Rapists to face death penalty

Cabinet okays proposal to amend law; president to issue ordinance today; govt moves to ensure speedy trial of rape

Amid countrywide protests denouncing violence against women, the cabinet yesterday approved the draft of Women and Children Repression Prevention (Amendment) Bill, 2020, incorporating the provision of capital punishment for rape.

President Abdul Hamid is all set to promulgate an ordinance in this

The approval came at the weekly cabinet meeting held virtually with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in the chair. She joined the meeting from the Gono Bhaban, while her cabinet colleagues attended it from the

Later, Cabinet Secretary Khandker Anwarul Islam told reporters that the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs proposed incorporating the provision of capital punishment in the Act, terming rape a heinous crime. "The matter was discussed in detail in the cabinet meeting. Everyone

agreed to incorporate capital punishment in the Act," he said. Following the amendment, "Lifetime Rigorous Imprisonment" mentioned in Section 9(1) of the Act would be replaced by "Death or Lifetime Rigorous Punishment". The same changes will be applicable to Section 9(4) of the Act, he said.

Pointing to another amendment, to Section 11(C) of the Act, the cabinet secretary said in case of simple injury -- caused not during rape -- the matter could be compoundable.

The section that deals with dowry has provisions for three years in

Faridpur-4 MP **Cabinet Division** seeks actions over violation of election code

The Cabinet Division has sought actions over violations of the electoral code of conduct for local body polls by the Faridpur-4 lawmaker and a newly elected upazila chairman.

It yesterday wrote to the Prime Minister's Office, the Parliament Secretariat, the Election Commission Secretariat and other authorities concerned to that end.

Mujibur Rahman Chowdhury, an independent lawmaker from Faridpur-4, issued threats in public to the deputy commissioner of Faridpur and the upazila nirbahi officer of Charbhadrasan for deploying an "excessive" number of magistrates in the upazila chairman bypolls held on October 10. RMG worker gang-raped in Gazipur

More rape incidents, arrests in other dists

A garment worker was gang-raped in Gazipur and four people were arrested in rape cases in three other districts over the last two days.

Yesterday, a Dhaka court placed four

arrestees on three days' remand each over the rape of a 13-year-old girl in the capital's Pallabi area on Sunday.

Police said the 25-year-old RMG worker lives at a rented home in Chakpara area of Gazipur's Sreepur upazila.

Victim's neighbour Ashraful Alam, 22, and one of his associates, Jahangir Alam, 33, had been making unwanted advances towards her for a long time.

Around 12:30am yesterday, Ashraful broke into the victim's home through a ventilator in the toilet. Then he opened a door to let Jahangir in.

The two raped the girl and threatened to kill her if she disclosed the matter. The alleged rapists fled the scene around 3:30am, said police.

In the morning, the victim informed the landlord and some locals about the incident. Locals later caught Ashraful and handed him to police.

Vital law reforms still not done

Death penalty won't resolve rape issue; amendment doesn't address much-needed reforms, say experts, rights activists

Lawyers and women's rights activists all had one common reaction to the cabinet's decision to incorporate death penalty for rape in the Women and Children Repression Prevention (Amendment) Bill

This was their reaction: the amendment does nothing to address the actual reforms being demanded by gender experts.

The death penalty was demanded by a faction of general public, but legal experts say that it will not solve anything.

Veteran women's rights advocate Salma Ali said, "It is just a rushed act to calm some of the protesters.

"The decision-makers should have taken the time to consult with grassroots lawyers and law practitioners who deal with such cases first-

Just making the law will not achieve anything without a proper guideline and unless the implementation is ensured, she added.

The Rape Law Reform Coalition, a body comprised of 17 rights organisations including Bangladesh Legal Aid Services Trust (BLAST) and Ain o Salish Kendra (ASK), have 10 demands from the law, and the death penalty is not one of them.

The demands include changing the definition of the law to include victims of all genders, defining "penetration" to include rape using objects, banning the use of character evidence against rape survivors during trial, allowing judges to hand out punishments proportionately and as per their discretion, ensuring that courts and systems are inclusive for survivors with disabilities and enacting the witness protection law.

Currently, "rape" is restrictively defined only as penile-vaginal SEE PAGE 2 COL 3

Scrap puffed up power bills: HC

The High Court yesterday directed the electricity supply authorities to cancel inflated bills prepared between February and June this year, and prepare customised bills based on actual meter-reading for each consumer.

In response to a writ petition, the HC also ordered the authorities not to collect late payment surcharge from consumers against the inflated bills, and submit separate reports to the court after complying with the directives in two months.

Chairperson of Power Development Board and Rural Electrification Board and managing directors of Dhaka Power Development Company, Dhaka Electricity Supply Company, West Zone Power Distribution Company Ltd and Northern Electricity Supply Company were asked to prepare the customised bills as per a directive issued by Bangladesh **Energy Regulatory** Commission (BERC) on July 16 this year.

45pc carrying coronavirus antibody

People started developing herd immunity, researchers say after surveying 3,227 households

Around 45 percent of the people, covered by a survey in the capital, were found to be carrying Covid-19 antibody, according to a study by the Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research.

The presence of such antibody among slum dwellers was much higher -- about 74 percent, mentions the study based on data collected between April 18 and July 5 this year. A total of 3,227 households across the capital were

surveyed under the study jointly conducted by the IEDCR and the International Centre for Diarrhoeal Disease Research, Bangladesh (icddr,b).

The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and the USAID supported the first-ever cross-sectional epidemiological survey in Bangladesh. A summary of the survey was published on August 10.

"The encouraging rate of seropositivity among the population surveyed in Dhaka city indicates that we have started developing herd immunity against the novel coronavirus," Dr Ferdausi Qadri, senior scientist at the icddr,b, said at the launch of the study report in the capital.

The findings come at a time when a number of countries have already been hit by the second wave of the novel coronavirus.

Researchers said this information will be helpful in transmission control, treatment of the infected people and also vaccination

During the survey, samples of 12,699 individuals from 25 wards in Dhaka city were tested through the rt-PCR method, and 9.8 percent or nearly one in 10 people was found positive for Covid-19.

Papia, her husband get 27 years in arms case

Much-talked-about expelled Jubo Mohila League leader Shamima Nur Papia and her husband Mofizur Rahman Sumon have been sentenced to 27 years' rigorous imprisonment in an arms case.

Judge KM Emrul Kayesh of the Special Tribunal-1 of Dhaka handed down the sentence in presence of the couple at the courtroom yesterday.

The couple were given 27 years in jail after considering that Papia is a woman. The charges were enough for life in jail, the judge said.

According to the udgement, Papia and her husband Sumon were given 20 years' imprisonment for possessing arms, and seven years' imprisonment for possessing bullets, but their punishment will run concurrently.

Cops' cooked up story falters

4 policemen of Sylhet suspended; family files case

Four police personnel of Sylhet city's Bandarbazar police outpost, where a man was allegedly tortured to death on Sunday night, were suspended and three others withdrawn yesterday due to their negligence in duties.

Azbahar Ali Sheikh, deputy commissioner (north) of Sylhet Metropolitan Police, said after getting family's allegation over Rayhan Ahmed's custodial death, a threemember internal body was formed to probe the matter.

The body found negligence of police personnel of the outpost, he said.

"Even though the man was detained by police, he deserved humanitarian rights, which was violated in the outpost. We have already taken primary disciplinary action against the seven police personnel. Now the investigation officer of the case [filed by the victim's wife] will formally probe the incident as per the torture and custodial death act," Azbahar said.

Rayhan's wife Tahmina Akther Tanni yesterday filed the case against several unknown persons with Kotwali Police Station, alleging that her husband was beaten to death inside Bandarbazar police outpost.

Four police personnel Akbar Hossain Bhuiyan, in-charge and sub-inspector of the police outpost, constables Harun-ur-Rashid, Titu Chandra Das and Towhid Miah were suspended and assistant sub-inspectors Ashek Ali, Kutub Ali and constable Sajib Hossain were withdrawn from the police outpost.

News of the death of Rayhan, 33, broke on Sunday, with different local newspapers quoting police officials as saying that he was beaten to death by a mob after he was caught mugging someone in the city's Kasthogarh.

According to the case statement, Rayhan went out for work on Saturday afternoon and his mobile phone was found switched off after 10:00pm. Later, around 4:30am on Sunday, his mother received a call from an unknown number. During the call, Rayhan urged her to bring some money to the police outpost to have him release him.

Rayhan's stepfather Habib Ullah reached the police outpost with Tk 4,000 around 5:30am and a policeman asked him to bring Tk 10,000 around 10:00am, the case statement said.

When he again went to the police outpost with the money in the morning, he was told to go to Sylhet MAG Osmani Medical College Hospital where he found Rayhan dead.

According to the hospital's records, Rayhan was taken there by police at 6:40am and he died at 7:50am, says the case statement.

Meanwhile, seeing all CCTV footage of Kasthogarh area, no evidence on any mob beating was found from 12:00am to 7:00am on Sunday, said local councillor Nazrul Islam Munim.

Tanvir Ahmed, cousin of the victim, said, "They [police] tried to stage an incident of mob beating, but failed as we now have evidence. He was tortured inside the police outpost and he eventually died."

Soumen Maitra, inspector (investigation) of Kotwali Police Station, told this correspondent that Rayhan was accused in a mugging and drug cases.

Contacted, Jyotirmoy additional deputy commissioner of Sylhet Metropolitan Police, said he was accused in a case filed in connection with drugs and another one under the special powers act.

Habib Ullah said they did not know that he was involved in any such activities or accused in any cases.

penetration -- although rape in reality constitutes many types of violent actions. In addition, males raping females and female children is the only recognised form of rape currently.

Also, according to The Evidence Act 1872, the complainant's character is judged so as to understand the merit of the complaint.

"For the past two and a half years, as part of the Rape Law Reform Now campaign, we have analysed over one hundred reported judgments on rape from the past 40 years and consulted all relevant stakeholders to understand what obstructs justice for rape," said Taqbir Huda, a research specialist at BLAST and a spokesperson for the campaign.

"The absence of death penalty for single perpetrator rape [without murder under the 2000 Act has not been an obstruction to justice at all. The biggest barriers to justice for rape have been the lack of a witness protection system, the lack of gender sensitisation of justice sector actors, the lack of timely medico-legal examinations, the lack of sentencing discretion of judges

and the lengthy trial periods due to overburdened judges and courts. None of these prime and actual barriers to justice for rape is addressed in the slightest by the introduction of the death penalty," he continued.

"Real change requires real reform, and real investment," the BLAST researcher added.

ASK sent a statement signed by Md Nur Khan, the secretary general of their executive committee, calling this a move that will only temporarily

"We are not being able to ensure justice for rape even though the

The prosecution manages to escape through legal loopholes," it added.

"Implement the punishment of life sentence and make sure that the perpetrator is properly incarcerated for life," said Z I Khan Panna, chairperson of ASK. Currently the life sentence punishment refers to 30 years' prison term.

The current punishment is severe enough. Right now life imprisonment is not just the highest punishment, but also the only punishment for rape, no matter what the circumstances of the case is," said Taslima Yasmin, associate professor of the department of law at University of Dhaka.

"Because this is the only punishment, the judges already feel the pressure of being a hundred percent sure that the complaint is valid, and they demand a lot of evidence and scrutinise it to the dot. As a result the rape complainant has to bear a heavier burden of proof than what a victim of a normal crime would have to," she added.

Five to die for killing minor girl after abduction

A Joypurhat court yesterday sentenced five people to death for killing a minor girl after her abduction around five years ago.

The convicts are: Uttam Kumar Sarkar, 29, Biresh Chandra Barman, 38, Santosh Kumar Sarkar, 28, Mostafizur Rahman, 38, and Obaidul Islam, 25 - all from Rashidpur village in the district's Panchbibi upazila.

According to the prosecution, Radha Rani, two-and-a-half-year-old daughter of Poresh Chandra of Rashidpur village, went missing. She was last seen playing near her home on December 22, 2015.

During interrogation, they confessed that they abducted the girl for ransom. They murdered her and dumped her body in the pond after her father failed to pay the money.

HARMFUL SANITISER ACI fined Tk 1cr, told to withdraw it from market

A mobile court of Rapid Action Battalion has fined Advanced Chemical Industries (ACI) Ltd Tk 1 crore for using harmful methanol in its Savlon hand sanitiser.

The court also asked ACI to withdraw the product from all markets within 48 hours, said Rab's Executive Magistrate Sarwoer Alam, who led the team during the drive at the company's depot in Dhaka's Mirpur on Sunday night.

ACI had been collecting the product through outsourcing, the magistrate said. A trader of Old Dhaka who supplied chemicals might have provided methanol instead of ethanol, he added, quoting company officials. All other sanitising

products of ACI were found

Just 54mm rain swamps Dhaka

It took only 54mm rain to turn many parts of the capital into swamps yesterday, disrupting normal life and creating

Thoroughfares, lanes and by-lanes were partially or fully submerged in many areas. At places, human waste and dirt

Most roads in areas including Rajarbagh, Motijheel, Arambagh, Asadgate, Residential Model School, Mirpur, Jhigatola, Hazaribagh, Green Road and parts of Old Dhaka went under ankle-to-waist-deep water due to heavy rain.

According to Bangladesh Meteorological Department, 54mm rainfall was recorded in Dhaka in the last 24 hours till yesterday noon. Some parts of the country including Dhaka may face more rain today, said Abul Kalam, meteorologist of BMD. There is a depression over the Bay

Rain is occurring at different regions due to the formation of cloud over the country, he said. River and inland river ports have been asked to hoist distant cautionary signal-1,

The depression over the east central and adjoining west central Bay of Bengal has moved west-northwestwards and now lies over the same area, and there are chances it may turn into a deep depression. It is likely to intensify further and move in a west-northwesterly direction, BMD said in a special weather bulletin in the morning.

Yesterday, city dwellers had to suffer much due to waterlogging. At places, buses, cars and three-wheelers haphazardly inched forward throughout the day. Many vehicles broke down being stuck in water.

Cycling for a cleaner city

Afsar Mirza likes to cycle, a lot. He is known to take his two-wheeler out for a ride to Crescent Lake Road, adjecent to the Chandrima Uddyan, and back to his home at Asad Avenue, Mohammadpur. He says it's the burst of sunlight and the light breeze caressing his skin while cycling past familiar roads that draws him to cycle.

However, this experience may not be available for many. For one, owning a bicycle may be beyond their financial capacity, plus there's also the hassle of keeping a bicycle safe and sound.

This is what bike-sharing service Jobike hopes to address. With their "hire and ride" initiative, Jobike has been working to this end since 2018.

In addition, in an era of looming climate crisis, initiatives that lead to the decrease in carbon emissions are highly valued, and biking is one of them.

Sayma Rahman, Head of Retail Partnership, Grameenphone, is an angel investor and business adviser at Jobike. She told The Daily Star, "Cycling is very popular abroad. It is also one of the most convenient forms of transport. It also keeps people healthy, moving

"If appropriate bicycle lanes are provided by the government, this would mean less commuting time, fewer accidents and less time wasted in traffic. So, we thought, if it is popular all over the world, why won't it work for Bangladesh, which has one of the

most highly congested roads?" Sayma continued. "Bicycles also come in handy during times when you cannot use public transportation, as we've seen during the pandemic."

"Besides personal commuting benefits, we also emphasise small enterprises that can business conveniently manage their supply chains using our cost-effective mode of transport," the investor said.

With DNCC constructing a 9km stretch of road exclusively for bicycle movement in the city's Agargaon area, the possibilities for an easy commute by cycling is becoming more viable.

According to DNCC officials, the bicycle lanes constructed on both sides of the specified road are six feet each, which is above the international standards of five feet for bicycle lanes, thus providing ample space for a "carefree" ride.

In an interview with The Daily Star, Jobike Founder and Chief Executive Officer Mehedi Reza relayed that every Jobike bicycle is GPS enabled and depends heavily on AI-based mobile apps, to ensure "prevention of theft" and "on-demand cycling service".

He also added that the company uses GEO fencing technology, meaning, if any rider goes out of the fence, the team gets notified, and an alert is sent immediately to look for the missing

Bangladeshis can't return to Italy until Dec 31: Momen

Italy will not allow Bangladeshi citizens to enter the European country till December 31, due to "previous behaviour" and fear of a possible second wave of Covid-19, said Foreign Minister AK Abdul Momen yesterday.

"This is no good news to me [regarding return of Bangladeshi expatriate workers in Italy]," he said, while talking to reporters at the foreign ministry office.

The foreign minister said he tried to talk with his Italian counterpart on the issue, but they did not get to converse. According to Momen, Bangladeshi expatriates are

largely responsible for this situation, as they had frequently violated quarantine rules of the Italian government. "Our expatriates are the problem. You know that they

don't abide by the law in Italy. The minister said 48 Bangladeshis who flew to Italy in a flight were suspected to be Covid-19 positive. They were then asked to stay in mandatory quarantine for 14 days in a hotel arranged by the Italian authority, but many of them

did not do so. Then the media picked up the issue and their health ministry put pressure, Momen said.

"Therefore, Italian authorities said they won't receive any flight from Bangladesh. They deported many Bangladeshi SEE PAGE 4 COL 1

Focus more on women for disaster reporting: speakers STAFF CORRESPONDENT resilience building of gender response,

Speakers at a webinar yesterday discussed the role of media in promoting genderresponsive disaster management and resilience building, as women and girls remain invisible in disaster reporting of both electronic and print media.

Titled, "Where are the women? Media Coverage of Disasters", the webinar was co-hosted by the Department of Women Affairs and UN Women, in observance of the International Day for Disaster Risk Reduction 2020.

Shoko Ishikawa, country representative of UN Women, the co-chair of the event said, media has immense power to influence and therefore shape opinions in the understanding of people as well as policymakers on various issues, including disaster management.

"We know how media reports on disasters mobilise government and donor funding to swing into action after a disaster. If those reports focus on the plight of women, girls and gender diverse population, and their specific needs during and after disasters, that would go a long way in making disaster management and

'Media can therefore play an effective and critical role in mobilising all our collective strength, to create enabling environment for women, challenging preexisting inequalities, norms and stereotypes," she added.

Shoko Ishikawa said she believes that the global coronavirus pandemic is a wake-up call to build a more equal and inclusive society.

Sejuti Masud of BBC Media Action shared the results achieved by National Resilience Programme (NRP), supported by UNDP, UNOPS and UN Women, together with Department of Women Affairs, that have been working with 55 local journalists and 20 national-level editorial gatekeepers, and have seen positive results.

"In a disaster, women are not included enough in the media content and reporters often face difficulties to reach women due to social and religious barriers. Media doesn't always treat women as an equal voice like men and are often portrayed only from pity," she said in her presentation.

At least two people, including an accused in BCL leader Sudipto Biswas murder case, were injured in a scuffle in front of a Chattogram court room

The injured are Md Moktar Hossain (32) and Arifur Rahman (22), said police. Of the two, Moktar is an FIR-named accused, now out on bail. On October 6, 2017, BCL leader Sudipto was beaten to death in broad day light in port city's Nalapara area.

Yesterday, quoting witnesses, police said the incident occurred as Moktar appeared before the Additional Metropolitan Magistrate court on the first floor of the court building. As he was leaving the court room, some youths swooped on them and started beating them up.

On information, police rushed to the spot but the unidentified attackers managed to flee, said Inspector (investigation) Md Kamruzzaman of Kotwali Police Station. He said Moktar filed a case with the police station, accusing several persons.

Moktar said the attack was orchestrated by the other accused in the case, as well as some "big fish" who are also responsible for the murder.

He also claimed that the attack is connected with a recent video interview with a online news portal where he said there are influential people connected with the case and demanded justice for Sudipto through

No relocations while discussion continues

Attorney General tells petitioners at hearing STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The High Court yesterday opined that the Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC) should not continue its move to relocate stray dogs from its area until further hearing of the writ petition filed to this effect.

The HC bench of Justice Md Ashfaqul Islam and Justice Mohammad Ali kept the writ petition stand-over (waiting for hearing) for a month, Saqeb Mahbub, a lawyer for the petitioners, told The Daily Star. The court also asked Attorney General AM Amin Uddin to ensure that the

stray dogs are not relocated until further hearing of the petition, he said. The petitioners' lawyer said during hearing on the petition, Attorney General AM Amin Uddin told the HC that a discussion over dog relocation among DSCC Mayor Sheikh Fazle Noor Taposh and other stakeholders is going on. The attorney general said the DSCC mayor is now abroad and will return to the country after two weeks, and prayed to the HC to adjourn hearing of the writ petition.

Saqeb Mahbub said the attorney general assured the HC that DSCC will not continue its move to relocate stray dogs during this period. He also said DSCC cannot relocate stray dogs following the verbal order of the HC.

Attorney General Amin Uddin told the newspaper that he will convey the message to DSCC authorities to not relocate any dogs in the interim.

Mustafizur Rahman Khan appeared for the petitioners. Hridoy Ahmed, an Italy-bound expatriate, said there are at least 15,000 stranded Bangladeshis who are waiting to return to their workplaces in Italy.

They will wage movement in front of the foreign ministry office from October 20, if the Italian ambassador does not take any effective measures, he added.

Journo murdered in Narayanganj

Cops say he informed them about illegal gas connection

A journalist was killed by some local people in Narayanganj on Sunday night as he used to inform law enforcers of their involvement in illegal gas connection, said police.

The victim -- Ilias Hossain (45) -- was a correspondent of the "Dainik Bijoy", a local daily.

In connection with the killing, police arrested three people -- Tusher, Millat Ali, and Misir Ali between Sunday night and yesterday morning, said Inspector Azgor Hossain of Bandar Police Station.

Some people hacked Ilias to death around 8:30pm at Adampur in Bandar area while he was on his way home in Jeodhora area, Officer-in-Charge Fakhruddin Bhuiyan quoted witnesses as saying.

A knife was seized from Tusher whose clothe was bloodstained during his arrest in the nearby area the same night, said the OC. Later, the other two were held, he added. Victim's wife Julekha Begum filed a murder case with the

police station yesterday, accusing eight persons including the three, said Inspector Azgar. Police said they are trying to arrest the other accused.

In primary interrogation, Tushar admitted that he killed the journalist following previous enmity over illegal gas connection, said the police officer.

"We heard that Tushar sells contraband drugs in the area," said Inspector Azgar, adding that he was an accused in a case filed over a clash previously, he said. Meanwhile, a Narayanganj court yesterday placed the

Police so far arrested 18 people, mostly BCL activists, in connection with the case, of whom 16 are now out in bail.

Sources in police and BCL said intraparty rivalry was the reason behind the murder. Sudipto's peers and followers alleged that Didarul Alam Masum, a former BCL leader of Government City College and general secretary of Lalkhan Bazar ward unit Awami League, was the mastermind.

Masum, however, denied the allegations, claiming that it's a "conspiracy" against him by his political rivals.

34 school buildings inaugurated

Patuakhali Triple Murder

Prime accused arrested after 3yrs

Police arrested the prime accused in connecting with a case for killing three of a family in Galachipa upazila of the district 3 years back.

The law enforcers detained Shahid, son of Idris Mollah, from Dhaka's Savar area on October 10 and produced him before a court the following day, seeking 10 days remanded, Patuakhali Superintendent of Police (SP) Moinul Hasan told the reporters at a briefing at his office yesterday.

On night of August 1 in 2017, unidentified criminals killed Delwar Mollah, 65, his wife Parveen Begum, 65, and their adopted daughter Kazoli Akhter, 15, at their house.

The following morning, police recovered their bodies and sent those to Patuakhali General Hospital for autopsy. During primary interrogation, Shahid confessed his involvement in the murders.

Woman killed, 2 held

A housewife was killed by her husband and in-laws allegedly over family feud in Kaharol upazila of the district on Sunday. The deceased, Rupali Rani Roy, 30, was wife of Bishuram

As a sequel, at one stage of altercation on Sunday, Rupali's in-laws beat her mercilessly and then strangled her to death. Being informed by locals, police went to the spot and detained Bishuram's parents Jiten Chandra Roy and Subola Rani Roy from their house.

GOVT SOCIAL SECURITY ALLOWANCE

Online verification shines hope on 30 thousand aspirants in 6 upazilas

Those days of eligible aspirants watching their much-needed social security allowances being pocketed by the rich and the powerful might be over soon.

Under a new initiative taken by the Ministry of Social Welfare, the national identity (NID) database of the Election Commission (EC) is now being used to verify identification of individuals seeking to receive government social security allowances in 112 poverty-stricken upazilas across the country.

Marred by irregularities and false claim, the old age, widow and differently abled (physically or mentally) allowances under social security programmes of the government are usually allocated only a fraction of funds required for a large number of recipients.

The new digital enrolment process is being undertaken by the ministry with the objective to ensure maximum coverage for eligible recipients in at least the 112 out of total 492 upazilas in the country.

In Pirojpur, the new enrolment process favouritism by local public representatives, has been rolled out in six of its seven upazilas. Mathbaria upazila and Pirojpur municipality are being kept out of the

Field workers of Department of Social Services (DSS) in the six upazilas --Nazirpur, Kaukhali, Indurkani, Bhandaria, Nesarabad and Sadar -- already made house visits to guide aspirants about documents and data required during the enlistment process.

The new process might help enrol around 30,000 genuine applicants in the six upazilas, said AKM Akteruzzaman Talukder, deputy director (DD) of DSS district office in Pirojpur.

But, like it has always been, individuals who are solvent or are already receiving at least one allowance from any ministry of the government will not be eligible to apply for any of the allowances, he added.

The digital verification process has come as a blessing for many allowance aspirants who so far failed to get any government allowance due to corruption and

who had previously been tasked with the enrolment process of the allowances.

Abdul Aziz, a senior citizen in Balipara village of Indurkani upazila, said despite years of relentless communication with a member of the local union parishad, the public representative did not enlist him as a recipient of the government's old age allowance.

But finally, he was able to start the process of enlistment by turning in the photocopy of his NID card recently, the elderly man said with much enthusiasm.

The elderly population usually do not have any source of income and the government allowance would be an immense support for them, said Altaf Hossain, an old age allowance aspirant in the same village.

Kabir Hossain, chairman of Balipara union in Indurkani upazila, said local public representatives had to turn down many of the eligible candidates as the allowance allocation had been limited

Aside from all the advantages, the new digital verification process has its limitations too. A good number of eligible aspirants might get rejected due to erroneous information, such as date of birth, on their NID cards.

Octogenarian Abdur Rahman Miah, boatman from Southkhali char in Indurkani, is among many of the old age allowance aspirants whose application was rejected during initial manual screening of documents by DSS workers.

"My real age is 82, but according to my NID card, I'm only 32 years old -- the same age as my grandson!" lamented the man.

When this correspondent drew attention of Akteruzzaman, the DD of Pirojpur DSS, on the problem being faced by Abdur Rahman, the DD said their enlistment is conducted only through online verification of the NID database and before applying for the allowances, erroneous information on any NID card has to be corrected at the EC only.

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Traders happy as Shapla Beel abuzz with tourists

Lal Shapla Beel is abuzz with tourists, much to the happiness of local traders. The 15-km-long wetland, where thousands of water lilies of pink colour are in bloom for five months every year, is located in Satla union under Uzirpur upazila and Bagdha union under Agailjhara upazila of Barishal district.

Locals are very happy that tourism business in the scenic area has increased. They have demanded construction of a bungalow in the area and renovation of 10-km-long Ujirpur-Satla road.

The traders said the road has been lying in such awful state for the last three years. When the road was in good condition before 2017, around 2000 people from different parts of the country came to visit here every day during the tourist season but the number of visitors has now decreased by more than 50 percent due to awful condition of the road.

They added that apart from this, the tourists almost stopped visiting Lal Shapla Beel at the beginning of coronavirus. The tourism business in the area was hit hard by the pandemic

But their income has increased slightly for the last two months as tourists from Barishal and other adjoining districts started coming to visit the picturesque spot again, said some restaurant traders.

At present, around 1000 tourists

Taslim, a local college student, said the beautiful Shapla Beel is actually vast plain land that remains under rainwater from June to October every year. Locals cannot grow anything here during this period. At the time, they depend on the wetland for their livelihood. They actually work as boatmen during the season.

Boatman Enamul, 42, said every day around 100 people came to visit the wetland at the beginning of the tourist season due to coronavirus outbreak. But at present, a number of tourists on boats come here throughout the day to enjoy the beauty of water lilies. Lilies

He now earns around Tk 500 daily by rowing boat, said Enamul.

A tourist has to spend about Tk 500 to enjoy the beauty of water lilies in the beel per day, said Bipul Das, chairman of Bagdha union parishad, adding that Tk 1.50 crore is spent here per month during the tourist season. Local people have also urged for

better infrastructures at the tourist spot. Deputy Commissioner (DC) SM Ajiar Rahman said various steps will be taken to make the scenic area more attractive for visitors.

They have already sent proposals to the tourism corporation to make Shapla Beel more attractive and touristfriendly, said the DC.

Trump campaign ad quote misleading

Says Fauci as president hits election trail again

AFP, Washington

Top government scientist Anthony Fauci said Sunday that an ad aired by Donald Trump's reelection campaign was edited to make him seem to endorse the president's handling of the coronavirus pandemic.

"In my nearly five decades of public service, I have never publicly endorsed any political candidate," Fauci, the longtime director of the National Institute of Allergies and Infectious Diseases, said in a statement sent to AFP.

The 30-second campaign ad cites Trump's personal experience with the virus -- "President Trump is recovering from the coronavirus, and so is America," it says -- before including a brief clip in which Fauci appears to praise the president's response to the pandemic.

"I can't imagine that anybody could be doing more," Fauci is shown as saying, creating the clear impression he is referring to Trump.

But a complete clip of Fauci's comments, made during an interview in March with Fox News, shows the doctor saying:"The comments attributed to me without my permission in the GOP campaign ad were taken out of context from a broad statement I made months ago about the efforts of federal public health officials.

Trump, who returned to the campaign trail yesterday, defended the clip, and his handling of pandemic, and rebutted the doctor's criticism.

"They are indeed Dr. Fauci's own words. We have done a 'phenomenal' job, according to certain governors," the president wrote in a tweet.

Truce strained by new attacks EU expresses 'extreme concern' over intense shelling by rivals

Azerbaijan and ethnic Armenian forces yesterday accused each other of launching new attacks in and around Nagorno-Karabakh, increasing strains on a two-day old humanitarian ceasefire intended to end heavy fighting over the mountain enclave.

Russia, which brokered the ceasefire, appealed for both sides to respect it and Luxembourg reiterated European Union calls for Turkey, an ally of Azerbaijan, to do more to secure an end to hostilities that have killed hundreds of people.

The fighting, the deadliest over Nagorno-Karabakh in over 25 years, is being watched closely abroad partly because of the proximity of the fighting to Azeri gas and oil pipelines and the risk of regional powers Turkey and Russia being dragged in.

Both Ankara and Moscow are under growing pressure to use their influence in the region to end the fighting.

The humanitarian ceasefire is meant to allow ethnic Armenian forces **NAGORNO-KARABAKH**



and Azerbaijan to swap prisoners and bodies of people killed in two weeks of fighting over Nagorno-Karabakh, which is internationally recognised as part of Azerbaijan but governed and populated by ethnic Armenians.

But the ceasefire has frayed quickly. Azerbaijan said on Sunday it launched airstrikes against an Armenian regiment, following what it said was an Armenian rocket attack on an apartment building. Armenia denied carrying out such an attack. {nL8N2H105C]

Yesterday, Azerbaijan's defence said in a statement.

ministry said Armenian forces had tried to attack its positions around the Aghdere-Aghdam and Fizuli-Jabrail regions, and were shelling territories in the Goranboy, Terter and Aghdam regions inside Azerbaijan.

Nagorno-Karabakh said its forces had inflicted losses on Azeri forces and that large-scale military operations were continuing in the Hadrut area of the mountain enclave.

Reuters could not independently verify the reports.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said Russia, which has a defence pact with Armenia, was monitoring the events and asked Azeri and ethnic Armenian forces to respect the ceasefire.

The EU's diplomatic chief expressed his deep concern over reports of violations of the ceasefire.

"We note with extreme concern the reports of continued military activities, including against civilian targets, as well as civilian casualties, EU foreign policy chief Josep Borrell

TENSIONS ALONG LAC

India, China hold fresh talks on ending faceoff

Senior Indian and Chinese military commanders were holding fresh talks yesterday aimed at ending a monthslong standoff along their disputed border in the remote Ladakh region.

The talks were being held on the Indian side of the frontier in the Chushul area. No details were immediately available.

The negotiations come as tens of thousands of rival soldiers on both sides backed by artillery, tanks and fighter jets brace for a harsh winter in the cold-desert region where temperatures can fall to minus 50 degrees Celsius

(minus 58 Fahrenheit). India and China have held several rounds of talks by military, diplomatic and political officials, including negotiations between their foreign ministers and defense ministers in Moscow last month. Although the standoff has persisted, the talks seem to have calmed the situation along the border as no

new military aggression has been reported for a month. Indian soldiers also are engaged in nearly daily fighting along the de facto frontier with Pakistan in disputed Kashmir, the Himalayan region dived

between the two archrivals and claimed by both in its entirety. Indian Defense Minister Rajnath Singh said yesterday that China and Pakistan were creating conditions that suggest "a border dispute is being created under a mission."

Singh made the remarks while virtually inaugurating 44 bridges in areas bordering with China and Pakistan that officials say will facilitate easier movement of the Indian troops.

Sharp rise in natural disasters in last 20 yrs: UN

There has been a dramatic increase in extreme weather events in the past 20 years, which are taking a heavy human and economic toll worldwide and are on track to expand further, and Asia has been hardest-hit, the United Nations said yesterday. China (577) and the United States (467) recorded the highest number of disaster events from 2000 to 2019, followed by India (321), the Philippines (304) and Indonesia (278), the U.N. said in a report issued the day before the International Day for Disaster Risk Reduction. Eight of the top 10 countries are in Asia. Some 7,348 major disaster events were recorded globally, claiming 1.23 million lives, affecting 4.2 billion people and causing \$2.97 billion in economic losses during the two-decade period.

Trump's Supreme Court pick faces Senate hearings

The US Senate was set to start confirmation hearings yesterday for Judge Amy Coney Barrett, nominated to the Supreme Court by President Donald Trump despite opposition from the Democrats, who appear largely powerless to block the move before the November 3 election. The 48-year-old conservative law professor was named by



the Republican president on September 26 to succeed women's rights champion and liberal justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, who died of cancer eight days earlier at the age of 87. By law, the Republican-led Senate has to approve the nomination to the country's highest court, where conservatives currently occupy five of the nine seats.

Mumbai hit by massive

power outageA major grid failure caused a widespread power outage in India's financial capital Mumbai and surrounding areas yesterday, the first such blackout in more than two years that stranded thousands of train passengers and delayed college exams. The failure was caused by "technical problems" during maintenance work, the energy minister of Mumbai's home state of Maharashtra said in a video message. Power has now been restored to many areas of the city, officials and witnesses said.

Mumbai's international airport and two main stock exchanges located in the city were operating normally.

PUTIN CRITIC NAVALNY POISONING

EU agrees to sanctions on Russians: diplomats

The EU vesterday lined up sanctions against Russian officials over the poisoning of opposition leader Alexei Navalny and against Belarus leader Alexander Lukashenko over the crisis in his country.

Foreign ministers meeting in Luxembourg agreed in principle to sanctions proposals made last week by France and Germany, which said Russia was responsible for the poisoning of Navalny with the Soviet-developed nerve agent Novichok, three diplomatic sources told AFP.

On Belarus, the ministers said they were ready to sanction strongman leader Lukashenko, as the bloc seeks to step up pressure over his regime's

crackdown on protesters. The EU has already imposed travel bans and asset freezes on 40 Lukashenko allies for rigging an election in August that returned

him to power and then orchestrating a

crackdown on the mass protests that have rocked the country since the vote. The bloc had held back from penalising

Lukashenko, hoping to persuade him to open a dialogue with opposition forces to resolve the crisis.

But a fresh outbreak in Minsk on Sunday --

police using water cannon and stun grenades on protesters and making hundreds of arrests -- prompted ministers to give political approval to sanctioning the strongman leader.

In their formal conclusions on Belarus, the ministers said the list of sanctioned people and entities would be put "under constant review".

As he arrived for the meeting in Luxembourg, German Foreign Minister Heiko Maas had urged his counterparts to expand the sanctions list. "The violence continues, perpetrated by the

Lukashenko regime... so we have to consider

how to proceed," said Maas.

Anti-microbe drug shows promise

affordable microbial drug to treat stomach ulcers and bacterial infections has shown promise in combatting the coronavirus in animals, scientists in Hong Kong announced vesterday.

coronavirus. Using Syrian hamsters as tests subjects, they found that one of the drugs, ranitidine bismuth citrate (RBC), was "a potent anti-SARS-CoV-2 agent".

'Arctic Ocean is dying'

Scientists warn of ice-free summers in just decades

Researchers on the world's biggest mission to the North Pole returned to Germany yesterday, bringing home devastating proof of a dying Arctic Ocean and warnings of ice-free summers in just decades.

The German Alfred Wegener Institute's Polarstern ship returned to the port of Bremerhaven after 389 days spent drifting through the Arctic trapped in ice, allowing scientists to gather vital information on the

effects of global warming in the region. Mission leader Markus Rex said he and his team of 300 scientists from 20 countries had witnessed "a place of truly fascinating and unique beauty"

"We should really make every effort to preserve this world... for future generations and to use the small chance we still have to do so, he told a press conference.

Ahead of their return, Rex told AFP the scientists had seen for themselves the dramatic effects of global warming on ice in the region considered "the epicentre of climate change".



"We witnessed how the Arctic ocean is dying," Rex said. "We saw this process right outside our windows, or when we walked on the brittle ice."

Underlining how much of the sea ice has melted away, Rex said the mission was able to sail through large patches of open water, 'sometimes stretching as far as the horizon".

"At the North Pole itself, we found badly eroded, melted, thin and brittle ice." If the warming trend in the North Pole

continues, in a few decades we will have "an icefree Arctic in the summer", Rex said.

The Polarstern mission, dubbed MOSAIC,

spent more than a year collecting data on the atmosphere, ocean, sea ice and ecosystems to help assess the impact of climate change on the region and the world.

To carry out the research, four observational sites were set up on the sea ice in a radius of up to 40 kilometres around the ship.

The researchers collected water samples from beneath the ice during the polar night to study plant plankton and bacteria and better understand how the marine ecosystem functions. The 140-million-euro (\$165 million)

expedition has also brought back 150 terabytes data and more than 1,000 ice samples. The team measured more than 100 parameters almost continuously throughout the year and are hoping the information will provide a

Death penalty for rape: The severity of punishment has nothing to do with impunity



Muhammad Mahbubur Rahman is a Professor at the Department of Law, University of Dhaka. He received his Ph.D. in criminal law from the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS), University of London in 2013. His research interests focus on criminal law, legal theories, human rights, and law and society. Muhammad Rahman is currently an elected member of the Executive Council of the Asian Society of International Law. He is the author of **Criminal Sentencing** in Bangladesh: From Colonial Legacies to Modernity (Leiden/ Boston: Brill Nijhoff, 2017), and co-author of Protection of Minorities: Regimes, Norms and Issues in South Asia (Newcastle: Cambridge Scholars Publishing, 2012), and Protection of Children in Conflict with the Law in Bangladesh (Dhaka: Save the Children UK, 2008) Keeping the alarming rise in the number of sexual offences, including rape in context, Law Desk talks to him on the

Law Desk (LD): What would be your general observations on the increasing number of rape and its relation with the culture of impunity?

Muhammad Mahbubur Rahman (MMR): Reported rapes have been on the rise for many years. And what is more alarming and disturbing is that the incidents of gang rape in peacetime, the number of which has significantly decreased in many countries, appear to have increased in our society. True, we do not have sufficient scientific data or studies to underscore the impact of the culture of impunity on the increasing number of sexual offences, including rape. However, the debilitating impact of a failed criminal justice system and lower rate of conviction on the increasing number of offences is quite easily perceivable and deducible. There indeed is a relationship although it is not the only reason.

LD: What are the challenges for the implementation of the existing laws? Do you think that the existing punishment for rape is inadequate? MMR: The punishment for rape punishment is more important than its severity. The main problem is that most offenders in rape cases go unpunished and the severity of punishment has nothing to do with impunity. Without addressing the problem of low conviction rate, we cannot just assume that the existing punishment is inadequate and a more severe punishment would be the only answer to the problem. Our focus should be on why convictions are not being awarded. In my understanding, the reasons for this low conviction rate are well known to anyone having a minimum knowledge of our criminal justice system but unfortunately they are not addressed. Understanding the problems and addressing them in an honest way is the key.

LD: Should there be death penalty for rape?

MMR: The existing law prescribes the death penalty for rape leading to death and gang rape. Now the question is whether we should introduce it for all rapes. If we could maintain an acceptable conviction rate and punish

Introduction of the death penalty, without taking any meaningful step to that direction, is nothing but a hysterical response to a serious problem.

From a penal policy perspective, it is dangerous to put rapists on the same footing with murderers. The superiority of force which enables a man to commit rape can enable him to go further - to add murder to his guilt. The only restraining motive that can prevent murder in this situation is to inform him that the punishment of murder is more severe than the punishment of the crime which he has already committed. In this way, the differential treatment of rapists and murderers contributes to the security of life of rape victims. Even

and possibly result in fewer convictions. LD: What should reforms be directed at, then?

MMR: We should aim at a reform of the entire criminal justice system. No piecemeal intervention will bring about meaningful and sustainable changes. In reforming the system, there are several key areas of interventions. First, there is a strong need to reform the police. Many positive proposals on police reform are pending with relevant ministries for many years. We should generate more discussion on why our policy makers are hesitant in implementing these proposals. If we could reform the police, give them functional independence, ensure accountability and make the processes of investigation more transparent, we could ensure better and effective investigation leading to a significant increase in conviction rate. In many cases, we end up in unwarranted acquittals due to faulty investigations. Second, we should seriously rethink about the prosecution system which is heavily controlled by the executive. This arrangement is not conducive for an effective criminal justice system.

The third area of reform could be the management and protection of witnesses and victims. A law was drafted by the Law Commission long ago, but it is yet to be enacted. In 2017, the Supreme Court laid down a praiseworthy draft policy for witness management, but there is no noticeable progress in implementing the policy. If we have comprehensive witness and victim protection and management laws and policies, we can do a lot to ensure better criminal justice system. Additionally, we should focus more on countering false cases and appointing adequate number of judges. Reform in all these areas and not in respect of one only in exclusion of others, can bring positive changes in the truest sense. If we keep the entire criminal justice system in chaos and intervene only for sexual violence or rape, there will be very little improvements.

Furthermore, we need to focus on an underdiscussed area: the moral authority of law, of criminal justice system and the criminal justice agencies. The perception that criminal justice system works only through administration of punishment is a flawed perception. The moral authority of law emanates from the logical underpinnings and reasonableness underlying law. For instance, a criminal law may lose its moral authority if it is unjust in terms of ensuring the due process rights and maintaining a just sentencing calculus. Besides, the criminal justice agencies also need to have moral authority. When the moral authority erodes, the criminal justice system ultimately fails to command compliance. The said authority emanates, among others, from an impersonal rule of law. For instance, if a popular perception, even if wrong, is created that criminal justice responses are markedly different on the basis of political or social status or connection of offender or victims, then criminal justice agencies need to think in retrospect if they have an impersonal moral authority. The same thing happens when it appears that criminal justice responses in cases of "viral" incidents compared against other incidents are significantly different. Adhocism may be a good strategy to fool or appease the mass people but it ultimately diminishes the moral authority of criminal justice system and its agencies. In this connection, we should also look at how criminal justice agencies are exercising their coercive powers. If there is an arrogance of power, it not only affects their credibility but also contributes to growing criminality by those possessing different forms of power at the societal level. We should also address the crisis of credibility of these agencies.

LD: Thank you for your time. MMR: You are welcome.



under the existing law is harsh. Nonetheless, there is a growing perception that increasing the punishment further will solve the problem. The effectiveness of punishment as deterrence depends on many factors. The certainty of

the offenders with life imprisonment (which is the only punishment for rape under the existing law) and still unable to deter rape, then the question could come as to whether we should consider increasing the existing punishment and introduce the death penalty instead of the authors of the Penal Code of 1860 were well aware about this concept of marginal deterrence. Redefining rape: A medicolegal call for justice

following issues.

Rape is one of the most heinous crimes that can happen in a society. In ensuring justice for rape victims, an unbroken chain of medical evidence plays a significant role. However, in many cases, an inchoate legal conceptualisation of rape downplays sexual violence and its gruesomeness.

Section 375 of the Penal Code 1860 states that, a man is said to commit rape, if a sexual intercourse with a woman happens under certain statutory circumstances. An explanation to the section states that penetration is sufficient to prove sexual intercourse. This century old rape definition coupled with the explanation is silent as to what extent penetration is sufficient to constitute rape. This inchoate rape definition often puts medical officers in a serious dilemma. This is high time this archaic definition was changed. In this regard, the amended rape definition of Indian Penal Code is a good example to consider.

In a bid to prioritise rape justice, in the post-2012 gang rape context, India amended section 375. After amendment now the section is defined broadly as this "a man is said to commit rape if he (a) penetrates his penis, to any extent into the vagina, mouth, urethra or anus of a woman or makes her to do so with him or any other person or (b) inserts to any extent, any object or a part of the body, not being the penis, into the vagina, the urethra or anus of a woman or makes her to do so with him or any other person, or (c) manipulates any part of the body of a women so as to cause penetration into the vagina, urethra, anus or any part of body of such women makes her to do so with him or any other person or (d) applies his mouth to the vagina, anus, urethra of the woman or makes her to do so with him or any other person. This amended provision looks beyond the colonial conception of 'rape' and duly considers the needs of time

and the changing facets of rape violence in general.

Defining rape narrowly is particularly problematic and the same can keep numerous instances of sexual violence amounting to rape outside the perimeter of what is statutorily defined as 'rape'. Medically speaking, complete act of intercourse is not necessary for an act to constitute rape. Rape can be committed even when there is inability to produce a penile erection. Rape can occur without causing any injury and as such negative evidence does not exclude rape.



It is necessary therefore, for the aid of justice to amend section 375 of the Penal Code 1860. A comprehensive definition of rape can initiate fight against such a social evil like rape and can amply enable medical persons and anyone concerned with the medico-legal as well as legal process involving rape, to examine a situation claiming rape, in a proper way.

Need for accelerated action to end child marriage

A new report from UNICEF calls for accelerated action to end child marriage in Bangladesh by 2030. Despite significant progress in recent years, Bangladesh has the highest prevalence of child marriage in South Asia and ranks among 10 countries in the world with the highest levels. The report is a data brief laying down the trends in child marriage across the country since 1970. It also found that prevalence of child marriage in Bangladesh is less common than in previous generations, dropping from over 90 per cent around 1970 to just over 50 per cent today. Nonetheless, it is worth noting that, because of economic uncertainty, interruptions in schooling, disruptions of services and other factors, the pandemic has the potential to threaten progress made thus far against child marriage.

Following are some key facts that the

- report highlighted:

 Bangladesh is home to 38 million child brides, including currently married girls along with women who were first married in childhood. Of these, 13 million are married before age 15. Fifty-one percent of young women in Bangladesh were married before their 18th birthday.
- Bangladesh ranks among the top 10 countries in the world with the highest levels of child marriage and has the highest prevalence of child marriage in South Asia.
- A girl's risk of child marriage is influenced by certain background characteristics. For example, child brides are somewhat more likely to reside in rural areas and to live in poorer households, and are less likely to have more than a secondary education.
- Bangladesh has made less progress than its South Asian neighbours, but compared to other countries with the world's highest levels of child marriage,



- its progress is exceptionally strong.

 Married girls are over four times more likely to be out of school than unmarried girls. Declines in the practice have been observed across wealth groups, with more progress seen among the richest.
- Those with an education beyond secondary school are least likely to be child brides, even if they live in poorer households and reside in rural areas.
- Among districts most affected by child marriage, differences in prevalence are most evident by education levels, rather than wealth or place of residence.
- Nearly one in three child brides have a spouse who is at least 10 years older compared to one in four young women who married in adulthood. Nearly 5 in 10 child brides gave birth before age 18, and 8 in 10 gave birth before age 20. Early childbearing is much less common among those who married later.
- At least 2 in 10 women have family planning needs that are unmet by

- modern methods; levels are similar among child brides and those who married in adulthood.
- Many women lack antenatal and delivery care in Bangladesh. In some divisions, child brides are even less likely to receive such services than other women Married girls are over four times more likely to be out of school than unmarried girls.
- Child brides are more likely to say that wife-beating is justified than their peers who married later.
- Meeting the Sustainable
 Development Goal to end child
 marriage by 2030, or the national target
 to end child marriage by 2041, will
 require a major push. Progress must
 be at least 8 times faster than the rate
 observed over the past decade to meet
 the national target, or 17 times faster to
 meet the SDG target.

Old Khowai on the verge of death

Why are govt bodies part of this illegal occupation?

CCORDING to a High Court directive, rivers are living entities and the National River Protection Commission is the legal guardian of all rivers of the country and has the power to take necessary measures to protect them. But in reality, it seems such directives do not mean anything and individuals and institutions have been happily grabbing river land with impunity. The latest act of complete disregard for the HC directive has been the continuous grabbing of river land of the Old Khowai river in Habiganj, which has been encroached upon by various government establishments and locally influential people belonging to both the Awami League and BNP.

This is despite a massive drive conducted last year, during which several buildings were demolished. These have now been rebuilt and are re-occupying the land. According to a report in this daily, many local influential and government bodies have set up offices and other buildings on this illegally occupied land. They include the Habiganj District Council office, the multi-storied Diabetics and General Hospital, the District and Town Freedom Fighters' Sangshad, a government library, and buildings of other government and non-government institutions.

There are at least 2,000 illegal occupants in this area. So why isn't the National River Conservation Commission being able to stop this encroachment? How is it that the government's own drive that had demolished at least 500 illegal structures has been rendered futile as the encroachers have just come back again?

It is tragic that over the years, most of the river has been occupied and even the remaining parts are on the verge of meeting the same fate. Recovering the Old Khowai is crucial to saving Habiganj town from waterlogging and important for the groundwater table of the municipality area.

If the government is serious about its commitment to saving the country's rivers, the first thing it must do is evict all illegal occupants from these areas, especially those affiliated with it. Future projects to clean up the place must include the opinions of the local people, who are the main stakeholders and victims of this encroachment. The authorities must make sure that individuals, organisations or offices associated with it are not part of this terrible practice of killing our rivers. In this regard, the National River Protection Commission must have the power to take action against all encroachers of rivers no matter who they

Survey shows children taking up riskier jobs during pandemic

Govt must take steps on an urgent basis

7 E are disheartened by a recent report published in this daily on the state of child labour in our country during the pandemic. Eleven Manusher Jonno Foundation (MJF) partner organisations carried out a survey which shows that some 7,800 out of 30,313 child labourers, who were already involved in risky jobs, have switched to "riskier jobs" between July and September across eight districts. Around 5,600 child labourers migrated in search of jobs in the past three months, and 2,400 have been forced to join new work at minimal wage. On the occasion of National Child Rights Week, MJF organised a virtual conference on "Covid-19: Present Status and Safety of Working Children" where this field-level survey data was presented.

A majority of the population had to bear the brunt of the economic crisis that resulted from the pandemic, and the shock waves did not spare children from underprivileged backgrounds. While statistics reveal that there has been a decrease in child labour over the past decade, the reduction in the number of children engaged in hazardous work has been insignificant and is a matter of grave concern. Despite Bangladesh being one of the earliest signatories of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC) and expressing its commitment to ensure the rights of children in international forums, a lot is yet to be achieved. Although the Bangladesh Labour Law 2006 prohibits employment of children under 14, we are all too aware of the dreadful reality, as is evident from the MJF survey. During the pandemic, we have also witnessed the horrific rise in abuse of children at home, as well as at their

At a time when their tender age is meant for fun, games and education, they toil under dire circumstances to make ends meet, often forced by their very guardians. This calls for an immediate step-by-step approach so we can successfully eradicate child labour in hazardous work conditions. It is our responsibility to rescue them from the clutches of slavery, torture, sexual exploitation and other life-threatening work that risks their health and wellbeing. Coordination between government and non-government initiatives is crucial in implementing policies that will eliminate child labour, with a priority on saving children from hazardous work. As the research reveals, the pandemic has made it all the more urgent to rescue children who have been compelled to take up even riskier jobs to make ends meet. This will require helping their families with financial assistance and creating income generating opportunities for the adults, while providing education for the children.

All bets are off on Hefazat

ANGLADESH'S most influential and powerful Islamist pressure group, Hefazat-e-Islam, witnessed a dramatic upheaval earlier this month. Its centenarian founder, Shah Ahmad Shafi, died hours after he was forced to relinquish power in Hathazari Madrasa, the de facto headquarters of the Hefazat where he ruled for decades.

Faced with unprecedented student protests, Shafi was first forced to expel his son Anas Madani from the institution before stepping down himself. In the media, the agitations and the subsequent fall of Shafi were attributed to Junaid Babunagari, the group's defiant secretary-

But there were several other reasons too. Students had genuine frustrations at the mismanagement of the Madrasa, internal strife among teachers and officials, corruption allegations in the Madrasa exams, and an increasingly intolerant Anas Madani.

The context of the protest Albeit under his father's shadow, Anas Madani was a key player himself. He was instrumental to Hefazat's rapprochement with the government. After Hefazat's massive rally in 2013, the government

employed every trick in the book to tame

the Deoband-influenced religious group.

In a classic stick and carrot approach, authorities have used criminal cases and other forms of legal harassment like punishment and largesse (such as money and lucrative public lands) as rewards. The scheme has produced stunning results. Although some such as Babunagari and Nur Hossain Kashemi (the Dhaka chief) remain defiant to pressure, others such as Madani and Mufti Faizullah willingly or reluctantly acceded.

But of course, for the government, the success did not come without a cost. It had to amend the national curriculum to remove certain articles and poetry written by secular writers, soften the age restrictions designed to prevent child marriage, relocate the statue of justice to a less prominent place in the Supreme Court premises, denounce atheists, promise to prosecute those insulting Islam, and recognise the Qawmi Madrasa

Shafi often touted these as the success of his realignment with the government, but Babunagari clearly disagreed. In June this year, the discord became more visible as Shafi issued a public rebuke amid rumours that Babunagari would succeed

Soon afterwards, Babunagari was expelled by Shafi from the Hathazari Madrasa. Nonetheless, Babunagari's supporters blamed Anas Madani for the decision and still insist that he was loyal to Shafi's leadership.

Other senior teachers were already aghast at the brash and assertive behaviour of the younger "prince". Several teachers were removed, demoted or replaced by those close to Madani. The final straw was the corruption allegations and dysfunctionality in Befaq (the Qawmi education board), where Madani was seen protecting controversial officials.

As a result, with Shafi's health deteriorating, several factions presented a united front and successfully captured the frustrations of the students and evicted Madani, along with most of his key supporters, and finally Shafi himself.

A victory for Babunagari?

Although Babunagari supporters were the key backers of the student protest, the fall of Shafi and Madani does not necessarily translate into his victory. Several factions may have found some commonality, but not all of them are equally enthusiastic to rally behind Babunagari.

In the end, Babunagari did return to Hathazari Madrasa but was forced to accept a demotion. He was not given back the deputy director post, which he last held, but assigned the role of the

local MP, Anisul Islam Mahmud (of Jatiya Party but aligned with the Awami League), recently visited the Madrasa and met with Babunagari and others. It was rumoured that he carried the government's message for Hefazat but that his exit from the Madrasa premises was not very gracious.


Who will sit on the throne? The recently concluded elections of Befaq (the Qawmi madrasa education board) offer some clues as to what direction Hefazat is heading. The governmentbacked cleric Mahmudul Hasan has been elected to be the acting chief of Befaq, while the BNP affiliated Kashemi (also an

ally of Babunagari) was a close runner-up.

Mahmudul Hasan, however, is generally accepted by all factions. The Babunagari camp has not claimed any foul play and accepted Hasan, although Babunagari has already demonstrated that he is willing to accept compromises twice (first, by agreeing to return to Hathazari with a demotion and second, by accepting the Befaq election).

In this context, several allies of Babunagari are also trying to claim the spotlight. Nur Hossain Kashemi (the Dhaka chief of Hefazat), for example, is sending out frequent statements on pressing issues (such as the Babri mosque demolition case, or the much-talked-about rape case in Sylhet). The senior deputy chief of Hefazat, Muhibullah Babunagari (Junaid Babunagari's maternal uncle), is also a strong contender as a compromise

education director. Far from being the successor of Shafi, he was not even part of the Madrasa's three-member committee that now acts as the interim head.

However, within Hefazat, it is a totally different game. Sources say it is all but certain that Babunagari will be the successor of Shafi.

But much will depend on how accommodating the government will be to the idea of Hefazat being run by Babunagari. There are rumours that Anas Madani has been encouraged to return to the game by capitalising on the circumstances under which Shafi died (the ambulance carrying Shafi was blocked for a considerable time by protesters who were concerned that police would swoop in). After all, moments after Shafi died, Anas and his supporters claimed protesters were to blame and they have not yet retracted from their positions.

There are also signs that the government might offer an olive branch to Babunagari if he agrees to reciprocate. The

Kashemi himself issued a moderate protest that security officials attempted to influence voters (as a compromise measure, Kashemi has been selected as the senior deputy chief.)

However, Befaq and Hefazat are not the same thing. There was an emphasis that Befag leadership should not be politicised. This is the argument that went in favour of Mahmudul Hassan. And the general secretary, Mahfuzul Haque, has agreed to step down from Khelafat Mazlish, a party founded by his father Shaikhul Hadith Azizul Haque.

On the other hand, Hefazat acts more like a political organisation. And, there are few in the organisation who can match Babunagari's political credentials and popularity. Unlike Befaq, there will also be a strong Chittagonian (more specifically, Hathazari) influence in deciding Hefazat's next leadership.

In the end, depending on the government's responses, both sides may agree to a compromise candidate. Nonetheless, the Madani camp may rally behind Sheikh Ahmad, now one of the three interim chiefs of the Madrasa (the other two being sympathetic to Babunagari). Sheikh Ahmad replaced Babunagari in Hathazari Madrasa when he was ousted in June.

There is also a fundamental question: how interested is Babunagari in becoming the next Hefazat leader? People close to him suggest he may not even vie aggressively for the leadership position as he does not want to be seen undermining Shafi's legacy.

The council, where the new leadership will be chosen, is expected to take place next month. Will Babunagari assume control as expected? Or will it be a repeat of the Befaq election and a pro-government candidate will emerge victorious? Or, consistent with the history of Qawmi-Madrasa based Islamist political parties, will Hefazat too split into factions? This one might just be too close to call.

Failing future fast forward

VERYTHING **d** is happening we feel as if the future is being compressed into the present at frightening speed. Conservatives hark back to the golden age of stability and gradual change.

Liberals hate the current inequalities but cannot agree on how to change things. But if technology is moving at Moore's Law of exponential growth, then knowledge and complexity are expanding too fast for most of us to comprehend and decide how to cope with an unknown future.

Sociologist Mauro Guillen at the Wharton School has given his projections in the book 2030: How today's Biggest Trends will collide and Reshape the Future of Everything. All the big trends, macro and micro, will shape the future. The biggest trends are demographic—how rich countries are aging and poor ones are growing—but these numbers will push migration that creates border wars. At the same time, women will grow richer and the Asian middle class will edge out the European and American middle class. Climate change will threaten cities through rising sea levels, and water and food shortages. Technology will be the new tool to solve problems, but job disruption is a major political threat. We may no longer need to own anything, but subscribe to or rent cars, houses and smart gadgets, simply to keep up with the technology. Money will shift to digital currencies and finance will be very different with zero interest rates.

These trends are well known. In 2017, the US National Intelligence Council publication "Global Trends: Paradox of Progress (to 2035)" and the EU study titled "Global Trends to 2035", conducted thoughtful reviews of the future seen from their perspectives. Macro-trends that converge at unprecedented pace will make governing and cooperation harder, fundamentally altering the global landscape. Both studies recognise that conflict risks will grow, because the world

is increasingly fractured between ageing and shrinking rich, and growing young, poor and unemployed, packed into overcrowded cities that are ready to explode.

The US study surmises that the 2035 world will splinter into national "islands", regional "orbits", and substate and trans-national "communities" that will interact to make global and national governance harder. Interestingly, it predicted that "the global pandemic of 2023 dramatically reduced global travel in an effort to contain the spread of the disease, contributing to the slowing of global trade and decreased productivity." They foresaw the pandemic, except it happened three years earlier, and they bungled its management.

In contrast, the EU study focused on four possible scenarios: (1) Sick men of Europe: unstable Europe in stable world; has its own timetable and if its spread is not properly controlled, the economy will suffer for longer.

Second, the global system is now more complex and harder to govern. If a 3x3x3 Rubik's Cube game has 43 quintillion (10 to the power of 19) possible permutations, we realise that seven or more key players interacting with each other at "island", national and regional "orbits", and transnational "communities" levels means that everything is possible, which is exactly why we are in the current mess.

We have sick men running sick economies in a pandemic that is out of control. Both leaders and economies are surviving on steroids. No one can think long-term. All are reacting short-term rather than dealing with the important long-term consequences.



Simply put, the best investment in current volatile times is to invest in our people. The world is not facing a trade war, it is facing a talent war. It is not about democracy or freedom, but about inclusive education in the common

Ananta Jalil's dangerous tirade

NE of that I have grown to dislike, especially in the last many years is—*ek* haathe taali baaje na (you need two hands to

clap), roughly translating to, a deed is done only if two or more people come together to do it. It is not possible for one sole person to accomplish something.

Although this proverb has been used to justify ideas of working together for better accomplishments or to admonish children over breaking window panes during cricket matches in the streets, over the last many years, it has also been used to explain why and how rape victims are at fault. It takes two to commit a crime, and in the case of rapes and gang rapes also, women are blamed for enticing the opposite sex—either by smiling too much, being friendly, talking to a man, or most popularly—wearing the "wrong" or "revealing" clothes.

Even though one usually hears these statements from individuals with limited exposure to reality outside of their little world, or from people with little or no education, it was baffling and hurtful to hear someone like Ananta Jalil, an actor and a filmmaker, move along the same lines of victim blaming.

At the time of writing this opinion, Ananta Jalil has released three videos to date—the first one where he spoke against rape and blamed women's attire, a second video where he edited out the part about women's clothing and a third talking about how people are focusing on the negative and not the positive elements of his video.

Jalil's six minute long video, the first one that rightly earned him all the backlash, was curiously posted from actor (also his wife) Barsha's verified page. He had started off normallycalling out the perpetrators, trying to instill fear in them by urging them to think about their own family members in similar helpless positions. However, as the pathetic background music moved towards the crescendo, his voice too was raised as he began to advise women on how not to get raped. The actor was heard addressing women "as a brother," saying "Women (in Bangladesh) wear indecent dresses inspired by women from other countries, cinemas, television and social media. People look at your figures instead of your faces because of the indecent dresses. They make indecent comments (about women) and think of rape," he said. "Do you (women) consider yourselves modern? Is the dress you're wearing modern, or is it indecent? A modern dress means only showing your face and covering your body which will make you look good." He went on to say that any dress that does not cover the whole body makes women look "very bad". "You go out on the streets wearing a t-shirt like boys. And then you're dishonoured and return home... you either die by suicide or can't show your face in public.'

In the last month or so, reports have been rushing in about children under the age of six being brutally raped, of boys being raped by their teachers in madrasas, a married woman roaming the city with her husband raped by Chhatra League activists, and the one that shook the country to the core—a group of men stripping off a woman's clothes and raping her while she pleaded for mercy. Yet another video that was also shared on social media before being taken down was of a group of young men trying to take off a woman's burkha, molesting her and kissing her on the mouth while she pleaded for them to let her go. The woman was walking home when she encountered the group of molesters.

How is it that Ananta Jalil feels that women are to share the blame of this heinous crime? How does a commercially important person,

considered a highly respected position, especially in a developing economy, dare to speak to women, advising them not to get raped by wearing "decent" clothing? Is he oblivious to the previous cases of rape mentioned here? Or is he simply trying to move with the trend, making videos and disbursing weakly gathered information and ideas? Lastly, why does he not use his space to demand punishment for the rapists

films where women are not treated like sex objects but as equal beings capable enough to fight for love, family and friends? Why does Jalil not create opportunities for female (and male) technicians, actors, art directors, writers, directors to develop and grow in the industry?

It's unfortunate that he would rather choose to create videos with petty messages where women and rape

instead of advising women on decency?

One might also point out that the world of cinema over decades in Bangladesh has always portrayed women as objects of desire, as beings who are unable to think for themselves and, of course, the ones who end up destroying close family bonds. Female characters have rarely been showcased as heroes, courageous personalities, human beings ready to take on the world or simply take a stroll in the neighbourhood without being sexually harassed or cat called by the young men next door.

With all his resources and finances, why does Ananta Jalil not work towards changing the age-old narrative and make

victims are put down.

As Jalil's video went viral within hours of release, social media users were surprisingly divided into three groups, instead of the usual two. While one group of people, mostly men of all ages and individuals holding on to antiquated beliefs, agreed with him wholeheartedly, another group vehemently opposed this thought on platforms, speaking against the actor's illogical tirade about how to protect women from rape.

There was yet another group of people, smaller but influential, who spoke about why Jalil's words and thoughts should not be given any importance. He, after all, according

to the third group, has been making absurd storylines for films, gained fame because of his over the top appearances and the nonsensical statements he had been making over the years, giving breaks to many a genius meme maker. In a nutshell, Ananta Jalil is a joke and not to be taken seriously.

But this is where it gets problematic. What the minority group—comprising a small percentage of individuals exposed to global trends when it comes to films, literature, politics and much more—fails to realise is that to the majority of film lovers in Bangladesh, Ananta Jalil is no joke and his words are taken very seriously. Especially in smaller towns and villages, where young women are still blamed by family members and neighbours for being sexually harassed or "eve teased" on streets while going to school, Jalil's words on how women must share the blame of rape simply because of what they wear, have destroyed years worth of work done to empower women in Bangladesh, by policymakers, government bodies and human rights groups.

Art can change one's outlook towards life. Films change lives and stories of long lost lovers coming together have managed to fill people's hearts with inspiration for years. However, it is a shame that in a country where films, music, the arts and stories are still struggling and fighting to stay alive, a Pied Piper like Ananta Jalil pops up from the rubble of his own money, creating laughable content and making a comfortable space for himself. To make things worse, Jalil used this space to spread hate instead of love, as he claims to do.

It is high time to destroy these nooks and spaces built by big time influencers and focus on education, the arts, films and teaching compassion to people instead of dwelling in the mediocrity that we are so used to.



In the past, we have seen a similar uprising of criminals leading to a crime empire being built with political blessings and institutional patronage. Readers may recall that the most powerful students' movement after the 90s movement for democracy was against organised rape. Having lost faith in the political system and institutions, the students of Jahangirnagar university organised the anti-rape movement in 1998 against

within a society and subjects them to various forms of abuse, including but not limited to sexual, physical, financial and psychological abuse. The curious cases of exercise of power and control by Jashim Uddin Manik, Tufan Sarker, Rifat Farazi, OC Pradeep, Saifur Rahman and last but not least, Delwar Hossain, indicates their motivation toward psychological projection, greed and personal gratification with systematic political and institutional blessings some politicians facilitated their rise to

power and institutions bestowed with the responsibility of protecting the victims turned a blind eye, until people started demanding justice.

Sadly, our political process is such that politicians always tend to shrug off their responsibilities and deny existing flaws. It immediately starts a blame game as if it is the cause and effect of the other party. The state institutions too, play a reactive role instead of a proactive one in protecting the human rights of the people. They act only after it turns into a sensational case. The National Human Rights Commission, for instance, have hardly conducted any investigations into extrajudicial killings, which constitute extreme abuse of power, although it enjoys the power of a civil court. Unfortunately, civil society organisations also do not always act beyond political ideology. Such inaction or reactive actions have created a vacuum that leads to people taking to the streets for justice.

Demanding justice on the streets is the last resort for people, but it is likely to happen every now and then when the institutions of society continue to fail. The question is, how did we get here? The answer is infuriating and disheartening—we have been here for quite some time. The culture of injustice against the vulnerable and powerless has been built and fortified over time. Over these years, we have failed to build a democratic and inclusive society. We have beautifully decorated our democratic institutions but without the desire and capacity of serving the vulnerable and marginalised people who comprise the major portion of the population.

Then what is the best way to fight and mitigate such violations of human rights and rule of law? We have to fight both the criminals and the background of the crime. It will be a mistake to judge the MC College and Noakhali gang rapes, and the brutal killing of

Sinha, merely through the lens of criminal laws. When the country speaks in the same language by demanding quick justice for the victim, the culprits are more likely to be punished under the existing laws of the country. To prevent a repetition of such crimes, we need to simply understand the criminology—what led to Delwar's uprising and how did OC Pradeep, being an officer of law and order, continue his wrongdoings for years?

Many human lives were saved in the month of September as it did not see any extrajudicial killing. The countrywide agitations and media reporting against extrajudicial killings contributed to this achievement, which otherwise might not have been the case But it is an underlying fact that when a society is politically and economically strong, the crime rate will decrease and we will not need to take to the streets for justice. The renewed stance of the government in the backdrop of the Noakhali gang rape is encouraging. Amending the Women and Children Repression Prevention Act, 2000 may not be enough. Different provisions in the Evidence Act and Code of Criminal Procedure and prosecution of violence against women need to be revisited as well, but nothing can be achieved without a strong political system. A strong political system and its

institutions will stand ready to fight for its people irrespective of age, gender and economic status. Therefore, it would be far more effective to invest in criminology to analyse the main reasons behind the crime and eliminate them. A society without crime is perhaps impossible. The criminology here, in this case, is that we have a fair and transparent political process in place and that the institutions are not blindfolded and biased.





Speaking to The Daily Star, UNO Asif said the mayor's proposal did not comply with the government rules. "As I tried to explain the matter, the mayor pressed me to stop talking."

He said he would submit a written complain to the higher authorities in this regard.

More than half of French nurses approaching burn-out: survey

More than half of French nurses are close to burning out, according to a survey of nearly 60,000 of them published on Sunday, which found they were struggling with cancelled holidays and increased work due to coronavirus.

The survey carried out by the national French nursing union found that 57 percent of respondents reported being in a "state of professional exhaustion", up from 33 percent before the global Covid-19 pandemic struck France early in 2020.

The findings underline the strains being felt in the healthcare sector in Europe, which came under unprecedented pressure during the first wave of infections and now faces another surge in admissions.

"I wanted to have a piece of history that nobody could have.

After 15 years of misfortune, however, Nicole decided the "cursed" pilfered artefacts were responsible. They had "so much negative energy", she said in her letter, "linked to that land of destruction.'

The ancient city of Pompeii was buried in volcanic ash after the disastrous eruption of Mount Vesuvius in 79 AD. The city was rediscovered in the 16th century and excavations have been ongoing since.

Talking to reporters, Obaidul Quader said, water sharing of interlinked rivers, including the Teesta, is an important issue and the high commissioner told him that the Indian prime minister is very much sincere about it and trying his level

ALL HAIL QUEEN IGA

Iga Swiatek made history on Saturday as Poland's first-ever Grand Slam singles champion with victory over No.4 seed Sofia Kenin in the final.

The 19-year-old is the youngest Roland-Garros women's winner since Monica Seles triumphed in Paris as an 18-year-old in 1992 and is the first teenager to lift the women's singles trophy here since Iva Majoli in 1997.

Swiatek, ranked 54 in the world, is the lowest-ranked women's Roland-Garros champion since the rankings were introduced in 1975. She is the first woman since Justine Henin in 2007 to lift the Coupe Suzanne-Lenglen without dropping a set.

AN AUTUMNAL DROP SHOT

Gaston, a left-hander, and Djokovic may have been the duo who most frequently utilised the finesse shots.

Gaston hit a whopping 55 against Thiem, according to the New York Times, and Thiem subsequently offered up his fair share against Schwartzman.

STAGGERING NUMBERS RACKED UP BY NADAL

With a lifetime record of 100-2 in Paris, Nadal becomes the first player to achieve triple digit match victories at Roland-Garros.

Nadal joins Federer atop the all-time men's singles Grand Slam titles list with 20. Only Margaret Court (24), Serena Williams (23) and Steffi Graf (22) have won more major singles titles than Nadal.

With his 2020 title, Nadal clears Navratilova to become the only professional player -male or female -- to win the same tour event 13 times.

Nadal is six titles clear of Evert (7) for the all-time lead in Roland-Garros singles titles won, and seven clear of the legendary Bjorn Borg (6) for the all-time lead in men's singles titles won in Paris.

At the Grand Slams, Nadal has now surpassed Margaret Court, who won 11 Australian Open titles, by two.

Nadal is now the only men's singles player in history to win a major without dropping a single set four different times.

By winning this title in Paris, Nadal now has won his sixth Grand Slam title since turning 30, which leaves him as the only man to have won more than five major singles titles beyond the age of 30.

Speaking at length in the virtual news conference after claiming the Eifel GP, his seventh win of the season, the runaway series leader talked of his admiration and respect for the seven-time champion German whose records he is chasing.

already a world champion after winning his first title with McLaren in 2008.



China to test city of 9m in five days

Study shows virus 'survives 28 days' in lab conditions

All nine million people in a major Chinese port city will be tested for Covid-19 following a tiny outbreak, health officials said yesterday, as surging infection numbers in Europe force another round of containment efforts.

The virus has been largely brought under control in China -- where it first emerged last year -- in stark contrast to many parts of the world still afflicted by rolling lockdowns and high case numbers. British Prime Minister Boris Johnson was set to

announce a new three-tiered alert system for coronavirus cases in England later yesterday, while German authorities shuttered Berlin bars and clubs after 11:00pm until the end of the month and France is believed to be mulling local lockdowns in major cities.

Six cases of Covid-19 were confirmed on Sunday in China's Qingdao -- a northeastern port city of 9.4 million -- prompting health officials to announce China's first mass testing in months.

Five districts will be tested "within three days" and the whole city "within five days", a statement from Qingdao's municipal health commission said, although it did not

give a precise figure on how many people would be tested. China has extensive, quick test capabilities and by yesterday noon the health commission said more than

US economists Paul Milgrom and Robert Wilson won the Nobel Economics Prize yesterday for work on commercial auctions, including for goods and services difficult to sell in traditional ways such as radio frequencies, the Nobel

The duo was honoured "for improvements to auction theory and inventions of new auction formats," the jury

The Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences noted that the discoveries by Milgrom, 72, and Wilson, 83, "have benefitted sellers, buyers and taxpayers around the world, it said in a statement.
