





Virus curbs tighten worldwide

Germany warns restrictions likely to continue for months; Greece extends ban on gatherings

Germany yesterday warned that its anti-coronavirus measures were likely to last four or five more months, as Greece announced a new ban on gatherings and Mexico surpassed one million infections.

The novel coronavirus has killed at least 1,313,471 people since the outbreak emerged in China last December, according to a tally from official sources compiled by AFP at 1100 GMT yesterday.

At least 54,001,750 cases of coronavirus have been registered. Of these, at least 34,599,700 are now considered recovered.

Over Saturday, 9,246 new deaths and 607,998 new cases were recorded worldwide. Based on latest reports, the countries with the most new deaths were United States with 1,351 fatalities, followed by Brazil with 921 and Mexico with 635.

Germany, Europe's largest economy, went into partial lockdown in early November, closing bars, restaurants and other recreational facilities but keeping schools and shops

"We will have to live with considerable precautions and restrictions for at least the next four to five months," Economy Minister Peter Altmaier told the Bild an Sonntag newspaper.

Dhaka Metropolitan Magistrate Md Masud-Ur-Rahman recorded their confessional statements after Md Faruk Mollah, inspector of Adabar Police Static also the investigation officer of the case, produced them.

In their statements, they told the magistrate that they, along with other employees, beat the victim, according to court sources.

Further details of the confessional statements could not be known immediately.

After recording their statements, the magistrate sent them to Dhaka Central Jail in Keraniganj.

Indian holy city records highest number of oil lamps

A north Indian city has maintained its Guinness World Record for lighting the highest number of oil lamps in celebration of Diwali for the second year running.

The holy city of Ayodhya, where Hindus believe the god Ram was born and where he returned after 14 years in exile, lit 606,569 oil lamps and kept them burning for at least 45 minutes.

Thousands of volunteers took part in the lighting of the lamps along the banks of the Saryu River, in the streets and in houses on Friday evening. Last year, they lit 409,000 oil lamps.

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25 female 'Jamaat activists' sent to jail

'He won because the election was rigged'

Trump backtracks on acknowledging Biden won election

President Donald Trump backtracked yesterday after appearing to acknowledge for the first time that Joe Biden won the Nov. 3 election, saying he conceded "nothing" and repeating his unfounded claims of widespread voting

Biden defeated Trump by winning a series of battleground states that the Republican incumbent had won in 2016. The Democratic former vice president also won the national popular vote by more than 5.5 million votes, or 3.6 percentage points.

Trump made his conflicting statements in a series of Twitter posts

"He won because the Election was Rigged," Trump wrote on Sunday morning, not referring to Biden by name. "NO VOTE WATCHERS OR OBSERVERS allowed, vote tabulated by a Radical Left privately owned company, Dominion, with a bad reputation & bum equipment that couldn't even qualify for Texas (which I won by a lot!), the Fake & Silent Media, & more!'

About an hour later, Trump wrote, "He only won in the eyes of the FAKE NEWS MEDIA. I concede NOTHING! We have a long way to go. This was a RIGGED ELECTION!"

Speaking on the NBC program "Meet the Press," Biden's pick for White House chief of staff, Ron Klain, said, Donald Trump's Twitter feed doesn't make Joe Biden president or not president. The American people did that."
