# Dolls with magical powers

Dolls hold a special place in the cultures of all nations. Since ancient times they have been created for various purposes -- as playthings for chileren, as objects endowed with magical powers, or simply for the purpose of display and appreciation.

Japan perhaps cherishes its unique dollmaking tradition more than any other nation. An exhibition of traditional Japanese dolls

and a collection of photographs on Japan was inaugurated at the National Museum last Friday by Professor lazuddin Ahmed. Adviser to the

President in charge of Culture and Food Ministry. Mr. Takio Iguchi. Ambassador of Japan, was present on the occassion.

Sponsored jointly by the Embassy of Japan. The National Museum and in cooperation with the local branch of the Interna tional Penpals Club.79 dazzling Japanese dolls and 125 large cophoto loured graphs depicting everyday Japanese life are on display. In addition, 22 photographs of Japanese landscapes by local photographer Sudatta S. Barua arc also on display.

According to Tetsuro Kitamura. an expert on the subject, the history of Japanese dolls is extremely old dating back to about 3,000 years B. C. The dolls are made from wood. paper, cloth or clay, and a wealth of techniques are employed to create a quiet

beauty of expression and a rich display of colour. Because they exhibit a high-level of artistic workmanship, dolls in Japan are no longer confined to being the simple playthings of children. but have attained the status of a formative art

constituting a separate genre within the field

This exhibition is expected to draw a large crowds of local doll-lovers, as after all Bangladesh too has a century-old tradition of dollmaking with such inexpensive meterials as clay, cloths and straw. Terracota dolls have long been famous in this region. Although more expensive materials like copper and bronze have also come in to increasing use in the country's handicraft industry.

As far as we know, we haven't had any exhi-

bition of our dolls in any foreign country. It is about time that we had one perhaps in Tok-

yo where the Asian Cultura Centre of UNES CO has done a magnificient job in promoting closer cultural ties among Asian countries, in cluding between Japan and Ban-

With a view to portraying the cultural image of Japan, the exhibition is sched uled to continue till January 25 and is open from 10 a. m. to 4-30 m. everyday except Thurs

#### 1.5 lakh ton EC food aid arrives

The head of delegation of the Commission of the European Communities in Bangladesh, Ambassador Jacques Bailly, visited Chittagong to see the delivery of EC food aid to Bangladesh according to a Commission press release in Dhaka, reports BSS on Monday

Four ships carrying food aid from the European Community to Bangladesh arrived in Chittagong since mid-November, containing 1,50,000 tonnes of wheat. This wheat, plus 2,200 tonnes of vegetable oil which is expected to arrive in Bangladesh in the coming weeks, was pledged by the EC under its 1990 food aid programme.

The Ambassador met offictals of the Chittagong Port authority and the Ministry of Food, the Ministry of Food's godowns and silo and observed the unloading of a ship in the port carrying EC wheat.

#### Arms, ammunition recovered at Khulna

# Temperature to fall further

The night temperature over Bangladesh will fall further as the moderate cold wave will continue for a few more days. according to the Meteorological Department forecast vesterday.

Dry weathor is likely with partly cloudy sky at places till Thursday morning.

The night temperature fell by one to three degree Colsius last night. However, it was one to five degree Celsius above the normal for the time over the country except Rajshahi division and the regions of Mymensingh. Sylhet, Jessore and Khulna where the temperature was below normal by one to three degree Celsius.

According to Met Office. the night temperature may fall further by one to three degree Celsius by this (Wednesday) morning.

Outlook for subsequent two days: No appreciable change. Extended outlook for another five days: Little change. Yesterday, the westerly low lay over northern Bangladesh.

Assam and the neighbouring areas. The seasonal low lay over South Bay extending trough to the Arakan coast.

The weather remained dry

all over the country. The lowest minimum temperature 7.8 degree Celsius -- was recorded at Dinajpur. The maximum temperature
