RUWEISHED (Jordan), Jan 27: Iraq reopened its border with Jordan Sunday after a four-day closure, allowing a some war evacuees and oil trucks to cross. Anti-US protests spark riots in India: Five killed group of some 200 to 300 cel-

NEW DELHI, Jan 27: Security forces with orders to shoot rioters on sight today patrolled an Indian town where five people were killed in Hindu-Muslim clashes sparked by an anti-Gulf war protest, news reports said, reports AFP.

Police and paramilitary forces were out in force in curiew bound Chaziabad near here following the Saturday evening violence that left five dead. At least 50 people in-

jured and more than 100 shops gutted, the reports said. The condition of nine brought to hospitals here was said to be serious.

The violence erupted on Ghaziabad town, just outside, the Indian capital, Saturday evening after some 200 Muslims burnt US President George Bush in effigy to condemn allied attacks on Iraq, the Hindustan Times and other newspapers said.

A predominantly Hindu

chrating India's Republic Day nearby protested against the cffigy burning, triggering verbal exchanges which led to widespread violence, Newspapers reported that

the two groups attacked each other with stones, knives and home made bombs while snipers fired on the crowds from rooftops and arsonists set ablaze more than 100 shops near the town's bus terminals and railway station.
