Concerns as Mymensingh Premier League starts today

Mymensingh Premier League (MPL), 100-ball cricket tournament of the

gets underway Mymensingh today amid concerns over health safety of the cricketers involved.

Marking the birth centenary of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, the tournament titled Walton MPL-2020, a Battle of 100 Balls', will feature a number of former national players as well as members of the Under-19 World Cup winning team.

Mymensingh Masters Cricket Association (MMCA), a forum of ex-cricketers, is organising the event at the Mymensingh Circuit House ground.

A total of six teams, split into two groups, will take part in the five-day tournament, which will conclude on December 25, informed organisers at a press conference yesterday.

According to the organisers, the tournament will feature former national team players such as Mohammad Ashraful, Rakibul Hasan, Iliyus Sunny, Suvagata Hom, Sabbir Rahman, Arafat Sunny, Nasir Hossain alongside U-19 World Cup team members including Akbar Ali, Parvez Hossain Emon, Tanjid

Hasan Tamim and Towhid Hridoy. Although the organisers claimed



that health guidelines and social distancing will be maintained, there is a fair amount of skepticism whether that is even possible at a divisional city and under the auspices of a local association.

Bangladesh Cricket Board's CEO Nizamuddin Chowdhury said they discourage players to be involved with any such events outside the jurisdiction of the BCB, especially during the pandemic era.

"Keeping Covid-19 at bay is a very big challenge. From the experience of the BCB President's Cup and the

that organising events entails a lot of challenge, with great logistical and monetary investments needed during pandemic. It takes a lot of planning, effort and investment to ensure a bio-bubble. We have always discouraged players from committing to any such events and asked everyone to maintain caution and personal health safety,"

Chowdhury told The Daily Star. Akbar Ali is one of the players to feature in the tournament, as per the organisers. When contacted,

Bangabandhu T20 Cup, I can say the wicketkeeper-batsman said he received an invitation, but was yet to decide on participation.

BCB hoping to appoint batting consultant soon



With the home series against the West Indies scheduled to begin in January drawing nearer, the Bangladesh Cricket Board is looking to fill the vacant post of batting

Former South Africa batsman Neil McKenzie resigned as Tigers' limited-overs batting consultant in August this year, ending a two-year stint with Bangladesh.

BCB then roped in former New Zealand batsman Craig McMillan as a replacement for the tour of Sri Lanka, but after the shock of his father's death, he decided not to continue in his role with the Tigers.

The board has since been looking for other candidates and it was learned that the BCB is in talks with former English cricketer

and Durham head coach Jon Lewis for the post of the Tigers' batting consultant for the upcoming West Indies series.

"We have a few candidates for the post of batting consultant of our national team and we are in talks with them," Akram Khan, chairman of BCB's cricket operations committee, told the media yesterday. "At the moment it won't be appropriate to disclose any name as we are yet to finalise anyone. As you know, we had Craig McMillan as the batting consultant for the Sri Lanka series, but he couldn't join us for family reasons.

"Although the tour of Sri Lanka was eventually postponed, we were looking for a new batting coach. Hopefully, we will be able to appoint one soon."

The 50-year-old Lewis was also among the shortlisted candidates for the batting consultant post after McKenzie left the job, and was even expected to arrive in Bangladesh for an interview.

Lewis had the experience of coaching in the subcontinent as he worked as Sri Lanka's batting coach in the ICC World Cup in 2019. He was also instrumental in Durham winning the Royal London One-Day Cup title back in 2014.

Meanwhile, the selectors have already chalked out the squads for the series against West Indies, who are scheduled to arrive in Bangladesh on January 10. The Caribbean side will take part in a three-match ODI and two-match Test series.

Akram had previously informed that the national camp for the West Indies series is expected to start by the first week of January and the foreign coaching staff, including head coach Russell Domingo, is expected to join the side by the time.

The Players' Status Committee of the Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) yesterday recommended that Brothers Union be provisionally allowed to take part in the season's curtain-raising failure to submit players' registration documents within the deadline.

The football season will start tomorrow through the Federation Cup with 13 teams.

"The window of the players' registration is opened centring the Bangladesh Premier League but Brothers Union delayed for two days in submitting their documents. Although it does not match with the bylaws, we have recommended that Brothers be provisionally allowed to take part in the Federation Cup," said BFF Players' Status Committee Deputy Chairman Abdur Rahim after the meeting.

"The meeting referred the matter about Brothers' participation in the BPL to the professional league committee, who will take the final decision after discussion with the BFF executive committee," said Rahim. "The committee will also inform FIFA and other BPL clubs.
