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DMP sacks 10 cops for dope test failure

Seeks explanation from 8 others

Dhaka Metropolitan Police has come down hard on its members who failed dope tests and were found to have involved in drug dealings or collaborating with the drug

There have been widespread allegations against many law enforcers about their involvement in the drug trade and abusing it.

As part of punitive measures against such crimes, the DMP has dismissed 10 of its members and issued orders to eight others seeking explanations as to why they would If the eight fail to give satisfactory answers in a week

after receiving the orders, they will be dismissed as per the departmental punishment rules, said Walid Hossain, deputy commissioner (media and PR) of DMP, yesterday. The process was going on to terminate over 50 others

who failed dope tests, DMP Commissioner Shafiqul Islam told The Daily Star recently. In a meeting at the Police Headquarters on November 15, the DMP chief said the tests were carried out on 78

members of DMP who showed drug addiction symptoms like drowsiness and 68 of them tested positive, said an official of the PHQ. According to the DMP, of the 68 police personnel, seven

are sub-inspectors, one is sergeant, five each are assistant sub-inspectors and nayeks and 50 are constables.

The 10 dismissed and the eight who were served orders are among the 68.

Amnesty Int'l concerned at construction of 5-star hotel

Amnesty International yesterday shared a statement stating its concern about the construction of a five-star hotel in the Chittagong Hill Tracts that could lead to the forced eviction of the Mro people, an indigenous tribe, from their ancestral lands.

"Immediately abandon the construction of the luxury hotel on the Chimbuk-Thanchi route and ensure that any further construction or establishment on the indigenous land respects the free prior and informed consent of the community, said the statement signed by the organisation's Head of South Asia Omar Waraich.

"The construction of the luxury hotel on the route between Chimbuk and Thanchi will eventually wipe out villages and forcibly evict a large number of the Mro people. Community members said that the hotel and the

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Trump's bid to overturn vote result unravels

Pennsylvania lawsuit scrapped as pressure grows on the incumbent to concede

After a scathing court setback in Pennsylvania, President Donald Trump faces increased pressure from his fellow Republicans to drop his effort to overturn the US presidential election and concede to Democrat Joe Biden.

The decision -- announced in a judgment which excoriated the Trump team's legal strategy -- paves the way for Pennsylvania to certify Democrat Joe Biden's victory there, which is scheduled to take place today.

With the clock ticking down to Biden's January 20 inauguration, Trump's team has focused on trying to stop battleground states from certifying election results, in addition to his numerous legal challenges that have so far failed.

Judge Matthew Brann wrote in his ruling that Trump's team had presented "strained legal arguments without merit and speculative accusations" in their complaints about mail-in ballots in Pennsylvania.

G20 pushes for 'equitable' Covid vaccine access

Reaffirms support for debt-laden poor countries

G20 nations yesterday pushed for ensuring equitable distribution of coronavirus vaccines worldwide and reaffirmed support for debt-laden poor countries as the pandemic led to further closures in parts of the world.

With cases surpassing 12 million in the United States, the highest in the world, many Americans were nonetheless heading to airports to travel for next week's Thanksgiving holiday despite health officials' warnings to stay home.

Some US states were imposing new restrictions, including California, where a 10 pm to 5 am curfew was taking effect.

On the opposite side of the Atlantic, British Prime Minister Boris Johnson plans to announce that restrictions across England are to end on December 2 as planned, his office said.

But the lockdown will be followed by a return to a threetiered set of regional curbs.

Britain has suffered more than any other country in Europe from the coronavirus, with more than 54,000 deaths from 1.4 million cases.

In the Middle East, Iran announced it had shut nonessential businesses in over half its cities and towns for up to two weeks and introduced movement restrictions.
