Returnees see bleak future

2.72 lakh returned in 7 months; govt efforts for their economic reintegration fail to yield expected outcome

After years of struggle, Mostakim Alam landed a job at a digital printing shop in Kuwait as a computer operator. With earnings of Tk 1.20 lakh a month, all was going well.

Then came the novel coronavirus, bringing with it a sudden and impactful cascade of disruptions to his life. Losing the job, he eventually returned home in May from the Gulf country where he had been working for six years.

Over six months on, the 30-year-old from Khulna's Paikgachha upazila is now finding it hard to maintain his family.

"I am unemployed now," Mostakim, a father of two, told this newspaper by phone recently.

The condition of Masum Mia, 24, is better off to some extent. After remaining jobless since his return to the country on May 10 from Bahrain, the migrant from Brahmanbaria started a small tea-stall in his area last month. He worked in Bahrain for eight years.

Now, he is struggling to make ends meet with the income from his shop. His six-member family, including his parents, depend on him.

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Infection spikes by 32.5pc this month

Experts sound alarm as 54,723 Covid cases recorded in Nov, compared to 41,281 in Oct; deaths also see 8pc rise

With winter sweeping over the country, Covid-19 cases have risen by 32.5 percent this month compared to the number recorded last month.

During the first 29 days of October, 41,281 confirmed Covid-19 cases were reported, while the Directorate General of Health Services reported 54,723 confirmed cases in the same days of November.

Experts said the rise is related to the drop in temperature as the country enters the winter months, and warned that the trend may continue as December is the coolest month in Bangladesh.

With the increase in the number of patients, hospitals in Dhaka are struggling to meet the rise in demand for intensive care unit (ICU) beds for coronavirus patients with comorbidities, sources said.

"The virus loves the cool weather. Already we are observing a rising trend in new cases this month. It will probably rise further during December because December is the coolest month in our country," Dr Mahbuba Jamil, head of the virology lab at Institute of Public Health (IPH), told The Daily Star.

Different ministers have been arguing that Islamic countries like Saudi Arabia and Iran have sculptures.

Recover 1.38 lakh acres of forestland

JS body sets March 2021 deadline for govt to begin eviction of grabbers

A parliamentary body has set March next year as the deadline for launching eviction drives to recover 138,000 acres of reserve forestland grabbed by 88,000 individuals and organisations across the country.

The decision came at a meeting of the parliamentary standing committee on the environment, forest and climate change ministry at the Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban yesterday.

"The committee asked the ministry to complete by December 20 the list of grabbers and prepare documents containing their addresses, data on occupied land area, land record numbers and the dates of grabbing," Saber Hossain Chowdhury, the chief of the parliamentary watchdog, told The Daily Star after the meeting.

TAXPAYERS FILE RETURNSDeadline ends today as NBR

is reluctant to extend time
Only one-fourth of 50 lakh plus registered taxpayers have filed their annual income tax returns until end of the last week with

the National Board of Revenue saying

it is not going to extend deadline for submission beyond November 30. It means that taxpayers, who would be unable to file their returns today, will have to submit returns by seeking time from the field offices of taxes. And holders of Taxpayers Identification Numbers (TIN), except for certain cases, will face fine for failure to furnish their income returns this year.


