The new feature will tell the users when people nearby, or if anyone is moving or approaching. It will also allow usess to set tones and hepatic pulse corresponding to certain distances.



Want to beat the crowd? Upgrade your emotional intelligence

Emotional Intelligence refers to the ability to recognise, understand and regulate our own emotions as well as do the same with others'. In practical terms, this means being aware of the fact that emotions have a significant impact on human behaviour and decisions both positively and negatively. Created by Peter Salavoy and John Mayer, this term gained popularity in 1996.

In modern-day and age, emotional intelligence is more valued than any other form of intelligence. For the development of interpersonal relationships between peers, colleagues and even friends and family, this can be a game-changer is establishing clear and meaningful communication. EQ is also very much celebrated for its significant contribution in self-development and professional growth.

The Four Quadrants

Emotional intelligence is all about channelling one's energy and feelings into exciting and positive pathways through building awareness of emotional logic. Emotional intelligence revolves around four quadrants with which a person's emotional excellence is determined. The quadrants are Self-awareness, Social recognition, Self-management and Social relationship management.

Self-Awareness Self-awareness typically reflects

Self-awareness is the first step towards a better perspective of the vision that you might have for yourself. Social Relationship Management



Md Didarul Islam, better known as Suian Vw. is one of the admins of the club and runs a shop specialising in restoring classic Vespas and Volkswagen Bettles. He told us the biggest challenge in restoring these vintage machines is the availability of parts. A carburetor for

a classic model can cost up to 42,000 taka. Full restorations can skyrocket five to ten lakhs. However, the cost can be cut down by a lot if the owner chooses to forgo originality and use Indian parts. Sujan runs this shop not for profit, but for his passion for preserving these classics. A passion that is shared by the other members of the club.

Farishta Jayas, another of the club's admins, talked passionately about rebuilding his Ruby 1961 VBB Vespa 150, with plans for traveling the country with his Vespa someday. Another moderator, Sam D'Costa, also spoke similarly about Ivy, his restored silver 1964 VBB prominently displaying a Shift sticker.

Malik Talha, a collector of various classic vehicles and a key organizer of this event, had this to say:

"The Vespa club Bangladesh is by far the largest active club in the country. Clubs like Super Tuner are bigger sure, but they do not represent a single brand of vehicle. The owners here are diverse and passionate about their vehicles. No other club has held a meet of this scale."

If you are a fan of these Italian classics and not a fan of the rowdy lifestyle of an average motorcyclist, be sure to hit up the Vespa Club of Bangladesh. Just remember to get yourself a Vespa, a suit and follow the rules laid out by the club to get the full "gentleman's life" experience.

Bangladeshis at Big Tech: What's it like to work at Amazon?

colossus Amazon is one of the biggest companies in the world and a dream workplace to tech enthusiasts everywhere. Many Bangladeshis desire to work at Amazon; hence, we talked to Software Development Engineers Aunik Ahmed and Ahmed Faiyaj from Amazon to get some valuable insights about their journey of getting selected for their respective positions, their experience of navigating their way through the Amazon's selection procedure while asking them for advice for those, who want to work at Amazon in the future as we hope to see more Bangladeshis achieving their dreams and joining the

The experience of working at Amazon has been very exciting, humbling and rewarding for Aunik Ahmed as he is enjoying working with a great team that supports him and gives him the space to learn and grow at his own pace, and although he was not prepared for the sheer amount of responsibilities that came along with the job, it became an opportunity for him to grow even more and continuously improve himself to keep up with his colleagues. His surreal experience is what drives him to keep working for Big Tech. "My work is challenging and gives me a real sense of accomplishment, knowing that whatever I'm working on will be used by millions of people around the world; unfortunately, not yet in Bangladesh

He also assured future Amazon employees that there are perks of working at Amazon: it is not all work and no play One will find plenty of people sharing similar interests and to do fun activities together. "I play games a lot, so I have joined several clash teams in League of Legends, we play Among Us every Friday, and we are in the process of convincing our managers to get a PS5 for our floor. Also, there are happy hours on Fridays, various informal hangouts and activities throughout each month while the pay is amazing and employees get a lot of discounts at really cool places," added he. Meanwhile, this is Ahmed Faiyaj's first time working in a large company like Amazon, and from the software development process perspective, he is finding it quite similar to start-ups. However, working at Amazon becomes challenging when scaling and customer impact gets considered as his work can break the site, which can impact millions of customers worldwide. Also, he has to communicate with multiple teams and go through multiple steps before pushing his work to the live site or server. He said, "so far, working at Amazon feels like more responsibilities, more communication and process-oriented

than working at other companies; especially the early-stage unicorn level start-up, where I had worked before joining Amazon"

Faiyaj shared his experience on what had worked for him in achieving this success saying, "I applied online on Amazon's website and later, they sent me some coding questions through an online exam system. I submitted my code. After a week, I got an email from a recruiter that they want me to go through the on-site interview. As the pandemic had started. I did the on-site interview fully remotely. There were four interviews - three coding interviews and one system design interview. All the interviews contained behavioural questions as well. The whole interview process was quite smooth and friendly, and the interview questions were quite standard and without any surprises. After one week, they sent me the job offer.

requires patience, hard work and perseverance. Since new graduates without internship experiences have a hard time understanding other people's code, Aunik Ahmed suggests that interested candidates should put in the hours and effort to drive their growth and deliver results accordingly. Moreover, he cautioned to expect a lot of struggles and have "impostor syndrome" almost all the time as what he finds scarier is the fact that his teammates are incredibly talented people who make him doubt his abilities and place on the team. The work is quite challenging, and unlike anything, one has ever done before. The deadlines just serve to increase the pressure even more. "These are normal things that every recruit goes through, and trust me it eventually gets better if one is not discouraged by the pressure and is passionate enough to keep moving forward. If not, they should reconsider



On the other hand, Aunik's journey of getting into Amazon started a year before he got into the company. "I applied for an internship at Amazon in my 3rd year of university. I passed the first online exam but failed the second one horribly. That did not discourage me, and I kept uploading my updated resume to their hiring portal and about a year later, when I was four months away from graduating, a recruiter from Amazon reached out to me encouraging me to apply again. This time I was well-prepared and aced their three rounds of online exams. After which, I prepared for another two weeks for the final on-site interview, and I was able to ace that as well. After about a week, they let me know that I got selected and that remains as one of my happiest days ever ", he noted.

Similar to working at any other FAANG companies, working at Amazon joining Big Tech," he remarked.

Amazon is hiring a lot of people from fresh grads to experienced people in different work roles: therefore. Ahmed Faiyaj advised that interested candidates go through the Amazon's career site to look for jobs which fit their profile, make sure the cv/resume reflects the job requirements and then apply on the site or get a referral from someone who works at Amazon. Having good preparation is a must, and for that, doing online searching to understand what kind of questions are asked during Amazon's interviews and what is the best way to answer those can be significantly helpful. "One should have a good

understanding of computer science concepts if one wants to work at Big Tech companies as an Engineer. So, it is better to solve algorithm problems when pursuing a bachelor degree. Participate

in online programming contests, read about the latest technologies and use cases, do some pet-projects, work on communication skills, and look for online resources or questions related to Big Tech company job interviews to find out what skills you are lacking and work on it. Last but not the least, you may fail at the interview: do not get frustrated, do not lose faith, learn from the mistakes, and do more practice to make yourself better." he asserted.

Moreover, according to Aunik Ahmed, it is very straightforward to get into Big Tech as surprising as it may sound. There are three steps Bangladeshi students should take.

First of all, people applying at Big Tech have stellar resumes. Almost everyone who gets selected has either had some sort of internship experience, research experience, teaching experience or impressive side projects. As it is difficult for students in Bangladesh to get relevant coding internships, they should deep dive into making as many astounding side projects as possible to help them stand out among the crowd. It does not matter which university they have attended as long as everything else on the resume is what the recruiters are looking for.

Secondly, they need to prepare like there is no second chance. for if they fail to get into any of the Big Tech companies, they will have to wait for another 6-12 months to re-apply, and by the time they re-apply, they might have already fallen behind everyone else. So, to seize the opportunity, after the resume gets selected for online exams, they should learn and practice all coding fundamentals and behavioural questions. Aunik Ahmed highly recommended solving as many problems as possible on Leetcode and try to grasp the concepts properly so that it becomes easy to innovate when the time comes. The other big thing is to prepare for behavioural interviews by practising the STAR method. Prospective employees must be prepared to answer any sort of behavioural question using the STAR method.

Thirdly, it is mandatory to give online exams for any of the Big Tech companies to get selected. The format is different for each one but still, it is compulsory to take them to be considered for further interviews. So, if their resumes get selected, and they pass the online exams and if they are confident about their preparation for coding and behavioural questions, they should try doing timed mock interviews with their friends. These practices will be really useful in actual interviews. Finally, he advised trying not to panic too much during any of the exams or interviews. Being calm and collected is key to succeeding.

Real world self-defence tips from Edward F. Gomes of Tactical Krav Maga Bangladesh

The truth is most women face some form of harassment on roads every day. And unfortunately, there is no perfect way or specific self-defence trick to fight back. However, there are some effective tips to follow and some habits that you can practice to defend yourself in an emergency. We spoke to Edward Francis Gomes, an instructor in Tactical Krav Maga Bangladesh to compile some basic tips and tricks based on some common scenarios of harassment.


How can I realise if someone is stalking me? And is there any way to prevent such a situation?

Statistically speaking, most of the stalkers know their targets before. In most cases, they are someone close to their targets or know their daily routine, whereabouts and important information too. To get rid of these types of stalkers, prevention is better. For instance, you should not share your daily routine or contact details without knowing the person properly. If possible, do not share your address too much specifically such as flat or floor number with the delivery man too. Go downstairs to take your parcel and do not call them to come up directly. But still, if someone starts to



stalk you and you want to be prepared to realise that and fight back, the first thing that you should do is to practice 'Situational awareness'. It is one of the skills which may help a person to scan the environment to find out the threats in the present or projecting the threats into the near future. There is a four-colour system which provides a framework for moving between the non-aware to ready-for-action state. In Condition White, you are completely unaware

of your surroundings and unprepared to defend yourself in case something dangerous starts to play out. You move into Condition Yellow when you are aware of your environment and realise that something bad might happen. In Condition Orange, you have specifically identified a person or persons as a potential threat. And in Condition Red, you are fully aware of and prepared to fight in case anything goes wrong. You might need to jump into Condition Red from Condition Yellow if things suddenly get worse. If the worst happens, you need to go to Condition Red directly.

Now I am in Condition Red or Condition Yellow, but I need to do something for my safety. What can I do to save myself?

When you get failed to prevent and you are in Condition Red or in such a situation where you need to do something, you can try to avoid your perpetrator(s) at first. If you are suspicious about someone around you, then try to go to any crowded place such as shopping mall, stationery shop, market or even to any building where there is a chance to get support. The next thing you can do is to negotiate with them or to juggle them by talking. Meanwhile, try to call someone who can help you or give a call to any national emergency helpline or activate the emergency SOS system. If possible, share your location with your family or friends in this kind of emergency. The last stage is to run away or fight back. If there is a chance, run away from the place as fast as you can. But if you fail to do so, just fight back as much as possible. This is 'do or die' situation.

Suppose I need to fight back. So what can be the improvised self-defence weapons in this regard?

Many women do not realise that they have so many accessories with themselves, which can be used as weapons in an emergency state. For example, when you realise there is a danger and you need to fight back, take off your bangle and grip it tightly before punching them. Or everyone has keys with them when they are out of the home. You just need to grip a key between your knuckles keeping the sharp point outside like Wolverine's claws and punch the offender in vulnerable parts of the body such as eyes, nose or ears. You can even turn a newspaper or magazine into a weapon by folding it tightly. Just strike this folded paper below the ear or in eyes as hard as possible. Besides, a woman can use her vanity Bag to slam and scarf to choke or lock the perpetrator or hit him with high heels. You can use a safety pin to prick someone who tries to touch you inappropriately. There are so many things as potential weapons. Even if you have absolutely

none of these things, pick up some brick pieces and pebbles from roads and start to throw those in case someone tries to harm you. Moreover, spraying body spray or splashing some water from your water bottle on the perpetrator's eyes can buy you some time to run away.

What if I am in an enclosed public transport?

It seems too hard to fight back when vou are in an enclosed area like public transport. However, you still can do so if you work smartly without being frozen. Suppose, you are in a CNG and you somehow get to know that the driver has an ill motive. To escape away from this, you need to hold the grilles strongly and stretch your feet before kicking directly to the point where the knob is. If you are in a taxi or Uber, always keep the car window open. In case, the driver suddenly tries to close the window even after your denial, somehow put the bag handles in between. Kick the centre of the window with strong kicks or strike it with your keys provided that he manages to close the window. It is possible to break the window in this way. In a bus, there is an opportunity to bang the head of the perpetrator on the seat handles or just stand up on your seat to kick in the face.

In the end, a gentle reminder is that all of the mentioned tactics must be used to defend, not to harm anyone innocent. **B TOGGLE**
