Rape verdict in 7 working days

Bagerhat court completes quickest trial to date; legal experts give mixed reactions

A tribunal in Bagerhat has delivered its verdict in a rape case in just seven work days, setting a record for the fastest disposal of a criminal case.

The district's Women and Children Repression Prevention Tribunal-2 vesterday sentenced 53-year-old Abdul Mannan Sardar to life in prison along with a fine of Tk 20,000 for raping a seven-year-old girl in Mongla

Law Minister Anisul Huq said the quick disposal was a reflection of the government's sincerity in ensuring justice within a short period of time. But some legal experts said the accuracy of trial proceedings will come into question if they are conducted in a hurry.

The case was filed by the girl's uncle on October 3, after she was raped. A judge court referred the case to the tribunal on October 11, reports our correspondent in Bagerhat.

Yesterday's verdict was delivered by District and Sessions Judge Md Rules stipulate that trial of any case filed under the Women and Children

Repression Prevention Act must be completed in 180 days. Convict Mannan, resident of a government shelter for the homeless,

was arrested soon after the case was filed.

The tribunal took cognisance of the charges on the day the case was

Hundreds in distress in Bosnian woods

Md Yasin, a Bangladeshi youth, took a perilous journey from Oman to Bosnia and Herzegovina two years ago, with a dream of making it to a rich

But things didn't go as planned, and he is now stranded in the woods of Velika Kladusa in the southeast European country near the Croatian

Over the last few months, he tried in vain to enter Croatia from there. Whenever he tried to enter that country, the Croatian police caught him, seized all his belongings and pushed him back to Bosnia, according to a report of Deutsche Welle (DW) Bangla published on Sunday.

"I reached Iran from Oman by a speedboat, and then travelled to Greece via Turkey. I entered Bosnia from Greece. I have been stranded in the woods for the past four months.

"Three days ago, I again tried to enter Croatia. This time, I almost made it to the country [Croatia] but was eventually caught by police. They snatched away everything I had and pushed me back," Yasin told German

He is one of the several hundred stranded Bangladeshis, now passing their days in inhuman conditions in the woods of Velika Kladusa near the Croatian border amid severe cold, mentioned the DW report.

Jute workers, cops clash; 25 hurt At least 9 workers' leaders arrested in Khulna

At least 25 people, including three police personnel, were injured in a clash between police and jute mill workers on the Khulna-Jashore highway yesterday morning.

The clash broke out when around 1,000 former workers of the jute industrial belt in Khulna and Jashore took up position on the highway around 11:00am to press home their 14-point demand, which includes the

reopening of 25 jute mills.

Police arrested at least nine workers in connection with the incident.

Three police personnel were also injured. Worker leaders alleged that police foiled their peaceful blockade programme.

Police at first tried to negotiate with workers when they, under the banner of Sammilito Nagorik Parishad, blocked the road, said Kudrat-e-Khuda, convener of the
