POWER SUPPLY FAILURE

30,000 govt websites go offline

More than 30,000 government websites of the Bangladesh National Portal were inaccessible since yesterday morning due to an electrical fault in the Bangladesh Telecommunications Company Limited server.

The problem arose when the inverter of the BTCL's server burnt, said officials of the government's Access to Information (a2i) project and BTCL.

Arfe Elahi, chief technical officer of a2i, told The Daily Star yesterday, "BTCL's power supply was cut off around 9:45am today [Sunday]. We have most of our servers under BTCL and we couldn't run those servers on without the power connection. There is no problem with the portal or

"We are working with our full team to reconnect the servers. It will take the whole night to fix it. More than 30,000 government websites have been shut down," he

It marks the second time in two weeks that government servers have gone down. Last month, 484 government-run websites were suspended, including 62 sensitive websites like those of the Bangabhaban, Prime Minister's Office (PMO), cabinet and different ministries, due to overload of information in the server.

Since the disconnection of power supply to BTCL's servers in Moghbazar, the websites of various ministries,

EVICTION DRIVE

Haji Selim's unauthorised structures torn down

Associates of lawmaker Haji Mohammad Selim had preemptively torn down parts of an illegal structure that he had allegedly built ahead of yesterday's eviction drive by the Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority in Old Dhaka's Shoari Ghat

Dhaka-7 allegedly occupied the land and put up a signboard of "Modina Water Tank" there, locals said, adding that his associates had torn down parts of a warehouse and some water tank replicas in the area.

Led by its Executive Magistrate Mahbub Jamil, a BIWTA team tore down other portions of the structure, built illegally by encroaching on the land of the river during the drive.

Locals said associates of Haji Selim took away goods from the warehouse so that the goods were not damaged during the drive.

Move to beef up rice stock

The government may import up to five lakh tonnes of rice to replenish the country's depleting food stocks and tame the soaring prices of the staple, a food ministry official said. The Directorate of Food has already floated a tender to buy 100,000 tonnes of parboiled rice from the international market. Meanwhile, the government placed an order for 50,000 tonnes of rice last week and plans to purchase another 100,000 tonnes from abroad soon. "We will buy more rice from the international market instead of depending too much on local millers," Food Secretary Mosammat Nazmanara Khanum said yesterday.

A member of Parbatya Chattogram Jubo Samity was shot dead at his home in Baghaichari upazila early yesterday

Ratan Priyo Chakma alias Bidhan, 34, was at his home in Pakujjechhari village with his wife and three children when the assailants broke the front door and shot him dead around 2:00am, police claimed.

Bidhan was a member of kupokari union committee of Parbatya Chattogram Jubo Samity (PCJS), which is an associate body of Jana Samhati Samity's MN Larma faction.

PCJS President Gyano Priyo Chakma in a press release said the Parbattya Chattogram Jana Samhati Samity (PCJSS) was involved in the murder.

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Giant claw to be sent to space to collect debris

The European Space Agency will be sending a huge claw into space in order to remove buildup of space debris that has been accumulating around the planet.

The ClearSpace-1 mission will target the Vespa (Vega Secondary Payload Adapter), which was left in orbit after the second flight of Vega in 201.

The agency is using a Swiss start-up, called ClearSpace SA, to perform the task. It is expected

to launch its mission in 2025. 'ClearSpace-1 will demonstrate the technical ability and commercial capacity to significantly

of them minors, entered Bangladesh from India illegally with the help of the traffickers, said ASP Kamruzzaman of Rab-9. "We've found four

identity cards of Indian Rohingya camps. They might have planned to mix with Bangladeshi locals or to go to the Rohingya camps in Cox's Bazar," the Rab official said.

A case will be filed against the traffickers, he said, adding that the Rohingyas would be sent to Cox's Bazar refugee camps.

Two held over rape

COVID VACCINE IN INDIA

Pfizer seeks urgent approval

China prepares large-scale rollout of vaccines as UK rollout set to begin

Pfizer Inc has applied for emergency use authorisation of its coronavirus vaccine in India, media said yesterday, the first to do so in a country with the world's second-highest number of infections.

The US company, whose vaccine was recently approved by the British government, has written to the Drugs Controller General of India (DCGI), CNN-News18 reported citing a government source.

Officials at the DCGI and the health ministry did not respond to requests for comment. A government official, however, told Reuters that no application had been received as of Saturday night.

Pfizer could not immediately be reached.

Indian officials have said they are pinning their hopes mainly on locally tested vaccines instead of those developed by Pfizer and Moderna Inc.

The Pfizer shot needs to be stored at minus 70 degrees Celsius (-94 F) or below, temperatures that most Indian cold storages cannot reach. India has reported more 9.57 million Covid-19 cases,

behind only the United States, with nearly 140,000 deaths. In China, provincial governments are placing orders for experimental, domestically made coronavirus vaccines,

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
