India pledges vaccine support Timely, effective delivery when ready; connectivity,

resolving water sharing, border killing discussed

India promised to promptly and effectively deliver to Bangladesh the Covid-19 vaccines it is producing as Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and her Indian counterpart Narendra Modi held a virtual summit yesterday.


The two PMs also expressed their interest in expanding the already-strong bilateral and regional economic cooperation by improving connectivity while resolving existing issues, including water sharing and

management and bringing down border killings to zero.

Stating that Bangladesh is a significant pillar of India's "Neighbourhood First" Modi said pharmaceutical companies on both sides have already arranged plans for supply of vaccines. The prospect of cooperation in production will also be explored, he added.

Airports being used Give couriers to smuggle out yaba NID server

Anti-narcotics officials, law enforcers say

Drug traffickers smuggled four to five stashes of yaba pills in luggages and shipping boxes out of the country through the airports every month in the last two years.

Anti-narcotic officials and law enforcers said the recipients were mostly in other South Asian countries, the Middle East and the US.

Several drug rackets were involved in shipping the pills brought in from Myanmar, they said after interrogating several arrested traffickers and keeping a watch on several

Since there is no 3D baggage scanner at the airports, the found that transnational gangs simply shipped the stashes undetected via overseas : syndicates are using the courier and postal services.

In the destination countries, the packages were picked up by recipients from the shipping company's offices or the airports, according to recent findings of the Department of Narcotics Control (DNC) and transnational crime-fighting unit of police.

"These are difficult to detect unless expert narcotics officials check the packages putting a lot of effort or a state-of-the-art scanner is used," said a high official of the DNC. In some cases, the traffickers tricked migrant workers into becoming mules.

Last month, aviation security officers at Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport (HSIA) found around 39,000 yaba pills inside a box of garment factory accessories. The box was being sent to Saudi Arabia on a cargo plane.

DNC officials later arrested five suspects in this connection, said an investigator.

To stop narcotics smuggling through national and international courier services, the Department of Narcotics Control has recommended National Identity Card server access for couriers.

The anti-drug authority of Bangladesh came up with the idea after it couriers to smuggle drugs into the Middle East, America, Australia and some countries in Asia.

Smuggling narcotics from neighbouring India and Myanmar, syndicates are using Bangladesh as a major transit route.

Kajol all set to be free at last

HC grants the journo, out of home for 280 days, bail in two cases

After photojournalist Shafiqul Islam Kajol was "found" near the Indian border in the middle of the night 53 days after his disappearance, his family thought he would be coming home soon.

Kajol's son went to Jashore to bring him, while his wife and daughter waited in Dhaka.

Then as the day progressed, the photojournalist was suddenly whisked off to jail, under Section 54 of the Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC). The police informed the court that he was being arrested since he was facing three cases under the Digital Security Act (DSA) filed separately by a lawmaker and two activists of Jubo Mahila League.

Ahmad Shafi's Death Hefajat leader Mamunul, 35 others sued for 'murder'

Thirty-six people, including Mamunul Haque, a top Hefajat leader, were sued yesterday over "killing" the former chief of the Islamist outfit Shah Ahmad Shafi.

The case comes at a time when Hefajat-e Islam, under its new leadership with Junayed Babunagari as the ameer, has taken to streets opposing the construction of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman's

sculptures. Safi's brother-in-law Md Moin Uddin filed the case with the court of Judicial Magistrate Shiplu Kumar Dey of Chattogram around noon yesterday, claiming that Safi was murdered in a

pre-planned manner. The court took the case into cognisance and ordered Police Bureau of Investigation (PBI) to investigate it. It also asked the PBI to submit a report on the probe progress within a month, said

Money Launderers

Who are they? Where are they?

HC asks ACC, govt for specific info on those who bought homes abroad

The High Court yesterday wanted to know specifically the names and addresses of Bangladeshi nationals who have laundered money abroad and purchased houses in foreign

countries, including Canada, Singapore, and Malaysia. It also wanted to know what steps have been taken against them.

The court directed the authorities concerned of the Anti-Corruption Commission and government to submit separate reports before it by February 28 next year.

The HC bench of Justice Nazrul Islam Talukder and Justice Ahmed Sohel also fixed February 28 for holding further hearing and passing order on this issue.

The bench passed the order during virtual hearing on

a suo moto (voluntary) rule issued by it on November 22 on this issue.

During the hearing, Attorney General AM Amin Uddin told the court that the government has taken necessary legal steps against money launderers and has sought information from the diplomatic offices of different countries where they have purchased homes.

The government needs time to get the information, he said. ACC's lawyer Khurshid Alam Khan placed a compliance report before the HC bench, saying that the ACC has filed cases against more than 100 people including Casino kingpins Selim Prodhan, Ismail Hossain Samrat and Khaled Mahmud for laundering money abroad.

Trial proceedings against them are going on, he said, adding that the ACC and government have brought around Tk 70 crore as laundered money from abroad through mutual legal assistance cooperation law.

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
