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## People reaping benefits of democracy: PM

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said the people of the country are now reaping the benefits of democracy as they got back their state power from the cantonment.



"Military dictators had grabbed the state power frequently in the past ... once the state power was in the cantonment ... As a result, there was no [required] pace in development," she said.

The PM said this while addressing the National Economic Council meeting virtually from the Gono Bhaban.

The meeting approved the 8th Five-Year Plan (2021-2025).

As the state power came back to the mass people, they are now enjoying their democratic rights fully, Hasina said.

"General people are getting the benefits ... rural people are getting the benefits ... that's the main thing," she said.

Hasina said she believes that the 8th Five-Year Plan will be very much effective in attaining the country's desired development.

In this connection, she mentioned that the government is implementing the UN-formulated Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). "But coronavirus has created a problem, this is not for us alone, it's for the whole world."

Hasina said the government has been able to reduce the poverty rate significantly, while the GDP has been great

## Mercury may start to drop from Friday

People will not get immediate respite from the bone-chilling cold as the country may not see any major improvement in weather conditions in the coming days.

Temperature may slightly rise in some areas today and tomorrow. But it may start falling again from Friday, said Ruhul Quddus, a meteorologist.

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## First ship docks in Matarbari deep sea port

The first ship moored at the deep seaport in Matarbari in Cox's Bazar.

The foreign ship successfully reached the Matarbari Deep Seaport as the authority conducted an experimental capacity test of the newly built port.

Loaded with steam generator parts, the Panama flag carrier "Venus Triumph" anchored at the seaport around 10:20am, sailing off from Indonesia's Pt. Pelabuhan Cilegon Mandiri port on December 22.

These apparatuses will be used for the coal-based power plant in that area, Mohammad Abul Kalam, director of state-owned Coal Power Generation Company Bangladesh (CPGCBL), said.

The CPGCBL is implementing the coal-based power plant project in Matarbari.

The ship reached the deep sea of Matarbari early in the morning yesterday. Later at around 10:20am, the vessel was brought to the temporary jetty of the power plant.

The ship is owned by Sea Shore Marine Private Limited, while Ancient Steamship Company Limited is working agent in Bangladesh.

With the aim to navigate the ship, the CPGCBL created a 14-kilometer channel

Urges world to get serious about preparedness

## 50 journalists killed in 2020

Says RSF, highlights murders in India, Pakistan, Mexico

Fifty journalists and media workers were killed in connection with their work in 2020, the majority in countries that are not at war, Reporters Without Borders (RSF) said yesterday.

The figure shows an increase in the targeting of reporters investigating organised crime, corruption or environmental issues, the watchdog said.

It highlighted murders in Mexico, India and Pakistan.

Eighty-four percent of those killed this year were "deliberately targeted" for their work, RSF said in its annual report, compared to 63 percent in 2019.

"For several years now, Reporters Without Borders has noted that investigative journalists are really in the crosshairs of states, or cartels," said Pauline Ades-Mevel, RSF editor-in-chief.

Mexico was the deadliest country, with eight killed. "Links between drug traffickers and politicians remain, and journalists who dare to cover these or related issues continue to be the targets of barbaric murders," said the report.

None of the Mexico killings had yet been punished, added RSF, which has compiled annual data on violence against journalists around the globe since 1995.

Five journalists were killed in war-torn Afghanistan, it said, noting an increase in targeted attacks on media workers in recent months even as peace talks between the government and Taliban are ongoing.

RSF also highlighted the case of Iranian opposition figure Ruhollah Zam, who ran a popular social media

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
