off on September 19.

Returning to her favourite medium was a huge relief for the RJ. "I've always enjoyed connecting with people through my voice. I really like how different people respond differently to me," she says.

So far, only female guests have participated in the podcast. However, it will feature a male participant soon. "Men are reluctant to open up about their feelings and embrace vulnerability, mainly because of social stigmas," says RJ Arunima. With her show, she hopes to have heartfelt talks with the guests and encourage others to open up about their struggles as well. "Our traumas and suppressed emotions often lead to mental health issues. The more we talk about our issues, the more aware people will be," she concludes.

Political patronage of rapists, criminals must stop

Why was Delwar not arrested for his previous crimes?

S is the case with most rapists and criminals in the country, Delwar Hossain, the prime accused ∠ ▲ in the recent gang-rape case in Noakhali, was also engaged in various crimes under the patronage of local politicians from both the ruling Awami League and the BNP. Reportedly, after the 2014 elections, Delwar joined Jubo League's politics and formed "Delwar Bahini" which has 40-50 members. Before joining the AL youth wing's politics, Delwar used to be a follower of a BNP-leaning criminal and was engaged in different criminal activities in his area. Although "Delwar Bahini" committed crimes like rape, extortion, land grabbing and robbery, and used drugs to recruit youths of the village to the "Bahini", unfortunately, people of his village and of the entire upazila were so afraid of him that they never dared to speak up against any of his crimes.

According to the Begumganj circle's Additional Superintendent of Police, Delwar is a wanted criminal in three cases—two for murder and one for possessing illegal arms. However, he was never arrested and used to move around freely in the village. The impunity enjoyed by Delwar and his gang only emboldened them to commit more crimes and become more ferocious. The recent gangrape and torture of a woman in Noakhali is a horrifying example of what happens when identified criminals go unpunished. According to the National Human Rights Commission, Delwar previously raped the survivor of the gang-rape in Noakhali multiple times at gunpoint. Needless to say, he has always gone scot free with impunity because of his affiliation with local ruling party leaders.

There is a dangerous similarity in most of the rape incidents that have taken place recently across the country-most of the rapists were somehow affiliated with the ruling party's student or youth wings. We have seen it in the case of the recent gang rape of Sylhet's MC college where all the rapists were involved with Bangladesh Chhatra League. Evidently, such horrible, inhuman crimes cannot take place without any political patronage.

Therefore, first and foremost, the ruling party leaders must stop patronising these identified criminals in the party in order to stop crimes like rape and break the existing culture of impunity. At the same time, the law enforcement agencies should be given the freedom to do their duty without any political influence. If Delwar was arrested for his previous crimes, the woman in Noakhali could have been saved from being gang-raped and tortured by him and his gang members.

Stranded, despite nod from government

Apprehend syndicates that are exploiting helpless migrant workers

OLLOWING the suspension of international flights, → the government recently permitted their resumption, but due to the soaring demand for tickets and the imited frequency of flights, many expatriate workers, especially those based in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, are in danger of losing their jobs if they cannot travel on time. We are dismayed to learn from a recent report in this daily that a syndicate of travel agents and a section of officials of Biman Bangladesh Airlines are cashing in on this crisis and taking money from the workers in return for confirming their tickets. Some agencies are working on social media as well to avoid detection. Despite Biman's claim-that tickets are only reissued to those who have return tickets for flights to KSA, and the service can be availed free of cost from Biman's sales centres as no other agency was given permission to reissue Biman tickets—the migrants who fell victim to this trap claimed they had to pay somewhere from Tk 25,000 to Tk 40,000 to officials of respective airlines to have their return tickets reissued. If our national carrier is confident about its own claim, then who are these middlemen meddling to make a quick buck? Though it is reassuring to know that the Saudi government has extended the validity of visas till October 30, given the fact that around 55,000 Bangladeshi expatriates returned from KSA amidst the pandemic, if we are to send our migrant workers back by the revised deadline, we must realise that time is of the essence. And if they have to fall victim to such corruption where they need to pay "additional" amounts despite the tightening noose on their income, it will further delay their return. The sooner they go back, the sooner they can send back remittance that has proven all the more crucial for our economy, both pre- and post-Covid. The authorities must immediately investigate the matter and bring these syndicates to book. At the same time, they must ensure the timely return of the stranded migrant workers so they can resume their work.

cannot pick and choose the victims we think did not "deserve" it and show them our support, while others are raped over and over again—by the rapists, at the police station, the hospital, in court, in the media, and with our own judgment. Neither can we choose to punish some perpetrators and not others based on their money, political influence, official positions, or simply whether or not they fit our "image" of a rapist. If rape is not okay, every incident needs to be reported, every case filed, taken to court and issued a prompt and fair judgment, with severe punishment for the perpetrator which will serve to deter every other potential rapist.

If rape is not okay, change must come at every level, from changes in the law in order to make it more relevant to crimes committed today, to changes in our culture, society and family, where women are explicitly taught that their lives and reputations begin and end with PHOTO MUNTAKIM SAAD

intact, because their honour does not lie in their chastity and their shame is not in its violation. If rape is not okay, women need to be seen not only as sacred mothers and sisters and daughters and friends who need protection from being violated and ensured justice if they are, but as human beings with basic human rights to safety and well-being.

While we express outrage at the most gruesome crimes committed because we cannot turn away from what is literally staring us in the face, let us not neglect to demand justice for those who suffer in fearful silence every day. And while we protest the rape and other atrocious war crimes and crimes against humanity committed in our history, demanding that harsh justice be done, let us not forget the crimes that are going down in our history today.

Govt must address the rape endemic

The recent series of rapes should really jolt us. How did we get to this point? Why is it that the most basic human rights of so many women are being violated this disdainfully?

Although the recent cases are especially horrific, rape has been happening at an alarming rate in the country for some time now-so much so that special steps to address the problem should have been taken. We are yet to see the government even talk about it-let alone act.

Politicians and public officials often come out and condemn this or that when it is in their interest. Why is it that no high official is condemning this in the strongest possible way and then taking stern action? This is just unacceptable.

quantifiable progress indicators in this respect are: higher export of ready-made garments and increased flow of foreign remittances, in the last three months. We can also observe a sizeable movement of people back to the cities and increased traffic on the roads. Government offices, banks and private offices are almost functioning normally now. In residential neighbourhoods, more and more "To-Lets" are being removed from buildings as owners are finding people to rent out their houses again.

In the midst of a global slowdown, one vital question is, can Bangladesh stand out and ride on a positive growth path over the next nine months? The question is pertinent because South Asia's economy as a whole is predicted to contract by 2.7 percent. It is however promising to note that whereas the government expects GDP growth to be in the vicinity of 5 percent in the current financial year, the Asian Development Bank forecasts a GDP growth rate of 7.5 percent.

What are the economy's drivers at the moment? In the first three months of this financial year, the signs in case of the main growth drivers which are agriculture, RMG exports and remittances are encouraging. But it is still difficult to predict if the same momentum will continue over the next nine months. If it does, that is well and good. The two major export destinations of our garments which are Europe and North America, are set to grow at minus 4.7 percent and minus 3.5 percent, respectively. So there is a big risk there.

The BGMEA claims that garment factories are almost back to operating normally and according to its own survey,

at the end of August, only 113 factories laid off 51,500 workers. It is difficult to say due to data constraints how many workers were laid off at the peak of Covid-19 induced shutdowns in March-June period. The figure that was quoted was one million workers lost their jobs but this number was contested by the BGMEA—which thought it was much lower than this number.

In case of foreign remittances which picked up in the month of June, 2020,

its sustainability is again to be cautiously observed in the coming months. While remittances rose to USD 1.83 billion in June, USD 2.6 billion in July, it went down to USD 1.96 billion in August. Remittance contributes to 6 percent of Bangladesh's GDP. The crude oil market is down. As of September 28, the global crude oil price was USD 41 per barrel. This has an obvious link with the regularity of salary payment of workers in the oil producing middleeastern countries where 80 percent of Bangladeshis are working-and are

mostly engaged in low-paid jobs. After paying for food and house rent, many workers are left with little to remit back to the country. Historically speaking, there has been a positive correlation between oil prices and per capita remittance flow to Bangladesh.

The health of our local economy, in a big way, is dependent on the three major economic drivers mentioned above. If agricultural production falls, garment workers are laid off due to weak

international demand, and remittance flow comes down due to low oil prices, the likely effect is low overall consumer demand, higher poverty level and a cyclical impact on other sectors. As we have seen, the three major growth drivers are showing early signs of recovery, another important sector for the country which is the service sector, is still to show promise of a turnaround. Private sector housing, tourism and hospitality, public construction and maintenance of roads and buildings, are yet to recover from the shocks of the pandemic.

It was generally perceived to be a good decision to lockdown the country from end March to June, 2020. Also, it makes sense now to open up the economy, as has been observed since July that the pandemic has not caused any significant havoc despite widespread economic activities being pursued. For the government, there was no option other than cautious and gradual opening up on all fronts, except in the education sector as yet, to resume the cycle of growth. There is no doubt, however, that there is a cost to bear due to the opening up of the economy

The total number of confirmed official Covid-19 cases in Bangladesh till September 28 was about 362,000. This translates roughly to one affected person per 460 population. No doubt, the number of affected persons increases every day. The work-days lost by 362,000 persons so far, with an average medically required minimum quarantine period of two weeks, comes to 5.07 million man-days. Although it is difficult to put a monetary value to the lost workdays, taking the average USD 2,064 annual per capita income as a measure of convenience, the total loss of income incurred by these people comes down to USD 29 million. This amount, if a rule of thumb calculation applied, as a percentage of total annual exports in 2019-20, comes to 0.86 percent which is less than one percent. If we do this calculation for the total GDP of the country, the total loss of income will be about 0.08 percent only.

From the above calculation, we can make a strong justification in favour of opening up of the economy in full, which would save us from the scourge of unemployment and poverty, which Bangladesh as a developing country cannot bear for an extended period of time. It is hoped that with more and more sectors fully opening up, the possibility of the economy reaching its full potentials will be achieved in the remaining nine months of the current fiscal year.

Covid-19 pandemic and the economics of higher education



out the knowledge industry of the modern world, centred in our universities, runs on money. Universities worldwide are moneystrapped now. The pandemic has done

them in. I used to believe that economics leans more toward ethics than money, so the connection between education and money is marginal. I was coaxed into such an assumption having read the lecture delivered by professor Amartya Sen at the University of British Columbia, Canada, when the university celebrated the 40th anniversary of its Interdisciplinary Graduate Programmes in 2011. Professor Sen claims that one of the founders of modern economics, Adam Smith, was a professor of moral philosophy at the University of Glasgow. Professor Smith ventured into economics with his profound philosophical knowledge to establish the connection between economics and ethics. Professor Sen seems deeply influenced by the work of Adam Smith, and I'm somewhat influenced by professor Sen. As the pandemic hit education hard, ironically, I found Anthon Chekhov more influential than professor Sen when he wrote, "Money, like vodka, does strange things to a man."

Money does strange things to a woman, too! The president of Brown University, USA, professor Christina Paxton, wrote an essay, College Campuses Must Reopen in the Fall. Here's How We Do It," in the New York Times in April 2020, in which she claims, "The reopening of college and university campuses in the fall should be a national priority." While professor Paxton sounded like a philistine to public health officials, faculty, staff, and students, who cared about health and safety, she had her followers. Some universities in the US before and after professor Paxton's article have flip-flopped between opening-again and closing-again as the cases of the coronavirus spiked in the campuses. But the tenor of her argument in the essay prioritised money, for she repeatedly reminded her readers of the importance of universities in the US economy, revenue generation, and employment. She was brazenly honest about the basic business model for most universities, which depend on tuition due twice a year at the beginning of


each semester. Remaining closed for a semester means losing as much as half of the revenue. So, she wanted universities re-opened and revenue regained immediately.

Fortunately for Bangladesh, the economics of higher education seems determined by leaders, who are compassionate. For example, The Daily Star, the premier English newspaper in Bangladesh, organised a webinar on July 11, 2020, to discuss the barriers to transition from classroom to online teaching because of the pandemic. Two students and six academic leaders participated in that webinar. They identified some of the pitfalls to online education such as inadequate physical and intellectual infrastructures, students' inability to afford devices for online classes, poor technology proficiency and Internet connectivity, students' anxieties, the digital divide between well-off and not-so-well-off students, and the absence of hands-on training. Surprisingly, none of the academic leaders seemed concerned about the economic costs of not opening the universities. Public and private universities are based on different economic models in Bangladesh, as elsewhere perhaps. Private universities are self-sponsored, while the public universities are sponsored mostly by the government. Public university professionals are hardly affected by the economics of higher education in Bangladesh as such.

While private universities are accused of commodifying education in Bangladesh-and they stand guilty to some extent on that frontprofessor Atiqul Islam, the Vice-Chancellor of North South University, the premier private university in Bangladesh, averred in the webinar that no one's education should be stopped because of the pandemic and that private universities shouldn't pressurise students over tuition fees and enrolment. His suggestions for remedial measures (tuition reduction, fee waiver, and scholarships offering) didn't smack of money. He proposed that small private universities that might not survive without enrolling students during the upcoming semester should consider mergers to help students pursue their studies smoothly. These recommendations have ethics and empathy embedded. The economics of higher education speaks a different language here thanks to the pandemic. Saving students' lives first to educate them later in-person is the new business model for higher education.

Paul Krugman, a Nobel Laurate in Economics, calls professor Islam's stance, and the stances of that are similar to his, the "economics of not dying" in his essay "On the Economics of Not Dying" in the New York Times in May 2020. Professor Krugman argues that generating incomes for improving the quality of life is not the economy's ultimate purpose. What makes the major contribution to the quality of life is not dying, he contends. Until the pandemic, people hardly realised that universities are more vulnerable to death than humans. Fee revenues have fallen sharply; endowments and donations have shrunk; research funding has close to disappeared

are lower priorities these days, for universities are investing in deluxe dormitory rooms, elaborate student centres, and expensive gyms. In order for that to happen, universities have taken on staggering amounts of debt to expand their physical plant. The economic viability of so many universities is determined by what happens out of the classroom. Now that the universities are physically closed and the social side of the universities is altogether missing, spiralling tuition and other fees that far outpaced the rate of inflation have stopped



(with some exceptions in biological sciences); and room and board income for residential universities have all diminished. Almost all universities around the globe are in a financial fiasco. And because most courses last 4 years, a fall-off in applications during one year has lasting effects on income for the years ahead. Some universities that were already in a chronic economic crisis will not survive the slump caused by the pandemic. Before they perish, though, they will expose the "foundation of wilful ignorance" about the economics of higher education, as professor Krugman implies.

Professors Richard Arum and Josipa Roksa added further arguments to the economics of higher education in their essay "Your So-Called Education" in 2011 in the New York Times. They claim that academic investments

rolling in. Universities are in a disarray. If the pandemic lingers, the crisis will exacerbate. As a consequence, some universities will crumble, not because they've exhausted their utilities, but because they were built on a flawed economic model.

Fixing such a flawed model of economics in modern universities warrants considering the complex ecosystems that besiege universities these days. Anthropologist David Graeber deplores the "bullshitisation of real jobs" in universities in Bullshit Jobs. From 1985 to 2005, Graeber notes-from Benjamin Ginsberg's The Fall of the Faculty-students and faculty populations at American universities increased by 50 percent, while administration increased by 85 percent, and the number of administrative staff increased by 240 percent. Since 2005, universities around the globe

seem to have evolved further along that line by adding more bullshit jobs. Why do universities need coaches, local and global advisors, brand ambassadors, ranking consultants, legal advisors, public relations bureaucrats, and equity fund managers? These sharks gut the coffers of universities built by faculty. Where are they now, when the universities they've leeched face an existential threat? The pandemic exposes that universities serve people who can't serve universities, because they're nimrods. They've skewed the economics of universities to mire them in what Graeber calls "managerial feudalism."

So, faculty governance in universities erodes and administrative bloat increases. Universities gradually shift away from teaching, research, and community service into extraction and embezzlement. Greed, insensitivity, and cruelty underpin the economics of universities. In Bangladesh—as elsewhere, private universities are more vulnerable to these vagaries than the public ones. Besides a handful of faculty (fortunately I fall in that bracket!), most private universities in Bangladesh have laid off and furloughed faculty and staff along with reducing salary and withholding benefits to weather the pandemic. Because the pandemic has upended the economics of the universities, where would the money come from to sustain the faculty and staff at full throttle? Some universities ask this wrong question to justify their economic mismanagement. The right question is: Where did the money go?

I would like to conclude with a personal note. I enrolled at a public university in Bangladesh in the mid-90s to pursue a Bachelor's and a Master's in English literature. I paid Tk 120 (USD 1.42) as tuition for a year. At the end of the year, I was informed that I was awarded a merit scholarship for three years from the board I was affiliated with. The university refunded my tuition along with a stipend every year. When I recall this these days, an infinite sense of gratitude overcomes me. I feel indebted and patriotic. I wonder what my feeling would be like if I had to pay Tk 10,00,000 (USD 11,795) for my Bachelor's and the same amount for my Master's.

They stay on the streets by paying

with Fazlur's illegal rickshaw.

It's not hard to spot what is legal and what is illegal. By acquiring trade licenses from city corporations, hundreds of commercial schools, colleges and universities have been set up in residential areas. Such an act is not legal under our law, yet the city corporations have granted them the licenses. Will these



inspection will prove otherwise. His heartwrenching words echo his miseries.

"They took away my rickshaw! How on earth will I now pay the instalment of Tk 80,000? How will I survive?'

'What do you intend to do?' "What can I do? Hang myself, I guess."

The coronavirus pandemic has left thousands without any means to earn a living and Fazlur is one of them. Perhaps Fazlur has a family—a father, a mother, a wife and a child. Now that he has no work, no earning, where will they stay, what will they eat? How will he sustain himself and his family?

Fazlur had borrowed Tk 80,000 to purchase a battery-operated rickshaw, to toil under the scorching heat in order to make some money to feed his family. Maybe that day they were waiting expectantly for him to return with some food to quell the pangs of hunger. Fazlur could not relieve them of that painful wait. Officials from the Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) snatched his rickshaw away from him near Jigatala as such rickshaws have been banned in the capital. Earlier, the city corporations had warned of such crackdowns on battery-operated rickshaws. Unfortunately, Fazlur was either not aware of the ban or too desperate to take heed.

The reality is that owners of human haulers are not like the helpless indebted Fazlur. They are in fact political leaders and law enforcement officials. As a result, they try to justify their operations saying, "How else will people commute?" Moreover, people like Fazlur cannot afford to pay bribes worth Tk 700 every day.

Most of the public buses on our roads which are in a dilapidated state lack fitness certificates, road permits and licenses. On the other hand, many such buses and trucks do have the documents-their owners are worth Tk 80 crore or Tk 800 crore. When people like Fazlur are there to suffer, why would bus owners face any hardships? Bus owners have borrowed crores from the banks, and if their transport is confiscated, then the banks will go bankrupt!


Buses occupy large portions of the roads, turning them into "terminals". And they justify this by saying that the vehicles need to be parked at some place and that the transport is for the public's benefit. Thus, legality does not seem to matter here. The problem only lies

institutions now be demolished? Most likely not, because it involves the future of education and the economy of the country.

At one time there used to be nearly 56 canals in Dhaka; now there are 26. The remaining canals were filled and used to construct multi-storied buildings. And those influential guarters worth Tk 80 crore or Tk 800 crore are the ones responsible for eating up these canals. None of these wrongdoings are unknown to the city corporations. Will we ever get back those canals? Will the illegal structures ever be demolished? Of course not! Because millions will be lost. As long as we pay no heed to the likes of Fazlur, it will be business as usual for all.

The day Fazlur lost his rickshaw, perhaps a hundred more were launched in the capital, even though launching new rickshaws is not allowed, it is happening daily. Someone has assured that Fazlur would get a new rickshaw. Fazlur got his smile back. But how long will he be able to operate that rickshaw on these streets? Without connections with the right parties or people or the syndicate that dictates which rickshaws must be taken off the streets, it is hard to keep a rickshaw's ownership.

"The American people have witnessed what is the greatest failure of any presidential administration in the history of our country," said Harris, a US senator from California and former prosecutor.

"And frankly, this administration has forfeited their right to reelection based on this," Harris said before a masked and limited audience at the University of Utah.

Saying Trump treated frontline health personnel as "sacrificial workers," Harris -- pointing to Trump's own statements to journalist Bob Woodward -- accused the White House of not moving quickly despite knowing the risks of Covid-19.

"The president said it was a hoax. They minimized the seriousness of it," Harris said.

After a raucous debate eight days ago between Trump and Biden, Pence and Harris took a more civil tone with no name-calling, but sharply disagreed on the reaction to the pandemic.

"I want the American people to know, from the very first day, President Donald Trump has put the health of America first," Pence said, pointing to his ban on travel from China on January 31, a month after cases first emerged in Wuhan.

In contrast to Trump's firehose-like blasts on Biden and his family, Pence demonstrated calm and stability and congratulated Harris on the historic nature of her candidacy.

Harris, the daughter of Jamaican and Indian immigrants, would also be both the first African-American and Asian-American vice president.

But Pence tried to portray her as a radical, saying that Harris -- generally considered close to the Democratic

establishment -- was further to the left than socialist Bernie Sanders. "More taxes, more regulation,

banning fracking, abolishing fossil fuel, crushing American energy, economic surrender to China is a prescription for American decline," Pence said, reciting a list Biden would be unlikely to describe as his platform.

Pence, questioned by moderator Susan Page of USA Today, acknowledged that "the climate is changing" but insisted that market solutions were the best way to reduce carbon emissions.

Even if they delved more into substance, the two candidates revealed little new about their policies and were notably evasive on hot-button issues such as abortion and the Supreme Court.

In one moment that went without commentary on stage but triggered an avalanche of social media commentary, a fly found its way onto Pence, spending a visibly long time on his white hair.

The Biden campaign quickly started selling fly-swatters online with the inscription, "Truth over flies."

The two candidates still scoffed at each other's remarks. At one point Harris, firmly but with a smile, reproached Pence, telling him: "Mr vice president, I'm speaking."

They had one of their most intense clashes about racial justice after nationwide protests over police treatment of African-Americans.

Biden "believes that law enforcement has an implicit bias against minorities," Pence said.

"It's a great insult to the men and women who serve in law enforcement. And I want everyone to know who puts on the uniform of law enforcement every day, President Trump and I stand with you," he said.

2,000 cases have been filed under the DSA since its enactment on October 8, 2018. More than 800 cases were filed in the first nine months of this year alone, with many of the country's most prominent editors

and senior journalists being increasingly targeted, the rights watchdog said. "Since its inception, the Digital

Security Act has been wielded as a weapon to silence critics and suppress dissent. The Bangladeshi authorities have exploited the law's vague and broad provisions to escalate attacks on independent journalism and media freedom," said Sultan Mohammed Zakaria, South Asia researcher at Amnesty International.

"The recent crackdown and increased targeting of prominent iournalists is clearly a cynical effort by the authorities to use the Covid-19 crisis as a cover to ramp up these efforts. Bangladesh must substantially reform the DSA and bring it into line with the country's constitution and its human rights obligations," he added.

The Amnesty statement said the DSA imposes multiple undue restrictions on the right to freedom of expression, including up to 10 years' imprisonment for "spreading propaganda" against Bangladesh's Liberation War, the national anthem and national flag using digital devices. Repeated offences carry the maximum penalty of life imprisonment.

The statement listed incidents of arrests and filing of cases under the DSA.

said journalists Zakaria were being targeted simply for reporting on stories critical of the authorities and holding the powerful to account. "The charges against them must be be released immediately and defenders or their work.

unconditionally."

In its statement, Front Line Defenders said the government passed the DSA despite intense criticism and condemnation from human rights defenders, students, civil society organisations and the international community for its overly broad and vague provisions, which lack legal

certainty and precision. The DSA gives the government absolute power to initiate investigations into anyone whose activities are considered a "threat" by giving law enforcement agencies power to arrest without warrant, simply on suspicion that a crime has been committed

through the use of social media, said the rights body. The law also allows the government to order the removal and blocking of any information or data on the internet it deems necessary, thereby providing broad scope to silence those

critical of its policies or who share information on human rights violations in the country, the statement said.

The Act allows for invasive forms of surveillance by permitting authorities to ask service providers and other intermediaries for data without requiring court-obtained а warrant, it added.

Front Line Defenders said at a time when governments should be reducing the prison population to protect against the spread of Covid-19, the authorities in Bangladesh have been arresting people for their legitimate defence and exercise of

human rights. Didar Bhuiyan, a human rights defender, was arrested on May 5 after he shared a report on social media criticising the government's response to the pandemic.

Of the more than 250,000 Rohingyas left in Myanmar, around 100,000 have been living in refugee camps having been displaced during an earlier wave of violence in 2012.

Thousands of other Rohingvas live in villages spread across Rakhine, but are fearful of the military, which keeps a constant watch on their communities. Conflict between the military and the Arakan Army, an ethnic Rakhine armed group, has complicated their problems.

The 169-page HRW report, based on interviews of more than 60 interviews with Rohingyas as well as Kaman Muslims and humanitarian workers, said the Rohingvas have been living in the camps and camplike communities and experiencing "severe limitations" on their livelihoods and their movement.

Rakhine State is subject to an internet blackout and remains off-limits to foreign journalists unless they travel in a prearranged trip with government minders. The report said the living conditions in the camps had increasingly threatened Rohingyas' right to life and other basic rights, resulting in higher rates of malnutrition and other health problems.

The HRW called on the international community to exert more pressure on the government of Myanmar and hold officials accountable for the alleged abuses.

The abuses documented included denial of freedom of movement as well as widespread extortion. Those found outside the camp were also reportedly subjected to torture and other abuses by security forces, the report said.

"Life in the camp is so painful," a Rohingya man told the HRW. "There is no chance to move freely.... We have nothing called freedom.

The HRW accused the Myanmar government of using the earlier 2012 violence against Rohingya communities as a "pretext" to segregate and confine the population from the rest of the population.

In April 2017, the government announced that it would begin closing the camps, but actions later taken by the authorities only perpetuated the segregation of the Rohingya, denying them the right to return to their land, rebuild their homes, find work, and take their place back in Myanmar society.

The report said that the "sense of hopelessness in the camps" became pervasive, with not one Rohingya interviewed expressing the belief that their indefinite detention would end.

"I think the system is permanent," a Rohingya woman said. "Nothing will change. It is only words."

Further complicating the situation for Rohingyas is the Covid-19 pandemic, which has prompted the government to impose more restrictions on movement as part of an effort to contain the spread of the disease.

The HRW called on Myanmar leader Aung San Suu Kyi and the military to take necessary steps to grant more freedom to Rohingyas who remain in the country.

"The government's claims that it's not committing the gravest international crimes will ring hollow until it cuts the barbed wire and allows Rohingyas to return to their homes with full legal protection," it said.



No arms, no problem

Muhammad Ikram, who was born without arms, steps up to a snooker table, sizes up his options and with a firm flick of his chin strikes the cue ball and slots a red into a corner pocket.

The sport was perhaps an unlikely passion for Ikram, 32, to pursue, but the Pakistani player has spent years honing his skills and can now give anyone at his local snooker hall a run for their money.

"It is a tough job that requires hard work. If there is a player like me, I am ready to face him", Ikram told AFP during a recent visit to the snooker hall in the small town of Samundri in Pakistan's eastern province of Punjab.

Born into a poor home, he and his eight siblings did not go to school and he spent much of his childhood feeling isolated. As a teenager, he started to watch players in the local snooker hall and was inspired to start practising "in secret".

"In the beginning, I used to push the balls by myself on an empty pool table," Ikram said. "Gradually, I improved my game and started playing with others."

Ikram can now challenge the best players in town. He demonstrated a range of shots, giving a solid and assured flick of his head to sink reds and then colours into pockets, drawing applause from other players.

"Chalk your chin," one of them quipped after Ikram eventually missed a shot. Worried he might injure himself, Ikram's parents initially barred him from snooker for several years, but last year they allowed him to return to the sport.

His skills quickly turned him into something of an internet celebrity among Pakistan's snooker-playing fraternity. "I become famous," Ikram said, though he confessed to having no idea what social media is. Cricket is by far Pakistan's most popular game, but snooker holds an important place in the country's sporting scene. British officers introduced the game during the colonisation of the Indian subcontinent and Pakistan's founder, Muhammad Ali Jinnah, was a keen player.

Muhammad Nadeem, who owns the Samundri snooker hall, described Ikram as a "true sportsman".

"We don't charge him for a game. Instead people pay him to play with them," Nadeem said.

"He has no competition, in cricket and football there are disabled players but when it comes to snooker he is a one-of-a-kind player."

Int'l football returns with Lisbon stalemate

Germany midfielder Florian Neuhaus scored on his national team debut but Turkey came back three times to earn a 3-3 draw in their friendly. The Germans, playing without Bayern Munich and RB Leipzig players who were rested and missed several due to illness and injury.

Having become France's second highest all-



time top scorer on Wednesday by leapfrogging Michel Platini with 42 goals, Olivier Giroud is now gunning for Thierry Henry's all-time record of 51. Giroud netted twice in a 7-1 demolition of Ukraine in a friendly, celebrating his 100th cap in style in front of visitors' coach Andriy Shevchenko, one of his idols.

Forward Francesco Caputo scored on his Italy debut at the age of 33 as they routed Moldova 6-0 in a one-sided friendly.

Mexico handed new Netherlands coach Frank de Boer a defeat in his first game in charge as they enjoyed a deserved 1-0 win over their hosts in a friendly. Goals from midfielders Josip Brekalo and Mario Pasalic gave Croatia a 2-1 win at Switzerland.

Zambia secured a narrow 1-0 win over neighbours Malawi in Lusaka in the first international involving African countries since the Covid-19 pandemic shut down world sport in March.

Trump rejects virtual debate

His pandemic record in spotlight as Harris, Pence trade blows at vice presidential debate

President Donald Trump yesterday said he would not participate in a virtual debate, throwing into doubt the second presidential debate between Trump and his Democratic rival, Joe Biden, scheduled for Oct 15.

His words came moments after the commission that oversees the debates said the event would be conducted from remote locations in the wake of his Covid-19 diagnosis. The Biden campaign welcomed the move. "That's not acceptable to us," Trump said on a phone

call with Fox Business, adding he thought the virtual format would allow the moderator to cut him off.

The news came a day after the sole vice presidential debate between Vice President Mike Pence and Biden's running mate, Senator Kamala Harris, who clashed repeatedly over the Trump administration's response to the pandemić, which has killed more than 210,000 Americans.

Harris has called Donald Trump's Covid-19 response a historic failure that disqualified him from a second term, in a pointed but mostly civil debate with Mike Pence who sought to portray her as extreme.

With Trump's weekend hospitalisation for Covid-19 throwing a new importance on the role of the vice president, Pence and Harris spoke separated by plexiglass SEE PAGE 10 COL 1

The machine was built to explore the sea by researchers at the University of California San Diego.

The robot propels itself by shooting jets of water behind it; it takes in a large amount of water into its body, and then compresses itself to blast it out behind it.

The machine's body is made of acrylic polymer, supported by 3D-printed and laser-cut parts; its soft body means that it will not injure fish or coral, and can also maneuver more easily than larger, more rigid robots.

COVID PANDEMIC IN EUROPE Surging cases force lockdowns

New cases have been spiralling across Europe and the governments are preparing to renew some lockdown measures as German health experts warned yesterday that the coronavirus could "spread uncontrollably" in the country

Across the world, 36.2 million cases of the coronavirus have been officially diagnosed since it first emerged in China late last year, according to an AFP tally based on official sources vesterday.

Of those 1,057,084 have died.

The United States has the highest death toll, with 211,844, followed by Brazil with 148,228, India 105,526, Mexico 82,726 and Britain 42,515.

In Belgium, Brussels' crowded bars and cafes were shut for a month, a return to the stricter protocols imposed at the height of the epidemic in March and April.

And in France, officials were to apply tighter restrictions in several major cities, two days after a maximum alert protocol went into force in Paris.

Austria yesterday recorded its highest ever one-day total of infections despite measures taken in recent weeks to try to bring the pandemic under control.

Countries including Germany have warned against travel to parts of Austria, putting the tourism industry under pressure as the ski season approaches.

Poles will have to wear face masks in all public spaces from Saturday, Prime Minister Mateusz Morawiecki said yesterday, after cases hit a new record daily high of 4,280.

The second wave has reached us and we have to face it in a decisive way," Morawiecki told reporters, explaining that the entire EU country of 38 million would now be considered a "yellow zone".
