

Iraqi posts in Kuwait

RIYADH, Feb 4: The US battleship USS Missouri pounded Iraqi bunkers in southern Kuwait with its 16inch guns in the first use of naval gunfire against lraqi targets in the Emirate, the US Central Command said today. according to agencies.

A senior US military officer said that the USS Missouri, which is in the Gulf, had taken out some of the bunkers very efficiently.

The officer, speaking on condition that he would not be identified, described the targets as "prefabricated reinforced bunkers," but could not say whether they were inland or coastal positions.

US troops exchanged fire with Iraqi troops across the border and attacked targets inside Kuwait with air and artillery bombardments, officials

In the largest engagement. a battalion-seized task force fired its 155 millimeter ar tillery guns at Iraqi ground radar and infantry near the Umm Gudair oilfield in southwestern Kuwait, 1st Marine Division staff officers said.

Allied forces mounted missile and air strikes on the key southern Iraqi port of Basra during the night and early today, the Iranian news agency IRNA reported.

Three huge explosions were heard today in the nearby Iranian town of Khorramshahr, the agency said.

An Iraq multiple-launch rocket battery, separately but around the same time, opened fire on targets inside Saudi

Two Marine FA-18 fighterbombers dropped bombs and destroyed the site, they said.

Earlier, Marine light ar mored vehicles exchanged cannon and small arms fire with Iraqi troops in Kuwait. but no casualties were reported.

No US ground troops entered Kuwait and there were no reports of Iraqi troops or equipment crossing into Saudi

B-52 bombers could be heard pounding Iraqi positions inside Kuwait overnight Saturday.

Allied warplanes carried out extensive raids on Baghdad late Sunday and early Monday. jolting residents from their beds and sending them fleeing to shelters.

Travelers arriving from Amman, Jordan, said Allied planes had also attacked trucks carrying foodstuffs into Iraq, with one driver killed and others injured along the

Bunker network shields civilians

Iraqis are keeping their morale high in the face of mounting air raids on their country by the US-led multinational forces. Civilian casualties are low as most of the res idents of Baghdad are taking shelter in well-fortified bunkers, Bangladeshis returning from Baghdad say.

On Sunday a total of 75 Bangladeshis were the first to arrive home since the war began on January 17. They include 32 employees of Hyundai Construction Company based in Baghdad, 25 employees of Al-Rashced Hotel of Baghdad and two Bangladeshi newsmen who went to Baghdad to cover war. Bangladesh Biman brought them from Bombay where they gathered from the war-torn country.

The returnees say massive air raids are being carried out on Baghdad and its outskirts. On an average eight attacks are being made daily on the key Sec Page 12 Col. 3

Now Biman to hireF-27s

Biman Bangladesh Airlines is likely to procure two F-27-600 aircraft on lease as two of its ATP's remain grounded. The national airlines will

float an international tender soon for the purpose. The three F-27s of Biman were sold out only six months ago to make way for the induc-

tion of newly manufactured ATPs' in the airlines to mod-Procurement of smaller aircraft for Biman's domestic routes was felt following grounding of two ATPs since early January. Biman bought

three ATP aircraft from British

Aerospace at a total cost of about US \$ 50 million and two of these reached Bangladesh 23 September last year. Soon after the induction in Biman's fleet, frequent snags were noticed in the ATPs and at one stage one remained inoperable for some days. Afterwards, both the aircraft were grounded on safety rea-

sons while the government decided not to take delivery of the third one. For the last five weeks. Biman has been operating its domestic flights using its two F-28 aircraft. These aircraft are also being used on regional routes to Kathmandu, Rangoon and Calcutta. Biman has four other widebodied DC-10s which are operating on inter-

national routes. The decision to procure ATP for the national airlines was taken in July. 1989 despite opposition from the concerned experts.

Meanwhile, a case has been filed by Bureau of Anti-Corruption (BAC) against former President Ershad and four of his associates for causing financial loss to the government by the purchase of three ATP aircraft at a higher price.
