Present grim, future worrying

As pandemic hits country's labour migration hard

Shahadat Hossain was all set to fly to Saudi Arabia in March as a date farm worker, dreaming of a better life for his family members. But before he could make his journey, came the deadly Covid-19, suspending air communications with the Gulf countries in mid-March.

Like everything that came to a staggering halt, Shahadat's scheduled migration was suspended. The 30-year-old from Chandpur now drives a CNG-run auto-rickshaw to earn a living as his documents are under process for a visa reissuance by the Saudi Arabia Embassy in Dhaka.

"I could have earned a monthly wage of 1,050 Riyal [Tk 23,600]. Besides, there was the opportunity to earn extra by working overtime. But now I end up earning Tk 200-300 a day by driving the auto-rickshaw. It is difficult to run my three-member family with this income," said Shahadat.

While the pandemic deprived workers like Shahadat from a decent earning, it also cast a dark shadow over the country's labour migration as the sector is likely to see a significant fall in annual overseas employment this year.

The Bureau of Manpower, Employment and Training (BMET) data shows about 1.81 lakh workers went abroad from January till May this year. BMET does not yet have the

Husband kills wife after fight over his affair

A woman has been strangled to death allegedly by her husband in Chattogram's Ambagan Rail Gate area as she prevented him from being involved in an extra marital affair.

Police arrested accused Mohammad Sohel, 37, of Cumilla's Chandina, on Thursday morning, 15 hours after the murder.

The arrestee gave his confessional statement before the court metropolitan magistrate Sarwar E Jahan yesterday evening.

The victim is Amena Begum, 30, said police.

The murder took place at the tin-shed house of the couple at Ambagan Rail Gate area on December said Mohammad Shahinuzzaman, officerin-charge of Khulshi Police station.

"The couple has two daughters and one son. They often locked into argument as the wife tried to stop her husband from an extramarital affair. On

Covid positivity rate drops to 8-month low

The rate of daily positive coronavirus cases dropped yesterday to 8.6 percent, the lowest it has been in more than eight months, while the recovery rate continued

In 24 hours ending at 8:00am yesterday, a total of 13,191 tests were performed in 140 Covid-19 testing centres across the country and 1,134 tested positive for the virus. Thirty-six people died with the highly transmissible virus over the same

The previous lowest daily positivity ate was on April 10, when 7,93 percer of 1,184 samples tested positive for

The percentage of positive cases is a critical measure because it gives an indication of how widespread the infection is in the area where testing is occurring and whether levels of testing are keeping up with levels of disease transmission, according to John Hopkins University.

A high percentage of positive cases means that more testing should probably be done -- and it suggests that it is not a good time to relax restrictions aimed at reducing coronavirus transmission.

Boycott meeting where he was present



Teachers of Rajshahi University demanded immediate implementation of recent government orders, including relieving Prof Abdul Bari from the post of the university registrar.

The RU authorities were compelled to postpone a meeting of admission test committee yesterday after several teachers refused to attend it in presence Prof

The teachers' move came as the government recently asked the university authorities to remove him for not assisting the University Grants Commission probe committee.

Macron tests positive; Tokyo says strain on hospitals severe

Europe to start

Covid shots

French President Emmanuel Macron became the latest head of state to test positive for coronavirus yesterday, forcing several other European leaders into quarantine as the continent struggles with a winter surge in infections.

With Europe now approaching 500,000 deaths since Covid-19 first emerged a year ago, the EU has pledged to start vaccination campaigns across the bloc by the end of the year in a bid to curb the spread of the disease

With inoculations seen as the only way to bring the global pandemic to an end, American experts were set to discuss yesterday if US pharma company Moderna's vaccine should be authorised -- the latest to seek approval after the rollout of the Pfizer-BioNTech jab.

Macron was tested for coronavirus after he suffered the first symptoms and will now self isolate for seven days, his office said in a statement.

"He will continue to work and carry out his activities remotely.'

Russian President Vladimir Putin wished the French president "a speedy recovery and good health for many years to come", according to a statement published by the Kremlin.

The French leader joins US President Donald Trump and British Prime Minister Boris Johnson who were both briefly hospitalised earlier this year after contracting the virus that has killed 1.6 million people worldwide and caused economic havoc around the globe.
