# Nightmare in Jordan

A helpless woman fell victim to human trafficking gang, returns home with horrific experience

Abandoned by her husband and struggling to feed her two children, Nazma Begum thought moving overseas for work would change her life.

It did, indeed, but not the way she thought it would. The 32-year-old from a remote village in Moheshpur of Jhenaidah was lured by one of her villagers with the promise of a house-keeping job in a Middle-Eastern

But she ended up in the sordid world of sex trafficking

During her 10-month stay in the Arab country, Nazma endured torture, captivity and abuse. Instead of returning with money that could change their fate, she came back on September 10 empty-handed with physical injuries and shocking tales of abuse.

"Never did it occur to me that such a nightmare was awaiting me. I went there to earn for my family, but I was sold instead," Nazma told The Daily Star over the phone

"I am in severe distress. I have no money for my treatment and food for my children. I don't know what

With almost no formal education and any idea of the outside world, Nazma made up her mind to go to a distant land after Milon Mondol, an inhabitant of the village and SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

Quick probe, trial, fixing Evidence Act among them

Various political parties, youth students, rights activists protesting over this past week have stated their demands including expedited police investigations and trials of rapists to ensure justice for victims and amending the Evidence Act to end victim blaming.

Condemning the rise of rape incidents in the country, under different these held protest programmes across the country and issued several statements yesterday.

## They are all in it together

AL-BNP men, govt and pvt bodies feast on river land

It is called Old Khowai and as if to justify its name, it is on its deathbed being deserted by all.

For decades, the water body in Habiganj has been encroached upon by various government establishments and locally influential people belonging to both the Awami League and BNP.

Even a massive drive conducted last year could not yield much result as several of the buildings demolished then have been rebuilt with the land

Besides, a list of illegal occupants drawn up by the district administration in Habiganj town remains undisclosed though it was prepared a year ago. The list includes influential locals as well as many government bodies which have set up offices and other buildings on this illegally occupied river land, say district administration sources.

While there are allegations that the number of illegal occupants is at least 2,000, environmentalists say only 83 have been mentioned in the district administration's list sent to the National River Conservation

6 remanded over gang rape of woman in Sunamganj

At least eight people have been arrested nce Saturday in connection with rape incidents in five districts, while a Sunamganj court yesterday remanded six accused in a gang-rape and abduction case.

In Rangamati, a man was arrested on Saturday night in Kaptai upazila for raping a physically-challenged indigenous woman.

The accused, Md Abu Taleb Saddam, 27, forcibly took the victim to a secluded place on Friday morning and raped her.

The victim's sister filed a rape case the following day, and Taleb was arrested, said Iqbal Bahar Ćhowdhury, officer-in-charge of Chandraghona Police Station.

Another man was arrested in Rangpur on Saturday night for raping a sixth-grader in Badarganj upazila.

## Eight held over Remain cautious about spending

PM directs officials to avoid unnecessary expenditure as Covid situation may worsen

UNB, Dhaka

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday directed government officials to refrain from the unnecessary expenditure of public money as she feared a second wave of Covid-19 in the coming days.

"There's an apprehension that Covid-19 pandemic might hit again, because many countries including [some in] Europe are suffering from this pandemic again. We all have to remain safe from now on," she said at a programme where she handed over the national standard to 10 units and organisations of Bangladesh Army.

She joined the programme in Savar Cantonment virtually from her official residence the Gono Bhaban.

She said that the government had announced a budget of Tk 568,000 crore for the 2020-21 fiscal which was a very tough job due to the pandemic where many countries were suffering from severe economic constraints.

"We've given the budget defying all odds. We said that everyone has to remain cautious regarding expending public money, because if coronavirus hits again massively then we'll need a huge amount of money, we'll have to SEE PAGE 2 COL 6

### **BUSINESS** Forex may be spent on ADP

The government has taken a decision to spend a portion of the country's foreign exchange reserves on the implementation of the annual development programme (ADP). "We are now carrying out a study to select the projects where the reserves can be invested," Finance Minister AHM Mustafa Kamal said. Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina had asked officials concerned in July to find a way out as the

existing laws do not allow investment of foreign exchange reserves in development projects. The Prime Minister's Office is now working on it and convening meetings with different ministries, Kamal said.

### New AG's Appointment 'Disappointed',

## two top law officials quit

New AG vows to go tough on corruption

Three days after the appointment of senior lawyer AM Amin Uddin as the new attorney general for the state, two additional attorney generals -- Murad Reza and Momtaz Uddin Fakir -- yesterday resigned without citing any specific reasons.

Their resignation was the hot topic among Supreme

Court lawyers yesterday. Requesting anonymity, a former deputy attorney general, said both of them were disappointed by not getting the attorney general job.

In their resignation letters, sent to the president through the law ministry yesterday morning, they mentioned "personal difficulties" for stepping down.

Now there is only one additional attorney general. Some lawyers said Amin Uddin was almost contemporary to Murad and Momtaz, and both of them felt overlooked. The two had expectations to be attorney general following the demise of Mahbubey Alam.

The names of several lawyers, including Murad, Momtaz, current Additional Attorney General SM Munir, Ajmalul Hossain QC and Munsurul Hoque Chowdhury, had been in discussion for the top law officer post, a lawyer said.

Ajmalul and Munsurul were not young, the lawyer said. SEE PAGE 2 COL 3
