Teacher shortage in schools

January 23: About 200 posts of primary teachers have been lying vacant in seven upazilas of the district hampering the implementation of the Universal Primary Education Pro-

According to official sources, the number of teachers in the government primary schools here is not maintained

Some of the schools with a large number of students, it is alleged, have been facing shortage of teachers while many schools having a few students have excess teachers.

It is learnt that, school authorities in different areas have been maintaining false attendance registers of both the students and teachers.

The contruction work is expected to be completed before June this year, it is learnt.


