Nissan went belly down, Jaguar goes the extra mile

Nissan is going through a bit of a resurgence lately. From the retrofuturistic 400Z to the futuristic Ariya, it seems the JDM legend has gone back to being fun and quirky. Their new concept car, however, takes the quirkiness and turns it up to eleven. Designed by the Vice President of Nissan Design America Jaebum "JB" Choi, the Nissan GT-R (X) 2050 is an ultra-low supercar that you're supposed to drive lying down. Measuring in at 10 feet long and just 2 feet tall, this "superbike on four wheels" is intended to be less of a vehicle and more as a "wearable machine," with a special suit required for brain-to-vehicle connectivity. Obviously, this thing is nowhere production-ready and now only exits

as a static model, but that doesn't stop it from blowing our minds.

Moving from one island nation to another, Jaguar's Vision Gran Turismo SV is a car that's not supposed to physically exists. The low-slung electric hypercar is purely meant for the virtual world of Gran Turismo Sport, where its four electric motors deliver a combined output of 1,877Hp and 2,478 pound-feet of torque, with a 0-100 of 1.65





seconds. However, for reasons entirely unknown, the company has decided to build a full-scale mockup of the virtual car. Much like the previous car, however, this car has no hope for entering production, as we are not sure if the body is paired to any drivetrain. Which is something of a shame, as it would be exhilarating to see this sleek beauty silently cut through the winds in real life.

Adobe adds over 20,000 design assets to Spark

US software company Adobe has updated its Spark social media design tool with more than 20,000 new design assets.

The update also brings small UI changes, designed to accommodate the new feature.

According to Techcrunch, Justin Church, Adobe Spark product manager, said "For our users, who are everyday entrepreneurs and marketers, they want to create professional-looking content and they certainly don't have design experience. The rollout of these tens of thousands of new design assets that we're coming up with will really empower them to create standout social posts and things like Instagram stories that are more original and creative than they've ever been able to so far.

As Church noted, a lot of users utilize Spark's templates to get started, but there's also a large set

of users who start from scratch and they will especially benefit from the ability to quickly pull in frames, illustrations, brushes, and more. Given the broad range of users, Adobe opted for a very broad range of assets. They plan to expand this set of assets over time, and will closely monitor which categories are popular.

Electrification of everything




A year of uncertainty, yet a year of unity



Tecno Camon 16 Premier – the new toy in town

After a year of hiatus, I am finally back in gadget review- and today we are reviewing Tecno's Camon 16 Premier. Tecno, Africa's one of the top smartphone brand, has been pacing its operation in Bangladesh. They have opened a production plant here and this device is manufactured (assembled would be the right word). Let's see what this device is like:

Starting with the form factor, the device, keeping with the trend, is ginormous. The main real estate of the device is a 6.9 FHD dot-in display LCD Panel which provides near accurate colour gamut. Out of the phone comes with a 90Hz refresh rate which is feel good. You can certainly toggle it down to 60Hz which we highly discourage. The smoothness, as well as the responsiveness, while dropping a bit however the battery life of the phone will increase by up to 10 per cent. The brightness of the screen can also go up quite high so we recommend to use auto adjustments. The touch is responsive and one of the best part of the phone to me is the touch sensor on the side which doubles as the power button. The touch sensor is quite big, and the response time is almost instantaneous. One small caveat of the phone is that it does not have any LED notification indicator.

The build of the phone is solid. The glass front and polished back of the phone will certainly give you a plush feeling while holding it. The logo on the



back is etched stylishly on a glacial silver colour panel- things can't get any more chic than that.

The top right of the screen houses the 48MP+ 8MP dual flash camera. This dual camera of the phone does what it is supposed to do: pick good photos. The photos are not as sharp or natural one

might expect, but certainly Instagramworthy. The while balance is a bit off on the camera when taking photos using the AI mode. The wide-angle lens allowed to take a bigger photo so group-selfies with this phone won't be a problem.

The main camera on the back is big, raised a chunk of sensor-housing has four



individual camera sensor and on pentaflash. The quad cameras are 64MP wide camera, 8MP ultra-wide sensor, 2MP depth sensor and 2 MP dedicated video sensor.

The photo quality of the phone can be rated as above average. It performs stellar in daylight. The AI mode can be a buzzkill if you like taking photos with accurate colour as the AI engine of the phone always tried to make the colour on every photo pop a bit. I haven't used the Camon 16 Pro, the elder sibling of the product line before, but online reviewers attested that photo quality has improved a lot on this iteration.

The performance of the phone is quite impressive too. Average day to day task including multitasking glides through the phone thanks the Octacore Mediatek G90T chipset coupled with 8GB RAM. I tried playing PUBG on the phone for nearly an hour and the performance remained buttery-smooth. The Mali-G76 MC4 GPU unit was able to handle some other graphics-intensive games on medium settings without dropping performance much. Only one issue we encountered during heavy gaming was the phone heating up a bit- which I guess is kind of expected.




Despite having a humongous screen, the phone actually had quite good battery life. It survived my everyday abuse from 10 AM in the morning till midnight without any mid-day charging. The 5,000 mAh did not take much time to charge up either- the credit here goes to the 33W fast charging port.

Lastly, the OS- man, really don't know where to begin or where to stop. HiOS 6 is probably one of the biggest letdowns of the phone. It might be partly due to the fact that I have been using Samsung and iPhones for a while now. The OS has colourful icons, bloatware, native advertising and app suggestions. To be honest, it isn't bad. Many people particularly youths find it appealing but it was not going with my taste.

Tecno has been excelling in the local market for a while now and Camon 16 Premier is certainly a device it can bet on to keep on continuing that very trend. The price-tag seemed a bit particularly with competition lurking around with so many options. But if you are in the market for a phone with a budget under 30k, then Camon 16 Premier is definitely worth considering.

A brief look at the COVID-19 mRNA vaccines

With the pandemic having the world on a chokehold, the race to develop a vaccine form this virus is in full swing, According to WHO, 54 different vaccines under development, with a handful of being certified for human use. In this record-breaking rush new and radical methods are being employed, of which the Messenger RNA (mRNA) vaccines proving to be the most promising.

What is different about mRNA vaccines?

Previously, vaccines were used to release a harmless or weakened version of the pathogen in our bodies. This virus was then used to train our immune system to defeat its harmful counterpart. mRNA vaccines take a more direct approach. Instead of carrying a weaker strand of the virus, it instructs the mRNA single-stranded molecules naturally present in all of our cells to create a specific protein. Said protein is more or less identical to the one that SARS-CoV-2, but is devoid of the harmful elements and cannot mount a defense against the immune system. After it finishes training our

defense system, it harmlessly dissolves, leaving a healthy body.

Advantages

There are two parts to our immune system. The first one is innate, these are defenses we are born with. Other is acquired, which we developing after coming into contact with new diseases. A classic vaccine could only work with the acquired part of our system, effectively working at 50% capacity. mRNA however, can be programmed to activate our innate defense system as well, effectively doubling our defense system.

Prof. Isabelle Bekeredjian-Ding is Head of Microbiology at Paul-EhrlichInstitut, Federal Institute for Vaccines and Biomedicines, Langen, Germany. In an interview with European Commission Horizon Magazine, she said "All kinds of innate immune cells are being activated by the mRNA. This primes the immune system to get prepared for an endangering pathogen and thus the type of immune response that is triggered is very strong."

In the future, mRNA can theatrically be used to combat even deadlier diseases, such as cancer and HIV.

Risks

Since mRNA vaccines are only now beginning to be tested in humans, there

are a lot of unknowns regarding the treatment. Misconception regarding its method is also rampant, with miscreants peddling the rumor such as it can alter DNA, something it can not do. More human trials will eliminate the former, while the latter needs to be combatted through education and battling fake news.

Currently, mRNA COVID-19 vaccines by Pfizer and Moderna have undergone safety testing in human clinical trials, with China's Sinovac vaccine is in latestage trials. If cleared for human use, the easy scalability of this type of vaccine means it might be possible to eliminate the risk of covid by the end of 2021.

Education for underprivileged children amid pandemic

Given the current challenges due to the Covid-19 pandemic, many volunteering endeavours to provide education to underprivileged children have been disrupted. Certainly, it's not easy for voluntary organisations to carry out their education programs, ensuring quarantine regulations and to arrange funds and volunteers for the mission amid this pandemic. We have talked with a few organisations to know about their perspectives and steps in this respect. Despite taking different measures, they have one common objective and that is to ensure the best thing for these children.

Bidyanondo Foundation

Bidyanondo has 12 schools all around Bangladesh for underprivileged children where there were over 1200 regular students before the coronavirus outbreak. Mostly, they are from impoverished households living in slums or under the open sky with their families, and some of them are even orphans. As per the quarantine restrictions and the government notice, they have kept closed all of their schools which consequently impede learning for these children. Online education, the new solution to secure learning is certainly not possible for them due to their miserable financial condition. Sultana Jannat Shikha, one of the regular volunteers of Bidyanondo Foundation, said, "Just in Dhaka, we've over 150 students in our school. We're trying to keep in touch with them through phone calls. As per our knowledge, almost 50% of the students have left Dhaka due to the financial crisis amid this pandemic. Some of them are interested to get back to their school life despite the prevailing uncertainties and obstacles. We just



hope that we'll see all of our students in the classes after this phase." She added that Bidyanondo used to interact with homeless children on the streets and try to teach them moral values and make them understand about the negative effects of taking drugs before providing 'one taka meal' to them. The food initiative is still active, but the interactive storytelling session for homeless children, ensuring social distancing is not possible due to lack of resources and enough open places. They are trying to keep track of their students and other homeless children while providing foods to them. But as they have formal schools for the underprivileged children, they cannot resume classes against the government notice and also don't want to take risks with these children's safety.

Alokito Shishu

Alokito Shishu started its journey back in 2015 to provide quality education

for street kids who sold flowers and nuts in Dhanmondi and taught them at a makeshift school. However, their teaching programs are now mainly for the children of Bede and Dalit communities whose existence is often ignored in our society. It has two schools in Natore and Munshiganj where they had 105 students from kindergarten to grade 5 of these communities before the pandemic, but now they have around 85 students. The number was less during the peak of the pandemic. Thanks to their homeschooling initiative that more students are attending the classes regularly now. Due to a surge in the coronavirus cases in March, they had to put their teaching programs on a halt to avoid health risks for both children and volunteers. In July, when they resumed their classes, many challenges came such as convincing the parents of the students, shortage of teachers, and lack of funds. They even got to know that two of their students have become victims of child marriage as their parents were unable to bear the daily expenses. Alokito Shishu has started to provide home tutoring to the existing students along with a food relief which they can have after completing a class. The teachers maintain proper safety measures before going there. This initiative is somehow motivating the parents not to stop their children from attending the classes. Mithun Das Kabbo, Founder and CEO of Alokito Shishu said, "We operate the schools with the help of child sponsors and about 50% of our students do not have regular sponsors. Moreover, the number of sponsors fell even further due to the ongoing pandemic. It has made it difficult for us to continue the classes. Because due to lack of funds, we cannot provide food reliefs without which the children of these extremely vulnerable communities cannot be motivated to pursue education."

Pother Ishkul

Pother Ishkul mainly works with street children and other underprivileged children provide entertainment-based and practical learning. It's like a preprimary school. They are more focused on developing these growing children's mental health. The condition of this organisation is somehow unique from other ones. They mainly work in Gulistan Park and in this area, the number of students has increased amid this critical situation. The uncommon change is seen due to their 'food for education' project. Before pandemic, volunteers used to take one class per week, but now 5 classes per week include alphabet learning, storytelling, music, craft and scouting classes. That means these impoverished children are getting free foods 5 days instead of one day per week. This initiative has helped a lot to convince the parents to let their children continue the classes. At the initial days of the lockdown, the initiative was not going smoothly. Lack of volunteers and quarantine restrictions were the main obstacles. One more barrier is to collect funds for this project. As the amount of classes has increased by 5 times, so are the expenses. As per Ummey Salma Akter Urmi, assistant chief coordinator of Pother Ishkul, their teaching project was never put to a halt for a long period during this crisis. But due to shortage of funds and human resources, they couldn't take a few classes.
