# America holding its breath

Voting underway on election day amid fears of unrest

Americans were voting yesterday in the bitterly contested presidential race between incumbent Donald Trump and challenger Joe Biden after a tumultuous four years under the businessman-turned-politician that have left the United States as deeply divided as at any time in recent history.

Voters lined up at polling places around the country casting ballots amid a coronavirus pandemic that has turned everyday life upside down. Biden, the Democratic former vice president who has spent a half century in public life, has held a strong and consistent lead in national opinion polls over the Republican president.

But Trump is close enough in several election battleground states that he could piece together the 270 state-by-state electoral college votes needed to win the election.

Trump is hoping to repeat the type of upset he pulled off in 2016 when he defeated Democrat Hillary Clinton despite losing the national popular vote by about 3 million ballots. Trump is aiming to avoid becoming the first incumbent US president to lose a re-election bid since George HW Bush in 1992.

# US election matters for Bangladeshi migrants

As the world eagerly awaits the result of the critical US Presidential Election, an obvious question arises -- will it have any implication on US-Bangladesh relations with a change at the helm or will it remain the same?

Analysts say if Democratic candidate Joe Biden wins, he will relax restrictions on immigration laws. However, any other policy which would apply to Bangladesh will remain largely the same.

"Because of Trump's policy change, many Bangladeshis who have not been able to secure the legal status in the US will benefit if Biden wins. Many families who had been separated will be able to reunite eventually," said former foreign secretary Touhid Hossain.

Sultana Rahman, a New York-based Bangladeshi journalist, said she believes that about 90 percent of the Bangladeshis in the US support Biden.

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# BUYING SMARTPHONE UGC loan for 41,501 public univ students

The University Grants Commission considers providing 41,501 public university students with Tk 8,000 each interest-free loans so that they can buy smartphones and attend online classes amid the pandemic.

The money will come from UGC's own funds.

The regulatory body of universities had sought the funds from the education ministry, but since it is taking time to respond, the UGC wants to go ahead with the project on its own.

"We don't have the end of Covid-19 [pandemic] in sight. We did not get any concrete answer from the government. If we don't give the money right away, students who can't afford to buy smartphones will further lag behind in their studies," a UGC member said.

He said they wrote to the ministry in June, seeking the funds.

The member also said the UGC had initially planned to give Tk 15,000 to each student. But they cut it down to Tk

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# PREVENTING SECOND WAVE Govt words not reflected in action

The government's preparations for tackling a possible spike in Covid-19 cases in the coming winter appear to be limited to rhetoric as efforts to control virus transmission and ensure treatment are still far from satisfactory.

In the wake of a second Covid wave in many parts of the world, especially in Europe, the government high-ups fear a likely rise in infections in Bangladesh too, but insist that they have taken all-out preparations for that.

However, the measures taken by the ministries concerned hardly reflect their claims.

Firstly, the government could not strictly enforce the health safety rules, a key instrument in the fight against virus transmission. A large section of the population is still reluctant to wear masks though it is mandatory to use face coverings in public places.

Another important aspect of the preparedness is hospital management. Here too, the government falls short of the required preparations in case the health system gets overstretched due to a spike in infections.

The health directorate has not been successful in ensuring adequate tests, central oxygen supply and other life-support equipment at public hospitals across the country.

Yet, Health Minister Zahid Maleque on Sunday claimed that the government was "completely ready" to tackle a possible second wave.
