Tea in, tobacco out

Northern district of Nilphamari sees new era

Tea is fast replacing tobacco in Kishoreganj upazila of Nilphamari as favourable weather and soil conditions along with a ready market next door mean large profits for

Panchagarh, a neighboring northern district, has already emerged as a top producer after the traditional tea-growing regions Sylhet and Chattogram.

Now, Nilphamari follows with tea finding ideal conditions in these sub-Himalayan northern districts.

Upazila Agriculture Officer Md Habibur Rahman said the tobacco cultivation area is shrinking in Kishoreganj upazila every year as more and more tea is being cultivated. This year, tobacco was produced in only 420 acres of

land in the district -- down from 625 acres five years ago, Tobacco farmers said a yield of around 25 maunds of

tobacco from an acre earns them Tk 60,000 on average; but nearly 50 percent of this is spent as production costs. They also suffer from a sense of stigma, as they

unwillingly contribute to harming human health. This shift from tobacco to tea gradually came due to local leadership taking note of the prevalence of tobacco cultivation in the district.

The then Kishoreganj upazila parishad chairman Rashidul Islam said former UNO Siddikur Rahman, noticed during his tenure in 2015 that local farmers were interested more in tobacco cultivation since it was considered a cash

crop.

colonel. On March 11, 2013, Tasawwar, the great-grandson of mystic poetsongwriter Hason Raja, suffered a cardiac arrest after almost 24 years of service in the army. He was a month away from being promoted to colonel.

The cardiac arrest led to hypoxic ischemic brain injury, which in turn led to a coma that he has been in since May 12 of that year, Combined Military Hospital (CMH) doctors

Back from the dead

Pronounced dead by doctors, newborn found alive before burial

A newborn girl, declared dead by a doctor at Dhaka Medical College Hospital early yesterday, was found alive hours later, just before she was about to be buried at a city graveyard.

The doctor declared the premature baby dead minutes after Shahinur Akter, 27, gave birth to her around 4:45am after six and a half months' pregnan

"There was no pulse after her premature birth, and so she was declared dead," DMCH Director Brig Gen AKM Nasir Uddin told

The Daily Star. He added that the baby was readmitted to the hospital and was doing well.

"We will investigate the incident," he said.

Over 3 lakh recovered from Covid

Shows DGHS data; 15 die, 1,527 test positive in a day

UNB, Dhaka

One thousand five hundred and nine people recovered from Covid-19 in 24 hours till 8:00am yesterday, taking the total number of recovery cases to 300,738.

The recovery rate stood at 77.89 percent, according to the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS).

The health authorities

reported 1,527 new cases

of Covid-19 after testing 13,577 samples in those 24 hours. So far, the country has recorded 386,086 positive cases. During the same

24 hours, 15 Covid-19 patients died, raising the death toll to 5,623. The fatality rate was

recorded at 1.46 percent, said the DGHS. So far, 21,40,129

samples have been tested and 18.04 percent of them SEE PAGE 4 COL 1

Scientists throw lifeline to world's rarest primate



Hainan gibbons -- the rarest primates on Earth -were already teetering on the edge of extinction in 2014 when the most powerful storm to lash China's coast in half a century ravaged their island oasis.

Decades of economic development, along with logging and deforestation, had reduced their habitat by more than half.

What primary forest remained was also fragmented, further hemming in the tailless apes,

which travel exclusively above ground. But the massive mudslides unleashed by super



Biden accuses the US president of doing 'nothing'; nearly 18m cast early votes

President Donald Trump delivered a combative defense on Thursday of his Covid-19 response while election challenger Joe Biden -- offering a glaring contrast in style in a rival town hall -- accused him of doing "nothing" to end the pandemic.

The dueling appearances, scheduled at the same time on rival television networks, showed Biden giving unflashy, empathetic, often in-depth answers to voters in the audience, while Trump delivered a fiery, sometimes agitated defense of his presidency.

Trump, who trails in the polls ahead of the November 3 election, was especially under pressure about the coronavirus that has killed over 217,000 Americans and inflicted deep economic damage.

"We're rounding the corner," Trump insisted with his

usual optimism, even as swaths of the United States see sharply rising caseloads.

But pressed by the host of the NBC town hall in Miami, he became quickly frustrated, especially when asked about his previous lukewarm denunciations of extremist
