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Abused at every turn

13-year-old rape survivor, her parents go thru' untold sufferings, humiliation time and again

A 13-year-old girl from a village in Bogura's Dhunat upazila was abducted, gang raped for more than a month, and then left unconscious by a road on August 24. Her sufferings, however, were still not over.

As her family sought justice, a group of influential locals humiliated them instead. They also isolated the family from other villagers, organised an arbitration and allegedly tried to "settle the issue" taking money from the offenders.

Police, on the other hand, all along remained reluctant to record a rape case over the incident. The family alleged some locals and a sub-inspector joined hands with the culprits.

Meanwhile, one of the main accused in an abduction case filed in this connection, Masud Rana, a 35-year-old from the same village, remains scot-free and frequently threatens the family over phone.

"Masud said he won't let us stay in the village if we did not withdraw the abduction case," said the girl's father, a low-paid garment employee who lost his job after the Covid-19 struck the country.

He said Masud along with 45-year-old Fazlul Haque Babu, member of the local union parishad, had been harassing his seventh-grader daughter on her way to school over the last couple of years.

Both of them wanted to marry the girl, but the family turned down their individual proposals, said the victim's mother.

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Many buses, which are out of service, have been parked at the BRTC Kamalapur Bus Depot in the capital for a long time. Some of them are beyond repair and are being used as donors for parts. Buses that are in service often do not get the room to park there and are forced to park on the street. HC stays trial proceedings against Matiur Rahman

The High Court yesterday stayed for six months the trial proceedings of a case filed against Prothom Alo Editor and Publisher Matiur Rahman over the death of Dhaka Residential Model College student Naimul Abrar Rahat.

The court also issued a rule asking the state to explain in four weeks why the case proceedings against Matiur Rahman should not be scrapped.

The HC bench of Justice Md Rezaul Haque and Justice Md Atoar Rahman came up with the order and rule following a petition filed by Matiur Rahman seeking the cancellation of trial proceedings.

Lawyers Rakanuddin Mahmud and Mustafizur Rahman Khan appeared for Matiur Rahman while Deputy Attorney General Saifuddin Khaled represented the state during the virtual hearing of the petition.

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'Profits over people'

Migrants share appalling experiences at Malaysian glove factories

Bangladeshi migrant worker Sheikh Kibria recalls with horror the filthy, overcrowded dormitory where he was housed by the world's biggest rubber glove manufacturer when a coronavirus outbreak erupted and infected thousands.

Malaysia's Top Glove saw profits soar, and its stock price jump as much as 400 percent this year as countries worldwide rushed to buy protective gear as the pandemic intensified.

But in interviews with AFP, the South Asian migrants working flat out to make the gloves -- who typically earn around \$300 a month -- described appalling living conditions, in cramped dormitories where up to 25 people sleep in bunk beds in a single room.

Some claim the company did not do enough to protect them despite repeated warnings.

The scandal has added to growing pressure on the firm, already under scrutiny after the United States banned the import of some of its gloves over allegations of forced labour earlier this year.

CONSTITUTION AUTHENTICATED

Formalities for the commencement of the constitution of the People's Republic of Bangladesh on December 16 are being undertaken by the Gono Parishad (Constituent Assembly) at its two-day special session. This morning, Speaker Mohammadullah puts his signature to authenticate the constitution. The speaker

then calls upon Prime Minister Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman to put his signature on the original Bangla copy and on its English translation.

After signing the constitution, Bangabandhu says, "I am a proud man today. Our people are proud too at this moment."

He further adds, "Our people for the last 25 years had been yearning for a supreme law for the conduct of their own affairs. Now that has been achieved by them within a short period of 11 months of the Liberation."

Suranjit Sengupta abstains from signing the document. Manabendra Larma, an independent member for Chittagong Hill Tracts, has not joined the session.

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BREXIT TRADE DEAL UK, EU agree to go 'extra mile'

London and Brussels agreed to "go the extra mile" in coming days to try to reach an elusive trade agreement despite missing their latest deadline to avert a turbulent 'no deal' exit for Britain from the European Union's orbit at the end of the month.

British Prime Minister Boris Johnson and the president of the EU's executive Commission, Ursula von der Leyen had given negotiators a deadline until yesterday to find a way to resolve an impasse on arrangements that would guarantee Britain zero-tariff and zero-quota access to the EU's single market.

Both said on Friday that a 'no-deal' was now the most likely outcome, but yesterday they mandated negotiators to continue.

US starts vaccination today

Germany to impose stricter curbs; S Korea hits new daily record for cases

The Pfizer-BioNTech Covid-19 vaccine will reach hospitals and other sites across the United States by this morning, ready to be injected into the arms of millions of the most vulnerable Americans as the global death toll topped 1.6 million.

Doses will be shipped out in boxes containing dry ice that are capable of staying at -70 degrees Celsius (-94 degrees Fahrenheit), the frigid temperature needed to preserve the drug.

General Gus Perna, who is overseeing the massive logistical operation as part of the government's Operation Warp Speed, likened the moment to D-Day, a turning point of World War II.

"I am absolutely 100 percent confident that we are going to distribute safely, this precious commodity, this vaccine, needed to defeat the enemy Covid," he told reporters.

The imminent start of the mass vaccination campaign in the world's hardest-hit country came as Germany announced a partial lockdown from Wednesday with non-essential shops and schools to close in a bid to halt an "exponential growth" in coronavirus infections.

The restrictions will apply until January 10, with companies also urged to allow employees to work from home or offer extended company holidays, under the

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
