Timbers seized

JANUARY 13: Chittagong Hill Tracts' South Forest Division seized more than 20,000 cubic feet of valuable timbers worth about Tk 60 lakh in a week-long drive ending Wednesday, reports UNB.

The timbers were seized from the so-called lot purchasers of the Forest Department from Jhoom area adjacent to Farua, Alikhiong and Sangrachari ranges of the division, sources said.

It has been alleged that the lot purchasers with the collaboration of some dishonest officials have been extracting timbers illegally for a long time.

The setzed timbers of different species include Champaful, Chaplish, Jarui, Telsur, Gamar, Garjan etcetra.

Sugarcane output declines in Pabna

PABNA, Jan 13: Sugarcane growers of Uttar Banga Sugar Mill area and Gopalpur under Ishwardi upazila of the district are suffering extremely due to corruption, malpractice and irregularities by a section of

In Uttar Banga Sugar Mill area there are about 7,000 sugarcane cultivators and at least 5,000 acres of land including farmland for Muri sugarcane variety have been put under cultivation.

It is assumed that this year nine lakh mounds of sugarcane will be produced. Though there is adequate supply of necessary seeds, mannual labour, insecticides, still 20 per cent of production has seen hampered due to hegitence in duty of some corrupt facers and staff. With 50 offpers and a large mumber of taff working in this sugar mill,

ft was assumed that this year production will shoot up to Taka two crore and 50 lakhs.

Sugarcane cultivators complained that officers and em-ployees engaged in Kalikapur, Dasuria, Muladuli, Aronkhola and Shahapur and other places are neglecting their duties for which sugarcane production is

Malpractice has been observed in weighing sugarcane. Loans are not given properly to poor cultivators hampering the production .

Though there is definite instruction to select the poor cultivators through a committog, but the mill authorities are selecting rich persons who are not actual cultivators

irregularities are found in investment of capital. Moreover, poor cultivators are not paid their dues regularly.

CHITTAGONG, Jan 13:-After the fall of Ershad Government, the insurgency in Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT) marked a downward trend for the last one month with a brighter prospect for resolving the tribals' issue politially.

During the period, the Chittagong Hill Tracts, with a population of about eight lakhs including members of 13 tribes and three lakh non-tribals, covering an area of 5089 square miles, witnessed a political shake-up.

The greater Chittagong Hill Tracts Students Council, an organisation of tribal students. held rallies and processions in support of their five -point demand that mainly included aboliton of Hill District Councils, withdrawl of army control from hill region, repatriation of tribal refugees before the ensuing parliamentary elecotion and reservation of three parliamentary seats only for the tribals.

Another freshly born organisation with tribals, Chittagong Hill Tracts Hill People's Council, led by its convenor Mr. Bijoy Keton Chakma, also echoed the same sentiments calling for political solution to Hill Tracts issue.

But their demands were resented and countered by other people of the Hill region who observed a day- long strike last December 22 at Khagrachari

They said tribals were abducted for their collaboration with the authority. Moreover, 204 tribal rebels were killed and 66 others injured in the fight. About 2500 Shanti Bhini men surrendered with arms and ammunition to the security forces over the past 16 years, official sources disclosed.

Taking the advantge of amnesty for the first time in 1985, 233 Shanti Bahini members surrendered at Rangamati and they all belonged to' Priti faction' led by Priti Chakma.

The trouble began in Chittagong Hill Tracts from 1974 under the leadership of the then parliamentarian Mr. Manabendra Narayan Larma, Official sources said, several rounds of talks aimed at resolving the issue, were held at different times between Bangladesh authority and rebel representatives earlier but those ended inconclusively.

KHULNA, Jan 13: Most landlords and houseowners have issued notices to their tenants to increase house rents with effect from this month. Some tenants complained

that their salaries have not been increased compared to the increase in prices of essentials and other commodi-

They also said at this moment of financial hardship they become utterly surprised to receive notice from the owners to increase house rents.

In the port city of Khulna, a section of houseowners has been increasing house rents every month . Specially with the change of every calendar year, house rents are increased according to houseowners

House Rent Control Ordinance Act was introduced in 1963, which remained in force for only one year. Later on, the Ordinance came in force at different occasions but withdrawn several times due to unknown reasons. However, an amendment to the Act was made in 1963 and Rent Control Act was applied into practice in 1984. But it remained in force up to March 17, 1986. Measures were taken by the

administration to enforce **House Rent Control Ordinance** afresh in 1990, but it has not been implemented.

MAULVI BAZAR, Jan 13: The residents of Maulvi Bazar Pourashava are deprived of civic amenities for a long time.

The Pourashava was established in 1930 covering an area of one square mile with a population of five thousand. At present the Pourashava covers an area of five square miles with a population of about 60 thousand. The condition of roads,

drainages, water supply, light are very precarious. Only 13 miles out of 24 miles road are pucca while the rest are simipucca or kutcha. Due to lack of proper repair and maintenance the roads be-

come impossible to walk dur-

ing the rainy season while dur-

ing the dry season people have

to suffer due to beat of dust in most areas. Drainage system is not satisfactory at all. Six miles out of 16 miles are pucca. Filthy water and grabages remain stagnant due to blockade of drains by unauthorised encroachers and lack of proper repair and

There is no street lights in most areas. So the people have to walk under darkness at

maintenance pollute the sur-

roundings.

The residents have been subjected to health hazards owing to impure drinking water. Two deep tubewells, out of four are inoperative. There is only one hospital in the Pourashava with only 50

beds which is not enough for

the residents. The residents do not get adequate and proper treatment in this hospital. Moreover, shortage of dectors, medicine and lack of proper management, the residents suffer much.

Shortage of market is another problem of the poura residents. There are only two markets in the town area with a very short space. At present a large number of shops sit on the road side causing obstacle both to buyers and sellers and to vehicular traffic. Besides, in the rainy season the markets go under rain water.

Most of the educational institutions in the town area are facing various problems like shortage of teacher, accommodation, furniture and want of pure drinking water. There are two colleges including a women's college, four boys high schools, two girls high schools, about 9 primary schools, two K. G. schools, a Primary Teachers Training Institutes and 15 marktets.
